## **2007 Elections**

Spearman ISD, the City of Spearman and the City of Gruver will all hold elections on May 12, 2007. Gruver ISD and Pringle-Morse CISD will not hold elections at this time.

Spearman ISD has five candidates vying for three positions. Incumbents Bob Boxwell and Will Jarvis have refiled and Stephanie Crossland has not filed for reelection. Other candidates filing are Dr. Mark Garnett, Travis Patterson and Jimmy Kenney. (Other board members are Dwayne Mitchell, Carol Dunnihoo, Maria Sibley and Glen Ray Mackie.)

The City of Spearman has three positions open. Incumbents Kathy Boyd and Ron Antalek have filed for reelection, but incumbent Sergio Vargas did not file. Other candidates filing include Mike Schnell and Craig Schumann. (Other councilmen are Charles Elliott, Jon Garnett, and Mayor Brian Gillispie.)

The City of Gruver will hold an election for Mayor. Mark Irwin has filed for reelection, with one opponent, Kevin McNett. Councilmember Johnnie Williams has also filed for reelection, with no opponent. (Chad Logsdon is the other councilman.)

An election will also be held at the Hansford County Courthouse for a Constitutional Amendment.







AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry signed legislation reducing the amount of roperty tax that a school district may impose on the home residence of Texans who are over 65 or disabled.

The legislation, HB 5 by Rep. Leo Berman, R-Tyler, is a one-time tax cut that expires on Sept. 1, 2008.

HB 5 stipulates that the state will make up the revenue school districts will lose to the tax cut, estimated at \$15 billion.

The money to make up the lost revenue would come from HB 1, the general appropriations bill, but HB 1 has not passed.

A conference committee of 10 lawmakers must work out a final version of HB 1 agreeable to both the House and Senate.

Conferees are Reps. Warren Chisum, R-Pampa; Dan Gattis, R-Georgetown; Ryan Guillen, D-Rio Grande City; Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham; and Sylvester Turner, D-Houston; and Sens. Steve Ogden, R-College Station; Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo; Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock; John Whitmire, D-Houston; and Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands. Jessica's Law goes to conference

The House and Senate did not agree on elements of HB 8, the Jessica's Law legislation championed by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and authored by Rep. Debbie Riddle, R-Houston, five joint authors and 23 cosponsors.

Dewhurst named conferees to meet with House members in a conference committee: Sens. Bob Deuell, R-Greenville; Kim Brimer, R-Arlington; Juan Chuy Hinojosa, D-McAllen; Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, and Florence Shapiro, R-Plano. House conferees are Reps. Riddle; Gattis; Aaron Pena, D-Edinburg; Jerry Madden, R-Richardson; and Joe Deshotel, D-Beaumont.

"This legislation is one of my highest priorities and I have full confidence that the conferees will craft a final bill that sends a strong message to child predators: Don't mess with kids in Texas," Dewhurst said.

Dewhurst wants tougher penalties for child predators, including the ption of the death penalty or life in prison without parole for person twice convicted of aggravated sexual assault against a child under 14. **Combs offers limited tax amnesty** State Comptroller Susan Combs announced she is offering a 60-day tax amnesty to businesses with overdue state taxes and those that may be operating without required tax permits. From June 15 through Aug. 15 taxpayers can come forward, file pastdue tax reports and pay their taxes in full, and the comptroller will waive penalty and interest charges normally added to delinquent taxes, according to a news release from Combs' office. The tax amnesty applies to taxes and tax reports originally due before April 1, 2007. "We're calling the amnesty period 'Project Fresh Start' because taxpayers have a unique, limited-time opportunity to clear up unpaid, underreported or overdue taxes without fear of penalty or interest and get a fresh start with the state," Combs said. The amnesty does not apply to assessments already identified by the comptroller, taxpayers currently under audit or review, and taxpayers the comptroller has already contacted about an audit or possible tax deficiency, Combs said.

\* "If you want to hit a man in the chest, aim for his groin."





### House passes 'Under God' bill

The House voted 124-5 to put the words "under God" in the pledge of allegiance to the state flag. HB 1034, authored by Rep. Riddle, would change the wording to "I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one state under God and indivisible." The current language is "I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one and indivisible." The Senate has yet to consider the neasure.

