Injured Bull Rider Returns Home



Evan Schmidt, 18, was transported by Medivac helicopter to Amarillo Friday evening, July 19, after being injured at the Gruver Cowboyfest Rodeo. He returned home from the hospital on Monday evening.

Schmidt, a 2002 graduate of Gruver High School, sustained head injuries, near the end of his eight second bull ride. He was treated by EMS personnel at the scene and was taken by ambulance to Hansford Hospital where the Medivac helicopter was summoned to transport him

His injuries were described as bruises to the brain and a deep cut inside his mouth. A CAT scan on Monday revealed that nearly all blood on the brain had been reabsorbed, and Schmidt was released later that day

Schmidt has been a competitor in the Tri State High School Rodeo Association throughout his high school career. He recently competed in the Texas State High School Rodeo where he was named Rookie of the Year and narrowly missed advancing to the national high school finals in bull riding. He will attend Frank Phillips College where he will be a

Three-Day Sales Tax Holiday Nears A Message from Carole Keeton Rylander

SERVING HANSFORD COUNTY SINCE 1907

This year's sales tax holiday for clothing and footwear begins at 12:01 .m. on Friday, August 2, and ends at midnight on Sunday, August 4 The tax break is expected to save Texas consumers millions in state and local sales taxes. This is one time hard-working Texans can keep their money in their pockets for their families' priorities.

Since its inception, I have been a strong advocate for the sales tax holiday. Therefore, I am pleased to do my part to ensure the success of this year's tax holiday. I have enclosed a list of items for a quick reference and a flyer that you can post in a prominent place in your store in

advance of the tax holiday.

Because not every possible item that qualifies for the exemption could fit on the list, it is not a complete list. Please call my office at 1-800 252-5555, if you have questions about items that you do not see listed

Here are some highlights about the sales tax holiday: * The tax holiday occurs every year on the first Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of August. Qualifying items are exempt from state sales taxes and exempt from local sales taxes unless a city chooses not to participate. This year no cities opted out of the holiday; thus, qualifying items will be fully exempt from tax.

* Most clothing and footwear that is priced at less than \$100 will be exempt from sales tax. Customers will receive the break on individual items, regardless of the amount they buy. For example, sales tax is not due if a customer buys six shirts that are each priced at under \$100. But, the full tax is due on a shirt that is sold for \$110; the first \$99.99 can-

* Clothing and footwear that are used primarily for athletic activities or for protective wear are not eligible for the exemption. Customers buying golf cleats and football pads, for instance, must pay sales tax Athletic wear that is also used for participation in other non-athletic activities can qualify for tax exemption. For example, tennis shoes

baseball caps, and jogging suits are worn during everyday activities and thus may be purchased tax free during the holiday.

* Also excluded from the sales tax holiday are accessories, such as jewelry and watches; items that are carried rather than worn, including handbags, briefcases, and wallets; and clothing rentals, such as formal wear and costume rentals and repairs and alterations.

Sales Tax Holiday Tax-Free Items: Baby clothes, Bathing suits, Belts with attached buckles, Boots (cowboy, hiking), Caps/hats (baseball, fishing, golf, knitted), Choir robes, Coats and wraps, Costumes, Diapers (adult and baby), Dresses, Gloves (generally), Gym suits and uniforms, Hooded shirts and hooded sweatshirts, Hosiery, Jackets Jeans, Jerseys (baseball and football), Jogging apparel (bras, suits shorts), Neckwear and ties, Pajamas, Pants and trousers, Raincoats and ponchos, Robes, Shirts, Shoes (sandals, slippers, sneakers, tennis, walking), Socks (including athletic), Shorts, Suits, Slacks, Jackets, Sweatshirts, Sweat suits, Sweaters, Swim suits and trunks, Underwear, Work clothes and uniforms

