4-H Roundup set for June 4-5

Several Hansford County 4-H'ers will be competing for part of more than half a million dollars in scholarships at the 1991 Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University June 4-5.

The biggest 4-H event of the year, Roundup brings together more than 2,500 young people who learn by demonstrating skills and leadership in competitions.

Representing Hansford County 4-H will be the Senior Livestock Judging Team of Leslie Latta, Randi Renner, Chris Brooks and Kevin Williams, all of Spearman, and Kevin Williams, along with Kimberly Wagner of Gruver, who will present a Method Demonstration on safety and accident prevention.

The livestock judging team took first place at the District 1 Livestock

Show at Canyon to qualify for the Roundup entry. In addition to the team win, Williams placed as High Individual at the District 1 contest, while Latta was third and Brooks took fifth.

Gayle W. Laine, 4-H youth development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that \$592,000 in scholarships sponsored by the Texas 4-H Foundation will be awarded during Roundup.

Texas has the nation's largest 4-H scholarship program, an effort that continues to grow with tremendous support from private donations, said Dr. Lance Bullard, Extension 4-H youth development specialist and executive director of the Texas 4-H Foundation.

"We have over 200 applicants this

year and 91 scholarships to award," Bullard said. "Selection is a difficult process that takes a seven-person committee five days to complete."

Hansford Roundup celebration . . .

New events, surprise on tap

The 1991 Hansford Roundup celebration, to be held in Spearman May 31-June 2, will feature some new events and a surprise or two, according to Roundup Committee Chairperson Loretto Cook.

Cook said that new Roundup events this year will include a family style street dance on Friday night, crowning of a Rodeo Queen, and a goat milking contest and a wild horse race at the Saturday and Sunday rodeo performances. She also promises a surprise entry at the Saturday afternoon parade.

Cheryl Sander is in charge of the Rodeo Queen contest this year. She said five girls will compete for a first-place prize donated by The Bunkhouse and Mission Cable. Rodeo Queen contestants include Leslie Latta, Bonnie Thompson, Cinde Turner and Shanna DeArmond, all of Spearman, and Tracy Smith of Gruver.

According to Sander, the girl who sells the most tickets to the Roundup rodeo will be named Rodeo Queen. The winner will be announced Saturday afternoon before the first rodeo performance. Other Hansford County girls who would like to participate should contact Sander at 659-2989.

Another new event at the celebration will be the family style street dance. Cook said the dance is scheduled for Friday, May 31 on the Hansford County Courthouse parking lot, following the Miss Hansford Pageant. The street dance is sponsored by First State Bank of Spearman. Cook said the Music Maker of Perryton will provide music to please everyone's tastes. She also said a concession stand, serving drinks and snacks, will be open to quench the dancers' thirst.

People who like to do their

"stepping out" during the day, and not necessarily to music, can do that the morning of Saturday, June 1 in the Roundup 5K Walk. Cook explained that Joe and Wanda Archer are in charge of this new event, which will start and finish at the county courthouse.

Cook said the Saturday and Sunday Roundup Rodeo performances will feature two new events, a goat milking contest and a wild horse race.

She said the goat milking contest is open to young people ages 6-10 years old. A group of goats will be turned loose in the rodeo arena, and the contestants must catch and milk a goat to win. "Most of these kids are going to be city people. I'll be interested to see if they know which end to grab," said Cook.

The wild horse race will have teams vying to catch, saddle and ride a horse to a finish line to win. Horses will be released into the arena with just a halter on, and competing teams will try to single out a horse from the group, saddle it, put a rider on and get across the finish line first.

The surprise of the Roundup will come during the parade, to be held Saturday morning. Cook would not say what that surprise is, but she did say, "It would be well worth showing up to see." She added that the prizes given out to parade participants have been combined into one \$200 prize, which will be given to the participant judged best in the parade.

Cook stated that all these events are open to anybody who wants to participate. She encourages all interested people to contact the Spearman Chamber of Commerce for entry blanks, tickets or information about the Roundup.

Tour of historical sites set Saturday

Hansford County and area residents are invited to explore the past Saturday, May 25. On that day, the Hansford County Historical Commission will sponsor a tour of historic locations in Hansford and Hutchinson Counties.

