County, Texas, 100 miles northwest of Fort Worth, He was the e mitth of 11 children borm
to Rufus and Sally Harris Vaught. Vaught's Worth. He was the sixth of 13 children borm
to Rufus and Sally Harris Vaught. Vaught's
father was a atall, reserved man of Viking father was a tall, reserved man of Viking
ancestry. His mother was English. They ancestry. His mother was English. They
were ranchers with 640 acres of land spotted with mesquite trees, cactus and scarcely enough grass for the cattle.
Vaught first saw a football game at age 14. At 15 , Vaught moved to Fort Worth where he lived wath a arandmother. There, he rried out for high
school football and immediately became one of the better players. He also excelled in the classroomem, eanning class valedictorian honors his senior Vaught played as a football collegian at Texa
1930-32. He was All-America at guard in 1932, captain of a Southwest
Conference championship team that season and Conference championship team that season, and was All-SWC for two
seasons. He majored in business and graduated with honors in three and a half years.
Years later, his playing abilities got him into the Texas Hall of Fame When the National College Football Hall of Fame asked him if he wanted to be named as a coach or a player. Vaugh
ing he has in the Mississippi Hall of Fame.
But the love affair with coaching took a

Cost-Share Signup Deadline Nears
The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has set the
signup deadline for the 2006 Environmental Quality Incentive Program signup deadline for the 2000 E Environmental Quality Incentive Program
(EQPP). The application deadline for the 2006 program year is February
17. 2006 . Aplications from ind 17, 2006. Applications from individual landowners interested in participating in the EQIP during the 2006 program year must be received by
February 17 in order to be considered this year. This will be the last costshare funds available until approximately early-spring of next year. EQIP can provide financial assistance of up to 50 percent of the cost of water and related natural resource concems on their lands. EOIP is a voluntary program and is designed to assist farmers and ranchers with placing natural resource conservation practices on their property. Cost share is plan designed with the assistance of local NRCS staff. Cost share practices include irrigation management equipment, placement of appropriate structural or vegetative practices, such as animal waste management faci-
ties, brush control, livestock pipelines and watering facilities vegetative ities, brush control, livestock pipelines and watering facilities, vegetative
buffers, and wildlife habitat enhancement, to name a few. Eligible practices will depend on the location of the farm or ranch on which the prac-
tice is to be installed and the major resource concern to be addressed in ice is to be installed and the major resource concern to be addressed in
that particular area. Information on eligible cost share practices and major resource concerns of an area can be secured from your local NRCS field years and include incentive payments to assist with implementation of and management practices, such as nutrient management and grazing
