Gibson-Salgado Completes Training

Cheryl Gibson-Salgado, City Secretary, City of Spearman, graduated from the Texas Municipal Clerks Certification Program on January 13, 2000.

Graduates complete approximately 200 hours of individual study over a four-course curriculum and attend eight two-day seminars for an additional 100 hours of classroom study. The curriculum includes selected texts and a number of special readings on the topics of public administration, election law, budgeting and finance, municipal law, and personnel management.

The Texas Municipal Clerks Certification Program, located at the University of North Texas, Denton, Texas, as a universitylevel professional education program for city clerks and city secretaries in Texas. The program is the third oldest of thirty-three such programs in the country.

The Certification Program is recognized and endorsed by Section 22.074 of the Local Government Code, Vernon's Texas Codes Annotated. In 1984, the College Board selected the Texas Municipal Clerks Certification Program as one of sixty-four exemplary professional development programs in the United States.

Texas Registered Municipal Clerks are recognized for their achievements and contributions to effective, efficient local government by their mayors, city administrators, city councils, and the citizens of their communities.

Grain Elevator Workshop

Preparations to handle this year's crops are already underway by the grain storage industry. That's why the Tri-State Chapter of Grain Elevator and Processing Society in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring the 2000

Grain Elevator Workshop.

The February 17th event will be held at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. Leading the agenda are presentations on biotech crop acceptance, hantavirus, herbicide and pesticide safety issues, automated aeration,

bird problems, and industry regulations. Registration is \$25 and begins at 8 a.m. Pre-registration by February 4th is encouraged.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has approved five continuing education units (CEUs) for commercial, non-commercial and private pesticide applicators.

This is the twelfth year of the workshop, according to Carl Patrick, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who is a key organizer of the event. The program was initially organized through an integrated pest management (IPM) special

projects educational grant from U.S. Department of Agriculture-Extension Service.

"The workshop has been selfsupporting since 1989 due to the enthusiastic support by the Texas High Plains stored grain industry," Patrick added.

The program starts at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 3:45 p.m. The workshop will adjourn following the evaluation and CEU certification for applicators. To register and obtain information, call Patrick at (806) 359-5401.

District UIL Realignment

The 2000-2002 University Interscholastic League (UIL) district realignment which was released on Tuesday morning brought surprises to both Spearman and Gruver.

While Gruver schools were anticipating changes in District 1-A, it was Spearman's district (5-AA) that resulted in the greatest changes.

As Spearman had been one of six teams in district 5-AA, they moved to district 6-AA. This districtict has been expanded to include these eight teams: Amarillo Highland Park, Canadian, Clarendon, Panhandle, Spearman, Stinnett West Texas, Sunray, Wellington

Gruver's 1-A, football district will include Gruver, Claude, Wheeler, Booker, Shamrock, and former AA school, White Deer. In basketball, district 1-A will include only four teams - Booker, Gruver, and two teams dropping from 2-A districts, Stratford and Boys Ranch.

Coaches and principals from both Spearman and Gruver were in Amarillo Tuesday to plan district schedules for the 2000-2001 school year and were unavailable for comments.

Local reaction to the district changes on Tuesday morning at Spearman High School was "shocking" according to high school secretary, Lisa Pipkin. Concern was expressed by many over the distance the district encompassed. Many especially felt it would be challenging during basketball season when games are played on school nights. The increase from six to eight of teams in Spearman's district was also a great surprise.

After anticipating a great deal of change, Gruver found the only change in their football district was the replacement of Memphis with former AA school, White Deer.

Gruver's basketball district held more surprises with former AA schools, Boys Ranch and Stratford, replacing Wheeler and Shamrock. Gruver residents were quick to note that there would be only three girls teams in the new district since Boys Ranch only has a junior varsity girls teams. Many wondered how the Lady Hounds would be affected by having only two teams with which to compete at district level.

Hansford Hospice will host an organizational meeting for a proposed Bereavement Support Group, February 7, 7:00 p.m. in the Parlor of First United Methodist Church in Spearman. The facilitator will be Ken Cole, Pastor.

This meeting will determine if there are those in our communities who would benefit from such a group meeting together to share their experiences of grief. One of the tragedies in our society today is that many bereaved family members and friends experience their grief alone. They may hide their true feelings of grief as it manifests itself in individual ways. Yet together they may realize they are not alone in these feelings and may help someone else just as they are being helped through their grief.