The tour will be by private vehicle, and will begin at 8 a.m. as tour-takers meet at the Lindbergh marker, located 1/2 mile south of Spearman on Highway 207. There is no charge for taking part in the event.

The starting point for the tour will be at the Lindbergh marker. There, before the tour caravan begins, Sylvia Robertson will tell the story of the time the famous aviator Charles A. Lindbergh landed at Spearman.

Next stop on the tour will be the old town of Hansford. Details about the town's history will be given by Bill K. Jackson. Near that site are historical markers commemorating the Dodge

City-Tascosa Trail and Farwell. Helen Boyd will give a report at those locations.

Trekking onward across Hansford County, the caravan will make a stop in Morse, with the outline of Morse given by Jenny Blankenship.

The home of J.B. Buchanan is the next stop, where Mr. Buchanan will tell about his collection of windmills. The tour will conclude at noon, at Adobe Walls. G.W. Robinson will provide a bit of that site's history, describing the events that took place there.

The Hansford County Historical Commission invites everyone to call a friend, load up in the car and learn about Hansford County's past.

ARB to hear protests July 11

Property owners in the Hansford County Appraisal District will have an opportunity on July 11 to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on this date.

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to assess property taxes for 1991.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and who are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productivity appraisal be properly granted.

Property owners may appear before the ARB to protest any of these specific actions of the appraisal office:

- the appraised or agricultural value of the property;
- unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district;
- inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
- denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;
- denial of agricultural-use, open-space, or timber productivity appraisal;
- determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change-of-use and is subject to a rollback tax;
- identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;
- determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property;
- any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects the property owner.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps by which a property owner files a pro-

test. First, the property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by May 31 or within 30 days after the taxpayer is mailed a notice of appraised value by the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, or if the chief appraiser issues a prior-year omitted property notice, the property owner has only 10 days from the mailing date to file a protest.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable," Peddy said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property that is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

Clemmons reflects on 25 years as school secretary

Spearman Elementary School secretary Anita Clemmons will wrap up a 25-year career at her front office desk this spring, but she will take with her a gold mine of good memories, solid friendships and funny stories.

When she got her job in 1966, this very capable lady was sent over from the school district's business office to help out then-Principal Allen Alford in the afternoons only.

"Before that, Mr. Alford had to do all his own phone-answering and other secretarial work, as well as running things in the kindergarten through eighth grades!" Clemmons recalls.

Within a year, it was apparent that Clemmons' skills were needed at the school full-time, because the number of students was increasing and so was the work load on the administrator.

In 25 years as school secretary, Clemmons has only worked with two principals, Alford and currently, Eddie Gage. "Both men have always treated me like a co-worker, which makes being a secretary here easier than being a secretary or receptionist for a regular 'boss' or employer," Clemmons comments.

When asked to assess the changes

that have occurred, in her role as school secretary and in the schools in general, over the past two and a half decades, she thinks only a moment before saying, "There were no teacher aides in the old days, so I did a lot of copying for the teachers. After the first aide was hired, I had fewer responsibilities like that."

That first classroom teacher aide was Betty Uptergrove, who was hired in 1969 and continues to work in this capacity today.

Clemmons says probably the most visible change over the years has been in teacher's attire. "The clothing has become much more informal. I remember when we first were allowed to wear slacks. Remember those doubleknit pantsuits? The rule then was that the blouse's hem had to come down to the middle of your fingertips!" she says with a laugh.

Her specific duties as school secretary have become much more technical over the years, she adds, and the job "busier." "My biggest responsibility is the attendance, which I collect daily from the teachers and post on the computer," she explains. She describes this as "a headache, but it has to be done!"

Before the school office was computerized, the attendance was kept

by hand by the teachers themselves. Clemmons believes the new system is an improvement because "Teachers have so much paperwork to do already!"

Clemmons also makes out the all-important Public Education Information Management System, or PEIMS report. This is the report containing all the data on teachers and

pupils that the Texas Education Agency requires. "The PEIMS does everything from listing each child by social security number to tracking the schedule of the number of minutes spent on each subject in that child's or teacher's day," Clemmons says.

