The Lions of Spearman, coordinated by James Cunningham, also a past district governor, arranged to have Vasquez sent to Mid-South Sight and Hearing Clinic in Memphis. The clinic is operated by the Lions of Tennessee and financed by Lions clubs in Tennessee and in sur-

rounding states.

John Barnett of Texarkana, Ark., made arrangements for the surgery, Lorenc said. Vasquez will return for further procedures, including another trip scheduled for January.

The clinic provided free services to Vasquez, the Lions District 2-T1 Lions Eye Bank in Amarillo provided travel expenses. A grant from the Panhandle of Texas Lions Foundation will provide future funding, according to information from the organization.

Both granting entities receive funding from Lions members in District 2-T1, which covers the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Qualification for financial assistance from Lions clubs is based on financial need. Vasquez had no insurance.

Tests Scheduled To Be Administered In February

The 2000 Spring TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) and the TEAMS (Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills) exit level tests will be given in February at Spearman High School, 403 East 11th Street, for 10th-, 11th-, and 12th-grade students as well as outof-school students who have not passed some or all portions of those tests.

Dates for the TAAS are: Writing - February 22nd, Math -February 23rd, Reading - February 24th.

Dates for the TEAMS are: Math - February 23rd, English Language Arts - February 24th.

Only students who are not currently enrolled in Spearman High School who will need to pass the TAAS or TEAMS to fulfill graduation requirements must preregister for the tests.

Registration packets are available from the counseling office at SHS and the Region XVI Education Service Center. Testing site addresses and times are listed in a directory included in each registration packet.

The registration form must be completed and returned in the preaddressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5 p.m. January 21. The forms should be sent by registered mail. Students preregistering for the TEAMS or TAAS must have a picture identification for each testing day in order to be able to take the tests.



Important Change to LDP Requirements

Subject to certain conditions, a producer who is otherwise eligible to eceive a payment will be allowed to receive a loan deficiency payment (LDP) on any eligible crop produced in 1999, even though the producer has already marketed the commodity. This is a major change from pre vious regulations, which stated that a producer must retain Beneficia Interest, or still own the commodity, in order to qualify for an LDP payment. If any producer was previously turned down because they no onger owned the crop, or if they have not requested and LDP payment because they no longer own the crop, please contact the local Farm Service Agency office. You may be eligible under the revised regulations

POLICY STATEMENT

25.05 These paragraphs describe the policy of the North Plains ndwater Conservation District Groundwater Conservation District (NPGCD) ("the District") regarding the assessment of administrative penalties by the staff prior to a hearing before the Board of Directors. Enforcement actions may result from serious or unre-solved violations discovered during an inspection or during a review of the record of information submitted to the District, or from information that concerns violations and is gained from permits or meetings gained from permits or meetings related to permits, or from other sources. This policy statement does not address the conse-quences which may result after an enforcement action is initiated, but rather how the District staff shall evaluate violations for the purpose of assessing administrative penal-ties or recommending administra-tive penalties to the District's Board of Directors

Penalties sought through enforce-ment actions initiated by District's legal counsel may be based upon legal counsel may be based upon this policy, however, the statutory maximums for civil penalties and injunctive relief may be sought. **Determining the Number of Violation Events** 25.06 The number of violation events that will be assessed a penalty depends on the number of times the violation is observed the

penalty depends on the number of times the violation is observed, the specific rule or requirement violated, the duration of the violation and other case information. 25.07. Certain violations will typi

be considered discrete s. For these violations, one cally events. penalty event will be assessed for every documented observation. every documented observation. Discrete violations are situations that are observed and documented that are observed and documented during a discrete interval in time. These violations involve practices or actions that may not occur con-tinuously. An example of a violation that would be a discrete violation would be the failure to submit doc-uments or reports. For discretely occurring violations, one penalty event will be assessed for every documented observation of the noncompliance.

action In practice, continuous violations will be assessed beginning with the documented date of noncompliance or the date that the violator "knew or should have known", whichever is appropriate, as the beginning point. The respondent will ordinarily be charged with knowledge of permit conditions and rules

Evaluation Adjustments to the Penalty Amount 25.09 Adjustments to the penalty amount may be made at the staff level or by the Board of Directors and will be based upon the following factors relating to the violator. culpability

· good-faith effort to comply,

 compliance history. economic benefit gained through noncompliance, and

 such other factors as may be deemed relevant under the circumstances

Culpability 25.10 In assessing culpability, staff will determine whether the violator could have reasonably antici-pated and avoided the violation(s). This determination will be made on a site-specific basis and will examine a two-year history. In order to answer this question, staff will review the following:

 whether the violator received a previous Notice of Violation (NOV), erbal or written, for similar violations:

 whether the violator had submit-ted compliance plans for prior vio-lations noted in the same program; and

• whether documentation that indi-cates culpability exists. If the answer to any of the above issues is "yes," then 25 percent may be added to the penalty amount.

Good-Faith Effort to Comply 25.11 When deciding how to apply the reduction for good-faith efforts, it is important to note that the staff

it is important to note that the staff will consider the respondent's efforts to bring the facility into com-plete compliance with all applicable rules and regulations. Thus, any reduction will be applied to all vio-lations and events. The analysis of good-faith efforts involves two fac-tors; the timeliness of the respon-dent's action and the guality of that dent's action and the quality of that action. Accordingly, the respondent is to be given credit for timeliness, quality, or both. Timeliness is defined by when the respondent took action to correct the violations: whether corrective

the violations: whether corrective actions are taken as soon as viola-tions are identified and before the issuance of a Notice of Violation (NOV)

Quality is defined as the degree to which adequate action is taken. The maximum good faith reduc-tion is 25 percent. Violators who are considered culpable will not receive a reduction for corrective are considered culpable will not receive a reduction for corrective action taken after the issuance of an NOV. Good faith efforts will only be considered if the violator has achieved compliance with applica-ble rules and regulations. Other Factors That Justice May Require

25.12 The staff may recommend adjustment of the penalty amount, on a case-by-case basis, upon a consideration of factors unique to



For continuing violations, the num-ber of events will be linked to the level of impact of the violation and the number of days it existed. The duration of events concerning continuous violations, for the pur-poses of preparing an enforcement action, may begin with the initial date of noncompliance with a requirement, rule, or permit and extend up to the time that the viola-