It may help to become involved with a group of persons having similar experiences, sharing eases loneliness and promotes the expression of grief in an atmosphere of acceptance and understanding. 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
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Superintendent's Corner

One of the issues being addressed at the campus and district level is how to be prepared when dealing with a crisis that might happen at school. Recently, I heard an expert say that there are two types of schools - one is a school that has had a crisis and the other is a school that is going to have a crisis.

My wife (a counselor at West Texas High School) recently brought back a book from a counselors convention for me to read. The book, written by Dr. James Garbarino, is entitled Lost Boys: Why Our Sons Turn Violent and How We Can Save Them. Since we are in the process of developing crisis management plans for our campuses, I thought this might be a good book to read to help me better understand the issues and problems surrounding violence at school.

The issue of school violence is not new; however, it was earlier centered in the ghetto areas of large schools in big cities. With recent school shootings in the American Midwest (Jonesboro, Paducah. and Columbine) these acts of violence are now being committed by white males in small towns or in the suburbs. According to Dr. James Garbarino, "When white middle-class kids kill, there is always a public outcry of why and a search for what went wrong, but when inter-school minority kids kill, the public is warned of demons and superpredators.'

Dr. Garbarino's book focuses on a study of a wide range of youth committing acts of violence and ponders reasons and seeks solutions. From recent shootings in Springfield, Oregon, Jonesboro, Arkansas and Paducah, Kentucky, two warning signs emerged. These signs are depression and kids being picked on by other kids. Although these signs may be common in school and society, they do not imply that all kids with these problems will commit murder or other acts of violence. What this says is that when a child is overwhelmed and can not find a way out they often turn to acts of violence to solve their problems.

The lesson at Springfield and Columbine is that others knew of the acts these boys planned to commit but for whatever reason did not believe them and failed to tell someone. We are going to have to be better listeners and stop these acts of violence before they occur.

It appears that with the moral decay of our society, children are coming to school in far greater numbers from neglected or from abusive homes. What they need to find in school are adults that care. In Lost Boys, Dr. Garbarino says, 'At the heart of the matter is whether a young child is connected rather than abandoned, accepted rather than rejected, and nurtured rather than neglected." If kids don't find these positive connections at home or school they are going to gravitate to those who will accept them such as gangs and the criminal element of our society. These kids want to desperately be accepted and to belong. As parents it is important that we know our kids friends and where they are at all times. We have got to spend more time talking with our kids and exploring their feelings and offer support rather than criticism.

Some of you may be aware of Abraham Maslow's theory of human needs. He theorizes that until a lower need such as physiological, safety and belongingness (love) are met that you can never obtain the high needs of self-actualization (realizing one's potential). At school we are going to have to make sure these lower needs are being met before we can expect a child to learn. We are going to have to accept the fact that for some children we are the determining factor on whether or not they succeed in school and in life! We should not be the problem but rather one of the solutions.

I think the frustration that teachers have is that which was once expected to be taken care of at home is now the responsibility of the school. One of the biggest changes I have seen over the past twenty years is the enormous amount of supplemental curriculum that we are expected to teach. With the crunch on accountability and a return to basics many educators are struggling with time to meet the many needs of the students they teach. Is the answer more kid advocates such as counselors who can listen to kids (a full-time counselor at the junior high level is an issue that I think we are going to have to address in Spearman) or is the answer new curriculum focusing on character development?

In the State of the Union address, this past week President Clinton said that one goal is that kids should come to school ready to learn and graduate ready to succeed. What is it going to take for this to happen? Our kids should be the most important part of our lives. We are going to have to make more time for our children and provide positive connections to help them feel important and not

I was recently given the following journal written from one of our students.

I'm like a book since I'm always out of the fun. And it seems that I'm just sitting on a shelf. Waiting for someone to ask me to go play some sport or something. The only people at my house that talk to me is my mother, grandmother and cousin. Not my dad since he's always working and when he's there he seems to be tired. A few of the kids don't like me. They are always pushing me around, rejecting me and telling me that I should just move. It's not easy being a forgotten book on a shelf. At least I have a few friends - for which I am

These words written by one of our students breaks my heart; however, I am reminded of Guy Doud former National Teacher of the Year. Guy said that when he knew

of a student having troubles, he would sit in that student's desk before school and pray that he might say and do the right things to help reach that student. I guess what impressed me most of what he believes is the statement, "I don't teach a subject, I teach kids!" Oh how true! Isn't that what we all want - someone to care about us

and not judge us for our faults. I guess that is why I have always believed that my main responsibility as an educator is that of 'encouragement." How far a kind word can go. I may not like what they do, but that doesn't mean I don't like them. This "tough love" means I do not have to accept their actions but rather that I have a moral obligation to teach them what is right and what is wrong. Accepting responsibilities for their actions is the first step in showing kids how to solve life's problems.