Then there is the ringing telephone, of course, which she says can con-

sume as much as a third of her time each day. Clemmons says most of her calls come after 3 p.m., "When mothers find out they are going to be out of pocket and need to make arrangements for their kiddos."

There is no "typical day" for the school secretary however, who cheerfully admits, "Anything you plan on doing before you come that morning will probably be the one thing you don't get done!" This was particularly true during the two harried years Clemmons' secretarial duties were combined with the job of school librarian.

"A job involving this many children is always going to be unpredictable," she admits.

Over the years, she has found herself in a few unusual and amusing situations, such as the time she witnessed a young pupil warning the principal that his daddy would "whip" the principal if the principal punished him. Soon afterwards, the child's father did appear and stood in front of Clemmons' desk.

"He was a very big man and as he approached, I called back to Mr. Alford, 'Here comes so-and-so's father!'" When Clemmons turned around to face the parent, he timidly cleared his throat and asked in a hesitant soprano, "Where can I get

an annual?"

Another time a little girl informed Clemmons in serious tones that her mother was going to be in the hospital "to get her overshoes taken out."

Clemmons and her husband Eddie, who retired five years ago as high school principal here, plan to do some traveling now that she will have more free time. "We have a 27-foot travel trailer so we can go and stay someplace a fairly long time," she says.

She is especially looking forward to spending more time with her two grandsons. Clemmons' son Lonnie and daughter-in-law Paula of Morse have a 4-year-old, Seth. Daughter Eadie and husband Jody Bradford of Aspermont have a baby, Jade Michael.

"This has been a very happy job," Clemmons says reflectively. "I have been very fortunate to have worked with this quality of people all these years."

It will be a new voice patiently answering "Elementary school!" next fall when parents dial 659-2555, but perhaps Anita Clemmons will pop in now and then to visit both the grown-ups and the children there who will miss her.

At the movies ...

Showing at Spearman's Lyric Theatre Friday, May 23 through Tuesday, May 28 are "Toy Soldiers" on Screen 1 at 8 p.m. and "Out for Justice" on Screen 2 at 7:45 p.m.

"Toy Soldiers" involves a terrorist leader (Andrew Divoff) who travels, with his gang of thugs, from Colombia to America an attempt to prevent the extradition of his drug lord father. They descend upon the campus of the Regis School for boys - nicknamed the "Rejects" school because half the students have been expelled from other prep schools.

The terrorists originally plan to kidnap the son of the judge who'll be trying the extradited drug lord's case, but since that boy is already hidden away under government protection, they settle for holding the rest of these rich kids for ransom.

Meanwhile, just outside school grounds, the FBI and the Army have joined the local authorities in plotting to set the students free. Plan A is a nice civilized negotiation. Plan B is to storm the place. Since the whole school is wired to explode at the touch of a button, nobody wants it to come down to Plan B.

But the terrorists aren't taking into account the spunk and ingenuity of the Regis "rejects." Led by head delinquent Sean Astin, the boys make their own escape plans - spying

on their captors, transmitting vital information to their would-be rescuers and setting a series of booby traps designed to drive the terrorists to distraction.

Also starring as the school's kindly/gruff dean is Lou Gossett Jr. "Toy Soldiers" is rated R.

"Out for Justice" stars Steven Seagal as Gino, who grew up in Brooklyn, a poor kid surrounded by wise guys and made men. And he stayed, even though he became a cop while most of his playmates grew up to be gangsters.

When a cop (a childhood buddy) is gunned down on a street corner in broad daylight and in front of his wife and children, Gino is more than mad and grief-stricken, and he's going to make the killer pay.

Everybody knows who the killer is: Richie Madona, a local bad boy with ties to the Mafia and a wicked crack jones. And everybody knows he's not going to leave the neighborhood. The only question is, who's going to get him first, the police, the mob or Gino?

"Out for Justice" represents a genuine step forward for Steven Seagal films. Where his earlier films tended to dullness, this revenge fantasy is a virtual perpetual motion machine and the action rarely flags. "Out for Justice" is rated R.