Work clothes and uniforms

Sales Tax Holiday Taxable Items: Accessories (generally - barrettes, elastic pony tail holders, wallets, watches), Backpacks, Baseball cleats and pants, Belt buckles (without belt), Boots (climbing, fishing, rubber work boots, ski, waders), Buttons and zippers, Cloth and lace, knitting yarns and other fabrics, Dry cleaning services, Football pants, Golf gloves, Handbags and purses, Handkerchiefs, Hard hats, Helmets (bike, baseball, football, hockey, motorcycle, sports), Ice skates, Jewelry, Laundering services, Leather goods - except belts and wearing apparel, Pads-football, hockey, soccer, elbow, knee, shoulder, Personal flotation Pads-football, hockey, soccer, elbow, knee, shoulder, Personal flotation devices, Rented clothing-uniforms, formal wear, costumes, Roller blades and skates, Safety clothing, glasses, Shoes (bicycle (cleated), bowling, golf), Wallets, Watches.

A friend of mine sent me the following story about "Social Security and Senators." I found it very interesting, and thought you might also. (This is especially interesting in light of recent activities with the stock market, as well as the raise that the Senate voted on for themselves.)

Social Security

Perhaps we are asking the wrong questions during election years. Our Senators and Congressmen do not pay into Social Security and, of course, they do not collect from it. Social Security benefits were not suitable for persons of their rare elevation in society. They felt they should have a special plan for themselves. Many years ago they voted in their own benefit plan. In more recent years, no congress person has felt the need to change it. After all, it is a great plan.

For all practical purposes THEIR plan works like this: When they retire, they continue to draw the same pay until they die, except it may increase from time to time for cost of living adjustments. For example, former Senator Byrd and Congressman White and their wives may expect to draw \$7,800,000.00 (that's Seven Million, Eight-Hundred Thousand), with their wives drawing \$275,000.00 during the last years of their lives. This is calculated on an average life span for each. Their cost for this excellent plan is \$00.00.

Nada. Zilch. This little perk they voted for themselves is free to them. You and I pick up the tab for this plan. The funds for this fine retirement plan come directly from the General Funds--our tax dollars at work!

From our own Social Security Plan, which you and I pay (or have paid) into-every payday until we retire (which amount is matched by our employer)--we can expect to get an average \$1,000 per month after retirement. Or, in other words, we would have to collect our average of \$1,000. monthly benefits for 68 years and one (1) month to equal Bradley's benefits!

Social Security could be very good if only one small change were made. And that change would be to jerk the Golden Fleece Retirement Plan from under the Senators and Congressmen. Put them into the Social Security plan with the rest of us and then watch how fast they would fix it.



2002 Beef Cattle Short Course Slated

Top national speakers, including Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs and Linda Logan, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, headline this year's Beef Cattle Short Course Aug. 5-7 at Texas A&M University.

Speakers will discuss current technical trends, Texas beef making marketing programs, animal diseases and related issues, said Dr. Larry Boleman, coordinator of the event

For \$100 per participant, producers can receive the latest information, the proceedings, several meals including a prime rib dinner, and trade show and industry mate-

Logan will be on hand to advise beef producers on the current status of tuberculosis in Texas and its marketing implications. Additionally, other threatening diseases, like chronic wasting disease, as well as Texas emergency disease preparation and biosecuri-ty issues will be discussed.

Other speakers at the 2002 Beef Cattle Short Course include Paul Hitch, Hitch Enterprises, Inc., Guymon Okla.; John Patterson, beef specialist, Montana State University; Dave Nichols, Nichols Farms, Bridgewater, Iowa, and David Coronna, National Cattlemen's Beef Association's marketing program.

"The Beef Cattle Short Course is a leader in producer education and is designed to bring the latest information, issues and industry changes to producers so that they can evaluate and adapt to the latest issues for greater and quicker monetary returns to their operations,"Boleman said.

Producers can personalize their own training by selecting from the concurrent training sessions in grazing management workshops, breeds and sire selections, and management concepts for increasing immunity in calves. In-depth, hands-on reproductive training with bulls and cows will also be offered, as well as sessions on record-keeping systems and financial management, cattle working demonstrations with emphasis and a basic ranch management session for beginning or novice ranch owners.

Boleman also endourages participants to attend the Cattleman's College at the Texas A&M Campus on Aug. 5.

The University's Department of


