## The City of Perryton has a popu

 ation of approximately 7459 people. or that number of people we have process all of the waste water produced by this municipality. This consists of a water treatment plant and two large lagoon type pits located east of the city limits. Neither of these two pits are equipped with any type of a liner other than natural soils. No aeration takes place and no chemicals or additives are introduced into the water once it reaches these lagoons. There is also no noticeable odor that emits nent facilities. However no raw ewage is ever introduced into eiher of these two pits.Before any of the waste water reaches this destination all of plant first. Anything that comes into the plant passes through larifier which separates the solids from the liquids, the solids then continue on through a digester ids, on the other hand, pass hrough a trickling filter equipped with a zooglio mass which basically is an animal bacteria which breaks down and removes all food from the liquids. Only after all of this takes place are the liquids considered to e safe enough to be introduced into the open air lagoons, and even at that, the treated water is still no onsidered safe enough to be used Are all of these restrictions neces sary? Why are they imposed on our citizens? Why are we forced to pay tility bills to financed all of this treatment? Why can't we simply ush the waste water into an open air pit, allow it to dry out, and then use it as fertilizer? It would be much cheaper and we all know that manure is rich in nitrogen. What protect?

The training, which is interesting and readily comprehended, is brief. On your first few times of service, an experienced volunteer will go with you to hold your hand. You