Ordination celebration set

The community of Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church in Spearman, together with members who participate in Sunday worship in the Mission de Cristo Redentor in Gruver, will give thanks for ordained ministry in Gospel word and sacrament on Sunday, June 2.

Bishop Leroy T. Matthiesen of the Diocese of Amarillo will lead the celebration, with presbyters and deacons from Texas, California, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, and Wisconsin. Biblical readings, songs, and preaching will be proclaimed in English, Latin, and Spanish.

Guitarists from Gruver and Spearman under the leadership of Jose Bravo and Felix Lopez, along with other musicians and singers from Amarillo, will lead the community in song. An honor guard from the fourth

degree Knights of Columbus, in full ceremonial regalia, will participate in the celebration.

Visiting Hansford County for some days before and after the celebration will be the two sisters and brothers-in-law of Father Norbert J. Kieferle Jr., pastor of Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish. They are residents of southeastern Wisconsin. Also visiting will be film and television personality Philip Picerni of Simi Valley, Calif.

The celebration will mark the 25th anniversary of ordination into priestly ministry of Father Kieferle. He was ordained by Archbishop William E. Cousins of Milwaukee on May 28, 1966 and served as assistant pastor, attorney in the archdiocesan tribunal, and chaplain for the School Sisters of Notre Dame until 1979. During that time he also pursued graduate studies in canon law at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. Thereafter he was allowed to live and work in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles until he came to the Diocese of Amarillo in July 1, 1988. While in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, he worked in the office of the archbishop.

After serving parishes in Amarillo and Hereford, Father Kieferle was named administrator and then pastor in Spearman in March of 1989. On December 1, 1990 he was received officially into the Diocese of Amarillo by a process which canon laws calls incardination.

Because she suffered a very serious stroke four years ago, Father Kieferle's mother will be unable to travel from Wisconsin to participate in the anniversary celebration; his father suffered a fatal heart attack at home in November of 1966.

In addition to serving as pastor in Hansford County and Waka, Father Kieferle is a member of the Canon Law Society of America, the Knights of Columbus, the Secular Order of Discalced Carmelites, and the Panhandle AIDS Support Organization. He recently completed a continuing education course in health science at Amarillo College.

In addition to relatives and friends from Texas and other states, members of the Spearman Ministerial Alliance have been invited to share in the celebration. Father Kieferle is a member of that group as well.

In addition to the celebration of eucharist which will begin at 4:00 p.m., a dinner and fellowship will be celebrated in the parish hall and on the parish grounds later that afternoon and evening.

LIVING BY GRACE!

The problem was that nothing was ever good enough. It did not matter how many people I visited, how many hours I worked, how much I prayed, how much I read the Bible, or how much I accomplished. It was never good enough.

Then I discovered grace. Romans 3:23-24 says, "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God and are justified freely by his grace through redemption that came by Christ Jesus." I heard God saying, "I don't care who you are. I don't care what you have done. I don't care where you have been. I don't care what you have been through. My message to you is the same. I want to have a lov-

ing relationship with you."

In Dr. Chris Thurman's book, "The Lies We Believe," he asks a young Christian, Diane, the following questions: "Why do you think you have never enjoyed your Christianity?" She replied, "Would you enjoy it if you always felt you were trying to measure up and never making it?" "No, I wouldn't," he replied. Then he asked, "How do you view God, Diane?" She answered, "I see God as a harsh judge who damns people to hell!" Then he asked, "Was grace ever mentioned?" She replied, "If it was, I can't remember it."

Does this describe your faith? Is there any grace in your life? When Jesus died on the cross, He cleared away all the sin that stands between you and God. Because of Christ's sacrifice, there is absolutely nothing you can do to make Him love you one bit more than He does right now; and there is absolutely nothing you can do to make Him love you one bit less than He does right now. The real question is this: Will you accept His love? When you accept God's love and live in grace, then you are free to enjoy a loving relationship with God.

When I discovered grace, I realized beyond a shadow of a doubt that God loved me. He didn't love me because of all the things I had done. He loved me because of what Christ had done for me. I didn't have to prove myself, but I did have to make a conscious decision to humble myself and receive His love. May God help you to do the same.

