

Time Nears For School Board, City Positions

Those wishing to enter races for school board positions in Spearman, Gruver, or Morse or elected city officials of Spearman or Gruver should note the March 20 deadline for applications.

In the Spearman School District, two seats, each of three-year terms, currently held by Mark Allen and Carol Dunihoo, will be decided. In the Gruver School District, two seats currently held by Jody Irwin and Terry Sherrill are expiring. In the Morse School District, three positions cur rently held by Monty Dixon Lonnie Clemmons, and Alan Leach, will be decided.

Gruver City Commission has one seat, now held by Chad Logsdon, expiring while the City of Spearman has the seats of two aldermen, Donald E. Reed and Charles Elliott, expiring, and the term of mayor Steve Benton, also expiring.

Both the school board and city elections will be held May 4th. Early voting by person will begin April 17 and continue through April 30.

Hansford County Library **Receives Grant**

The Hansford County Library has been chosen as one of only two recipients statewide to receive the 2002 Christina B. Woll Memorial Fund grant.

This year, the grant committee chose one school library and one public library to be awarded one of these grants. These libraries, who serve children 12 or under, have demonstrated a commitment to providing a collection of quality children's literature and have a need to develop or enhance a particular part of their overall collection. Sheri Benton, Director of the Hansford County Library, wrote the grant application last fall requesting funds to purchase a new set of books about the fifty states.

"There are two different elementary grades in which the students are assigned reports on a particular state," stated Benton. "This set of books will help these students obtain the information that they need for these reports."

The set of books that will be purchased is published by Lerner Publishing and has been recently updated. Beginning in the fall of 2001, all fifty states, Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico, will be revised, reviewed and brought up to date so that no copyright will be older than 2001. These new editions will include such things as fun facts, places to visit, annual events, outstanding natives and even websites on each state.

The Christina B. Woll Memorial Fund was established through the Texas Library Association to perpetuate Christina's love of reading and her commitment to providing quality literature for children.

Christina was instrumental in the establishment of the Texas Bluebonnet Award reading program and served as its coordinator for many years. This program was established in 1979 to encourage Texas children to read more books, explore a variety of current books, develop powers of discrimination and identify their favorite books.

Touched By An 'Angel' While Sally Vaquera described her family's life as 'boring,' television viewers across the nation might describe Jose (Angel)'s story as inspir-

Under the title "When Words Aren't Needed," the story of Angel Vaquera's life was televised nationally last week on the Friday edition of "The Early Show, " "CBS Evening News with Dan Rather," and "The Saturday Early Show.'

"They did a very good job," Sally said. "We felt the story was very accurate.

Each essay must be tion. more than 1,000 words but fewer than 1,500 words in length and must be typewritten and double-spaced. The essays will be judged on accuracy of information, originality, neatness, arrangement, subject matter, grammar and spelling. Additional points are awarded for each applicant's scholastic record, school activities, community involvement and future plans.

All essays must be received by the District Office located at 603 E. First (P.O Box 795) in Dumas by 5 p.m. on April 2, 2001. Any essay which is found to be a resubmission of a previous winning essay will be disqualified.

The prizes to be awarded are as follows: 1st place \$1000 scholarship per year for 4 years = \$4000 total award amount; 2nd place - \$750 scholarship per year for 4 years = \$3000 total award amount; 3rd place - \$500 scholarship per year for 4 years = \$2000 total award amount.

These scholarships are to be paid to the college of the winner's choice and applied toward his/her education initial scholarship Each amount award will be renewable for three additional years as long as a minimum of a 2.75 Grade Point Average and 12 course hours per semester are maintained.

Any students who are interested in entering the contest may obtain additional contes and resource information from the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District.

Teacher 'Schooled' In World's Classrooms

Expecting the unexpected has come to be the norm in the teaching career of 1985 Spearman graduate Jeffrey Gressett.

While the first day of school is usually a day of organization and introductions, Gressett's first day of sixth grade special education at Florence Nightingale Middle School in Los Angeles was more like a suspense movie.

"The principal came over the intercom during fifth period to tell us that the school was going into a lockdown mode, and each teacher should lock his classroom door," Gressett said.

The principal went on to say that the doors must not be opened even for parents who might be coming to pick up their children.

'About ten minutes later, one of my students got up from his seat and walked around the room. When the boy looked out the window of the second story classroom, he shouted to tell class members there was a shoot-out at the Burger King across the street from the school," Gressett said.

As Gressett and his class watched from the window of their classroom, police were aiming shotguns in the direction of the restaurant.

Again the principal spoke on the intercom telling all teachers and students to stay away from the windows.

'At first, I took the whole situation in stride - even when the sixth period bell rang, and I had to continue to hold my class during my conference time," Gressett added. However, when the bell rang to signal the end of the day, and students were continuing to be held in their classrooms, Gressett became somewhat frustrated.

Twenty minutes later, the all clear signal was issued, allowing the students to go home for the day.

"It was a really interesting first day of school," Gressett said in understatement.

Little did the Spearman grad know, the events of that first day may have just been a sneak preview for what was to come.

Incidents involving guns and drug busts and another during which a faculty member shouted profanities at students were some of the occurrences during the school year yet even those paled in comparison to an event late in the school year.

"One of the students, running

from his classroom, shouted to me to call 911 as there was a bomb in his classroom." Gressett said.

Grabbing his cell phone, Gressett called campus police who arrived ten minutes later. Upon the arrival of campus and city police, the building was evacuated as officials looked for the reported bomb.

It was the next day, Gressett learned the difference in a bomb and a booby trap.

"The device found proved to be a booby trap which had been made from gasoline in a 3-liter bottle with a plastic flower hanging out of the opening. If a kid had pulled the flower out of the bottle, a ball of fire would have been triggered," Gressett said.

