Following are the Guidelines for Encouraging the Development of Responsibility in Children asgiven by Dr. Jerry Lane, Certified Parenting Specialist. Strive to make at least one positive change
in your parenting techniques this in your parenting techniques this
month! "Responsibility is a necessary
uality for living successfully in our environment. As parents, we need to see responsibility in chil dren as more than just performing chores around the house or completing homework assignments. On being capable of making moral and rational decisions on one's sown and becoming responsible for one's an going life and ultimate goals. The
ollowing guidelines can be effec trong helping children develop a trong sense of responsibility.

* Model responsible behavior strong work ethics, and healthy
decision making as a parent decision making as a parent.
* Begin early in giving children esponsibility. A two year old child is not too young to begin performing simple tasks for self and family * Engage children in the decision process regarding responsibilities.
* Don't do for the child what he can do for himself.
*Resist the temptation to "do it over" for the children. This underpetence and self-worth

* Set reasonable timelines for completion of chores or give choice as to when a task is to be done. *Do not tolerate sloppiness. If task isn't done to the child's capability, insist that it be done prop ${ }^{\text {erly, }}$ Praise and encourage progress and effort, rather than just the end results. Let positive statements outnumber negative statements by at least three to one. *When teaching a new task, us simple repetition.
Understand that the real goals of responsibility-independence, sel steem, confidence, healthy deci-sion-making skils-are the rue ung of emotional health.