What's Going On At Baylor Lake???
For several years Lake Baylor near Childress has been well known by local experts and area bass clubs as the best bass lake for 200 miles. But starting last spring when Joe Holland of Amarillo broke the old lake record by catching a 12.00 lb. bass during a Mini-Boat Bass Club

tournament, the number and quality of big bass have been simply amazing.

Look at the record: December 16 - Stan Ripley of Vernon catches a 13.4 lb. bass - New Lake record. May 8 - Jackie Austin of North Randall county hauls in a 13.8 lb. - New Lake Record.

Ole Baylor is sure hot, but wait: the best is yet to come. Last Monday, Alan MaGouirk of Childress, a 1990 winner of a Big Bass at Lake Baylor Tournament, fooled the largest bass this side of Lake Fork or Possum Kingdom. His trophy bass tipped the scales at 14.4 lbs. and should remain the lake record for the remainder of this year, but looking at the recent history of Baylor Lake, don't bet the ranch on it.

What happened at Lake Baylor and how can we make it happen to our other lakes? Number one on my list is the strict and long time length limit enforced by the Childress Anglers Association and ole "Sarge Roy Rapavi." Roy protects Baylor like it is his teenage daughter. He loves that lake, and this writer believes that the locals in Childress should give a special thanks to Roy for his years of dedicated service. Thanks to Roy, Baylor had a 12 inch limit when the so-called experts allowed 10 inch adolescents to be slaughtered. When the Texas length limit was increased to 14 inches, Baylor had a two year headstart on other local lakes.

Second on my list is the new ethic of "catch and release" practiced by many dedicated fishermen. During the eight Big Bass at Lake Baylor Tournaments, only 3 bass have been

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: The first option a taxpayer may use to protest a value is to visit with the chief appraiser or a staff member. Records on individual properties are available for review by every taxpayer. This informal review is to the benefit of the taxpayer. Many protests are resolved at this level.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a *notice of protest*) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at **709 West Seventh-P.O. Box 567**

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Deadline for filing protests with the ARB
(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

Usual deadline: June 19, 1991

Late protests (if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.)

Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

Special deadlines: June 19, 1991

Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land)

Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed)

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

Each protesting property owner may offer evidence or argument, either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing-unit spending and will not hear protests on those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled hearing date.

Peddy said that protest hearings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on July 18. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in the district remains under protest.

Property owners protesting their valuation should not attempt to contact ARB members outside the hearing, the chief appraiser stressed. Each property owner filing a protest also must sign an affidavit stating that no such contact has occurred.

The State Property Tax Board has

issued a pamphlet called "Texas Property Taxes: A Taxpayer's Guide to Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. The pamphlet is available at the Hansford County Appraisal District office. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at 709 W. 7th in Spearman, 659-5575.

AMARILLO - The Panhandle Professional Writers group has announced deadlines for its annual writing contest.

Categories are writing for children, articles, short stories, poetry and book-length manuscripts. Entries must be received by the contest chairman on or before June 15.

Awards will be announced at the annual Frontiers in Writing Conference Aug. 10 at Amarillo College.

Categories, word counts and entry fees are as follows:

Writing for Children: Maximum 1,500 words, must identify age group. Category A: Ages 4-8, Category B: Ages 9-12 and Category C: Young Adult. Two stories may be entered. An entry fee of \$5 must accompany each story.

Articles: Maximum 2,800 words, any subject. Two articles may be entered, and an entry fee of \$5 must accompany each article.

Poetry: Maximum 50 lines per poem, any form or subject. Two poems may be entered for a total entry fee of \$5.

Short stories: Maximum 3,500 words, may be short-short. Two short stories may be entered, provided an entry fee of \$5 accompanies each story.

Book-length manuscripts: Submit summary and no more than 20 pages fiction or non-fiction. Two books may be entered, and a \$10 entry fee must accompany each book.

Entries must be original work of

the contestant, and must not have been accepted for publication prior to contest deadline. Submit letter quality manuscript or copies of same. Submissions must be typed, double-spaced and on one side of white 8 1/2 x 11 paper.

Author's name must not appear on manuscript or poem. A cover sheet, listing the contest category, title of the manuscript or poem and the name of the author should accompany each entry. Title of the manuscript or poem should be on the first page of the manuscript or poem.