At the end of the school year, which Gressett believed to be more positive than negative, the Spearman grad began a new teaching assignment in Saudi Arabia. As an English teacher for the Aramco Oil Company, he was hired to teach English to Saudi employees of the company.

Living Udhailiyah, Saudi Arabia, one to the world's largest oil headquarters, Gressett was a newcomer to the area on September 11, 2001. "I had just finished my work for

the day and had returned home when my British roommate informed me of the accident at the World Trade Center," Gressett said.

The two men tuned into a live news story on the British Broadcasting Company just before the second plane hit the second tower.

"My first thoughts were for the safety of my sister who works in Amarillo near Pantex. I called her first and told her to leave as I was afraid Pantex might be the target of another attack. After that, I called my parents to let them know of my safety." Gressett said.

While Gressett's family expressed their fear at his being in a Muslim area, Gressett, himself felt very safe.

"I don't think the terrorists are going to be concerned with one individual. They will strike somewhere that is heavily populated or will have a great impact." Gressett said. He feels the Coca-Cola conglomerate offices in Atlanta might be a future target since Coke is an international symbol of capitalism or Las Vegas, Nevada which repre-sents all the Muslims oppose.

In the weeks following the

attacks, Gressett received hundreds of expressions of sympathy from the Saudis with whom he works or met on the street yet he chose not to talk of the 9-11 events in his classroom.


The event, however, did surface in a most unusual way. As Gressett was informing a student one day of his displeasure with his performance on a paper, the student, who was a distant cousin of one of the terrorists killed in the attack and also shared the same last name, retorted, "Be nice to me, or I will tell my cousin where you live!"

Knowing his response to the statement would set the tone for his relationship with his class, Gressett replied "Do your paper correctly, or you will visit your cousin where he is!"

Eliciting laughter from the class, the tension was diffused, and the subject quickly dismissed.

For Gressett, the surprising statement by the Saudi was just part the unexpected he has learned to expect in his continuing education as a teacher.

Blowin' In The Wind

Today's column will discuss all of the mills that are up in Spearman as of today, Sunday, March 3, 2002 that I know about. I also want to look forward to future mills that I know about or can mills that I know about or can project to be completed by June, 2002. I have also heard of an indi-vidual or two preparing to erect

their own mills. Southwestern Pioneer The Windmill Association has erected twenty-one mills in Spearman, one at Mr. Buchanan's farm, and one mill on a trailer for a total of twenty-three mills. There are twelve mills in the park in southwest Spearman, one at the corner of the SWPA's barn, and eight other mills located throughout Spearman. Those eight mills are the Eli at Prairie Motors, the Woodmanse and cable tower at First National Bank, the Chandler at Lowes, a Woodmanse Airmaster at North Plains Insurance, the Fairbury 7AA at R & R RV Park, the Elgin Hummer at Crazy Corner, the Dempster at First State Bank, and the Aermotor east of the high school.

In addition there are at least 5 mills owned by individuals and one at the museum for a total of twenty-seven windmills in Spearman. I am proud for Spearman to have this many mills with about three months to the

International Trade Fair in Spearman June 5-8, 2002. It is also my observation that there seems to be enough wind to go around. I don't believe that Spearman has diverted more than its share.

There are four mills at the wind-mill barn that have been restored by Walter Woolley and Julian Villarreal. When warmer weather with hopefully less wind gets here. those mills will be put up. One is an Elgin Wonder mill, Model B, that will go on an Elgin tower in the Windmill Park, another is a Star mill, another is a New Elgin mill, and the fourth is an 8-foot Challenge. Those four mills will put us close to that magic number of thirty.

Also in the plans are a Duplex mill which is a very colorful umbrella mill. The mill is presently in restoration by Terry Schneider. Parts are yet to be obtained to finish the mill plus the wooden part of the wheel and the tower must be built. It is planned for the mill to be located at Golden Spread Sales Co. Also projected for completion are a Star and an Eclipse from Mr. Buchanan's collection, a Perkins mill, a Dempster umbrella, and an Easy mill. The Easy so far has done its best not to live up to its name. Nothing about its restoration yet has been Easy but maybe it will get less difficult. Also the SPWA is awaiting completion of a John Deere mill that will go where else but at Hansford Implement.

So, it is possible to project about thirty-five mills for Spearman by June of 2002.

Now, to other plans for the Windmillers' Trade Fair. Sales of

bricks and tiles have been good, and construction of the entrance to the J. B. Buchanan Windmill Park is to begin soon. Sponsors for banquets, entertainment, windmill parts trading and auction, trip to Adobe Walls, and other plans are being firmed up.

So far, I have not been able to prove that Boss Neff of Hooker, Oklahoma carefully printed the early day Brand Book at No Man's Land Museum in Goodwell, Oklahoma but several things point to him as the author. The author needed to have lived past the time that Gruver and Morse became towns in Hansford County, as they are both used as reference points Boss, who came from Ohio to the Panhandle in the early spring of 1883, died in 1947. He was very interested in the history of the area in his later years and could be considered the father of the Goodwell Museum. In his will he left his estate to be divided in 9 shares -- a share for each of his 8 children and an equal share for the Museum.

He wrote of his experiences in Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle as a gift for a grandson. John McCarty, editor and associate publisher of the Amarillo Globe-News edited and published them. They were then published in a book in 1941.

In the brand book, O.L. Muller is listed at Preacher Draw, Caple, Okla. In the book Boss tells of a preacher named Miller living on the Hackberry Creek where a long arroyo junctured with the Hackberry opposite to his dugout. He had a very nice young wild cow that he was afraid of at milking time when she was in the pen. Boss traded him a lame, gentle caw for her and both were happy. Boss and Tom Ward were baching at this point, and they named the arroyo Preacher Draw.