Schools alone can not solve the problem of violence and should not have to. A quote from an old African proverb says it takes a village to raise a child. Not until the entire community believes that all of our children deserve the best and are willing to provide them with a supportive environment can we hope to conquer this problem. We must together seek solutions. I hope as we develop our crisis management plans that we can truly address how to deal with a crisis when it happens, but we should also explore how to identify and solve these problems before they become a crisis. Yes, today in Spearman, Texas there are children in our community struggling to

Mallards, pin tails, and coots are abundant at the Lake, but this week an uncommon duck, the canvasback, showed up. This male duck has a chestnut red head and white back coupled with a unique head profile that makes it stand out. The gently sloping forehead extends into a long black

This week Eastern Bluebirds were seen, as well as the usual Mountain Bluebirds. The blue of the Eastern is brighter and contrasts nicely with the bright brickred throat and breast.

A flock of Cedar Waxwings were seen clumped together in one of the ash trees at the office. By using the scope Jim and Joan could see the little bits of red on the tails and wings. These sleek crested birds are a lovely sight.

This week a break came in the search for the Newell Stockade on the Palo Duro. T. J. Bergin remembered his grandmother Jennie Jones telling him stories of the Indians passing through their

ranch and of an old saloon and store on the creek below where they built their corrals. Later T. J.'s cousin, Ramona Reynolds, added some details that her father Tom Jones had told her.

The location, although fairly close to the creek, was on a slight knoll, and she didn't think it had ever been under water when the creek flooded. She also said there were 3 graves in the area that had been lost, and that there were a few dugouts fairly close

As we searched for the Stockade, we also searched for a settlement called Palo Duro that was written up in the Dodge City Times in September of 1 877 by a man called Old Cactus. "The little town of Palla Dora is situated 21 miles north of Adaby Walls, on the straight road to Lakin [Kansas], on the A.T.&S.F.R.R. and about 75 miles from that station. The Palla Dora creek settlement is rapidly increasing, and there is a splendid opening for stores in this settlement, as well as at Adobe Walls. Any enterprising man could make a fortune in a short time with but small capital to start with."

In 1991 the Family Land Heritage Program of the Texas Department of Agriculture recognized the Jones ranches for being in the families for a 100 years or





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

Windbreak Tree Sale

Windbreaks are the natural way to improve the value of your land and to protect your investments. The Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) presently is conducting its annual Tree Windbreak Sales Program. Native windbreak trees are available to landowners at a nominal Ranchers, farmers, and homeowners can benefit greatly from properly designed and wellmaintained tree windbreaks.

'Such windbreaks help block icy winds, common to the Texas Panhandle, stated Richard Bennett, Resource Conservationist with the local NRCS office. There has been great interest in the past few years in the establishment of tree windbreaks both for protection from the winds and or mprovement of native wildlife habitats.

He continued, "trees are available for any landowner interested in establishing a windbreak. now being accepted for delivery in

Bennett explained, "Windbreaks can reduce heating and cooling costs by as much as 1 5 percent. They reduce air currents by diverting most of the wind over the tops of the trees. For example, a well mph wind to 10 to 15 mph." He continued, "at a temperature of 10

legrees, this means a change in the wind chill factor from about minus 33 degrees to about a minus 10 degrees. If these wind barriers are properly designed and maintained, they can protect life and property for more than 40 years.

Tree windbreaks should be planted on the north, west, and south sides of the areas to be protected to provide protection for the areas prevailing winds. When selecting species, consideration should be given to the mature height of the species planted. The height of the tallest tree will determine the extent of the area to be protected. Wind velocities are reduced to about 50 percent to a distance ten time the height, of the windbreaks. These trees are purchased from the Texas Forrest Service then resold to landowners at a nominal price. A total of 30 different varieties are available including: Eastern Red Cedar, Rocky Mountain Junipers, a couple varieties of Pines, Honey

Catalpa, Native Plums, and Nanking Cherry. Wildlife packets also are available, which include species those designed to attract deer, quail, turkey, pheasants, and squirrel. Prices are \$30 for 50 hardwoods and \$52 for 30 ever-