Each contest will be judged by a competent authority in that field. Certificates and cash prizes will be awarded. Prizes for children's stories, articles, poetry and short stories are first place, \$25; second place, \$20; and third place, \$15. Prizes for book-length manuscripts are first place, \$50; second place, \$25; and third place, \$15.

Memorial service set at Gruver FBC

He has been named "Outstanding Young Man of the Year," and has received such honors as the Texas Man of Valor Award, the Omar Bradley Award on behalf of all Vietnam veterans, and the George Washington Medal of Freedom Award. McClary was commissioned as an officer into the U.S. Marine Corps in 1967 after serving as head coach and teacher at Dixie High School in South Carolina.

On March 3, 1968, during his 19th reconnaissance mission in Vietnam,

Lt. McClary was critically wounded by an enemy attack. The devastating attack cost him an eye, his left arm, 30 reconstructive surgical operations and a full three years of hospitalization.

Despite his injuries, he never lost the determination, dedication and courage to overcome his circumstances. He speaks from personal experience when he says, "Press on, regardless."

McClary speaks over 400 times each year to business professionals, military personnel, professional athletes, college athletes and high school students. He is co-author of his autobiography entitled "Living Proof." The movie of his life story, "Portrait of an American Hero," was released in 1970.

He is married to the former Deanna Fowler and they are the parents of two daughters, Tara and Christa.

Rodeo results

GOODWELL, Okla. - One rodeo remains for this year's college rodeo schedule and with a total of 2,583 points for the year, Panhandle State University outranks the second place team of Fort Scott Community College by 1418 points.

Rodeo Coach Dr. Lynn "Doc" Gardner is pleased with the team and is looking forward to taking them to Bozeman, Mont. for the College National Finals Rodeo.

The men's team won the last two rodeos at Garden City and Fort Hays with 288 and 336 points, respectively. Tyrone Crouch, Leoti, Kan., leads the men's all-around with 555 points and Chad Hiatt, Moravia, Iowa, is second with 325 points. Kerry Pfeider, Alva, Okla., sits second for the women's all-around with 160 points.

PSU dominates the saddlebronc riding in the region with the first four places held by Cory Hughes, Burwell, Neb.; Justin Lane, Startford, Texas; Brett Crowser, Whitewood, S.D.; and

Mike Ferguson, Woodlake, Neb. Tyrone Crouch sits in sixth place with only a five point barrier. Cory Hughes won the average in saddlebronc at both rodeos in Garden City and Fort Hays.

Bareback riding is also dominated by the men of PSU with Tyrone Crouch sitting first, followed by Tommy Thompson, Natrona, Wyo., and James Travis, Cumberland, Iowa. Shawn Audrain, Fritch, Texas, holds second place in the steer wrestling with 255 points. He had a good showing at Fort Hays and won the average.

Chad Hiatt picked up another 60 points at Fort Hays in the calf roping to keep his third place standing. Hiatt is also sixth in the steer wrestling. Bullrider Oney Martinez is splitting fifth and sixth place in the regional standings with D.J. Vaughn of Fort Scott. He added another 90 points to his totals at Fort Hays by winning second in the average.

The women's team has had some tough luck the last two times out, but Kerry Pfeider added 50 points to her fourth place regional standings in barrel racing at Garden City. Tara Clark, Helena, Mont. holds second in the region in goat tying with only a 10 point margin behind the first place.

The men and women of the rodeo team have had an outstanding 1990-91 season. A lot of hard work and time, along with some luck, have gone into their efforts for the year. Panhandle State University and Dr. Gardner are very proud to have this rodeo team represent the college, and look forward to rodeo '92.

Fraud and Home Water Treatment
Consumers should beware of salespersons using free in-home tests to sell water treatment devices.

The in-home test will show minerals in your drinking water, and perhaps the acidity/alkalinity level. The testing procedures use a chemical that combines with dissolved minerals, such as calcium and magnesium, and causes them to settle to the bottom of the bottle. Keep in mind that all water, except distilled water, contains some minerals.

In general, the presence of minerals is not a health threat. In fact, many of the minerals are beneficial to the body. However, some do cause water hardness and an undesirable taste.