Before the bill came to a final vote, Rep. Scott Hochberg, D-Houston, asked Riddle if she would accept an amendment adding the words "and justice for all" to the bill, because if the intent was to mirror the U.S. pledge of allegiance, it would include those additional words.

### Riddle declined.

Smoking debate to continue

The House spent hours in debate May 4 over HB 9, legislation to ban moking in all workplaces and public places, authored by Rep. Myra Crownover, R-Denton.

Debate was interrupted many times by points of order charging that parts of the official analysis of the bill were inaccurate.

Further consideration was postponed to May 9.

Casino gambling measure fails

A bill to allow casino gambling on the federally recognized Tigua and Alabama-Coushatta Indian reservations narrowly failed in a House vote on May 4.

The vote was a tie at 66-66. One more vote would have sent the measure, HB 10 by Rep. Norma Chavez, D-El Paso, to the Senate for consideration.

Dopnie Hill was many things. He was a





boring machines and installed a two inch poly gas line under the sidewalk. This saved repairs on both the sidewalk and the parking lot.





The season of Easter, the power of Jesus' resurrection continues as we study Acts 16: 9-15, Psalm 67, Revelation 21:10-22:5, and John 5: 1-9. Paul is going to Ephesus (in modern day Turkey) when he has a vision of the "man of Macedonia" pleading for help. Paul has been prevented from entering Asia, and Dr. Luke appears to be traveling with him. They arrive in Philipi, a roman colony. There is no synagogue in Philipi, so they seek other Jews by the river, for the Jews an alternate place for prayer. They meet Lydia, a wealthy gentile who is a "God fearer" and we are told she "opened her mind" to the gospel and she becomes a Christian. Lydia insists that Paul and Luke stay with her. The conquest of Europe for Christ has begun. The Psalmist sings that as we praise God he blesses us so that others may be blessed. Our God is inclusive, He welcomes all to believe and join the faith community.

John again sees the "New Jerusalem", the ideal of the Holy of Holies. Each side of the city is 1500 miles long, 1500 miles high, the city is a perfect cube. The cube is a symbol of perfection and is the source of the sometimes misused term, "four square". The city wall is only 200 feet high. Perhaps this tells us that there is nothing to fear in the new city of God and the purpose of the wall is to describe the limits of the city. There are twelve gates consisting of a single pearl, each of which are inscribed with the names of the twelve tribes of Israel and the twelve apostles. Perhaps this shows us the inclusiveness of the city of God, and the continuity of God's love from the beginning to the end of time. One can sense there is a significance to the fact that one of the seven angels of Destruction is the angel that is showing John the Holy City, the "Bride" of the Lamb. There is no sun or moon, the glory of God and the Lamb is its light. Fear not Christian, there is room for all in God's Holy City. If you read this literally the City covers 2,250,000 square miles!

The Gospel shows us Jesus present on a Sabbath at the Pool of Bethzatha where many who suffered disease await the disturbance of the waters, in the hopes of being the first in the water to effect healing. Jesus chooses a man who has been ill for thirty-eight years. Note that Jesus first asks the man, "Do you want to be healed?" [To be open to Jesus one must be willing to be changed]. In answer, the man makes excuses for why he has not been able to be healed. Jesus does not regard his excuses, but gently commands the impossible, "Stand up, take your mat, and walk". The man obeys. [We cannot accept the gift of God without being inspired to action]. We know that this man was healed both spiritually and physically.


As you study, may the Holy Spirit "open your mind" and assure you of your place in the New Jerusalem.

• TX01A5936: This hard white winter wheat line is resistant to stripe rust, susceptible to leaf rust, and offers some wheat streak mosaic virus resistance. It performs best under High Plains dryland and limited irrigation conditions. It's relatively large seeded with a good test weight. Baking data indicates a short mixing time, average stability and good loaf volume.

• TX01D3232: This hard red winter wheat variety will be released as TAM 304 this summer. It is resistant to leaf rust and moderately susceptible to stripe rust. It performs best in the Blacklands and South Central areas of Texas, but it also performs well under irrigation in the High Plains. It is relatively small seeded with less-than-average test weight. The baking data indicates a long mixing time, good stability and good loaf volume.

• TX01V5314: This hard red winter wheat is resistant to leaf

rust and stripe rust. Performance has been excellent throughout the Great Plains. 