Another demonstration is done with a face cloth that has been previously washed. The demonstrator puts the cloth and a water softening agent into a jar of tap water and shakes it vigorously. Suds will occur in the bottle, but this is normal because some detergent residue remains in all washed articles.

These free in-home "water quality tests" are merely sales ploys designed to sell you a water treatment system. Often the "test report" on your tap water is given in a way that implies that your water contains a lot of minerals that are not good for your family's health.

People who do the home testing usually require that both spouses of a married couple be present for the demonstration. This prevents one spouse from using a delaying tactic by insisting on talking to the other spouse before making a decision to buy a water treatment system.

The Electric Precipitator
Some unethical sales operators use a more dramatic demonstration with an "electric precipitator" to test drinking water. This machine resembles a coffee pot in which two metallic electrodes (metal rods) are placed.

The demonstration produces a dark sludge, which is caused by electricity decomposing the rods. The electric precipitator device is a sham, but a convincing sales tool because of its visual shock effect. Impressive demonstrations, such as these, often are directed to low-income and non-English speaking families. High pressure selling tactics are used to convince people to buy.

Taste and Appearance Vs. Health Concerns

Claims that a water treatment device can improve the taste of your water may be accurate. Also, softened water can save some energy in heating of the water and will require less detergent for laundry. However, the claims about saving hundreds of dollars in laundry and water heating costs because minerals are removed is probably an exaggeration.

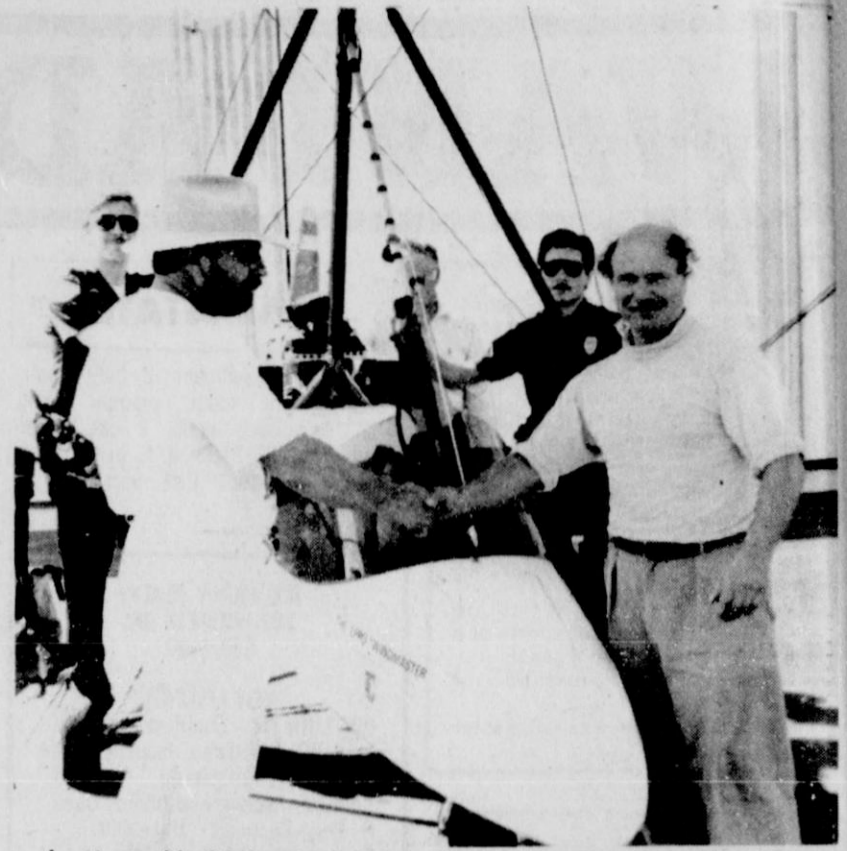
Harmful contaminants in water are more difficult to test for than the common minerals in tap water. For example lead is odorless, colorless and tasteless. Tests for lead, and most other contaminants which are health concerns, require special equipment and complex procedures. Tests for most potentially harmful water contaminants cannot be done in your home.
