
their husbands return. The mood of the play is a combination of drama and comedy.





Someone recently e-mailed me the following story. I really enjoyed it, and thought you might, too. I think we all need to be "Ugly."

A Cat Named "Ugly"

Everyone in the development knew who Ugly was. Ugly was the res-ident tomcat. Ugly loved three things in this world: fighting, eating garbage, and shall we say, love. The combination of these things com-

bined with a life spent outside had their effect on Ugly. To start with, he had only one eye, and where the other should have been there was a gaping hole. He was also missing his ear on the same side, his left foot had appeared to have been badly broken at one time, and had healed at an unnatural angle, making him look like he was always turning the corner. His tail had long ago been lost, leaving only the smallest stub, which he would constantly jerk and twitch.

Every time someone saw Ugly there was the same reaction. "That's one UGLY cat!!"

All the children were warned not to touch him. The adults threw rocks at him, hosed him down, squirted him when he tried to come into their homes, or shut his paws in the door when he would not leave. Ugly always had the same reaction. If you turned the hose on him, he would stand there, getting soaked until you gave up and quit. If you threw things at him, he would curl his lanky body around your feet in forgiveness

Whenever he spied children, he would come running, meowing frantically and bump his head against their hands, begging for their love. If ever you picked him up, he would immediately begin suckling on your shirt, ears, or whatever he could find.

One day, Ugly shared his love with the neighbor's huskies. They did not respond kindly, and Ugly was badly mauled. From my kitchen, I could hear his screams, and I tried to rush to his aid. By the time I got to where he was lying, it was apparent that Ugly's sad life was almost at an end.



Jim's Report Due to the rain and damp weather, the lake level only dropped a lit-

tle under an inch and a half Jim has spotted the short-eared doe with last year's twin fawns still with her. He had not seen her since late last summer.

The red-winged blackbirds are back at their old locations in the cattails around the Kids' Pond. They are a fun bird to watch, and the male is a bird everyone can identify. The drab, slightly smaller female looks a little like an outsize sparrow. The female builds the nest and incubates the eggs without any help from the polygymous male, who sees his sole job as defending his territory by displaying his red shoulder patches that are bordered with yellow and singing his shrill konk-la-reee. As the female weaves her lovely little nest in the cattails from 3 to 8 feet above the ground or water, her drabness is part of her camouflage.

Predators, such as, raccoons, foxes, weasels, water snakes, crows, and grackles, help keep these prolific birds in check. Wily cowbirds often remove an egg and deposit one of their own in the redwinged blackbird's nest.

Some years back Archie and Marguerite Nelson kept one of these nests on display. They have since replaced it with a hummingbird nest from Austin. At the time I thought it would be fun to see these birds when they were nesting, and then get the discarded nest as the Nelsons had done.

Giving out the tax permits Saturday morning turned out to be fun, as I got to visit with some interesting people. One that I had wanted to visit with for some time was Corky Kizziar. He had been interviewed by John Peterson by telephone in 1987 when Peterson and others were making a historical survey of the Park area. These interviews have not been located.

Corky, born in a half dugout west of the Park area in 1931, lived as a small boy on the Ace Powers place and then later on the Gibner place. He spent a lot of time looking for the Rifle Pits. He had heard that wagons and rifles were buried somewhere in the environs and felt he would have a fortune if he could locate them.

David Bergin told me of how much enjoyment he and his family had boating up Horse Creek. Steve Bishop explained some fishing techniques and visited about hiking trail possibilities on the office side.







Environmental Quality Incentive Program Sign-up

The Natural Resources Conservation Service has set the sign-up deadline for the 2000 Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). The application deadline for the 2000 program year is May 5, 2000. Applications from individual landowners interested in participating in the EQIP during the 2000 program year received before May 5 will be ranked for program eligibility during the month of May. Applications received after the May 5 deadline, as part of the EQIP continuous program sign-up provisions, will be held until the 2001 program year ranking period.

Private landowners should be aware that EQIP provides technical, educational, and financial assistance to eligible farmers and ranchers to address soil, water and related natural resource concerns on their lands in an environmentally beneficial and cost-effective manner. EQIP is a voluntary program and is designed to assist farmers and ranchers with placing natural resource conservation practices on their property. Cost share is provided to program participants to achieve the goals of a conservation plan designed with the assistance of local NRCS stab Cost your local NRCS field office. share practices include placement of appropriate structural or vegetative practices, such as animal waste management equipment, vegetative buffers and wildlife habitat enhancement, to name a few. Eligible practices will depend on the location of the farm or ranch on which the practice is to be installed and the major resource concern to be addressed in that particular area. Information on eligible cost share practices and major resource con-

CARPENTRY

Contracts for eligible producers are made for a period of five to ten years and include incentive paymanagement facilities, irrigation ments to assist with implementation of land management practices, such as nutrient management and grazing land management. It should be. noted that program funds target natural resource concerns of farmers, as well as, livestock producers.



Property Tax Information Available From Appraisal Office

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the Hansford County Appraisal District, offers property owners a 2000 pamphlet called *Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights. Remedies & Responsibilities* to help them save on their property taxes. Published by the State Comptroller's office, the *Remedies* pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas works and tells property owners about possible tax

savings. Peddy noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, school districts and special districts such as municipal utility, junior college, and hospital districts).

"Homeowners may file for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads," Peddy said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet explains each exemption and how to apply for it.

For example, all homeowners who owned and lived in their homes on January 1st may file for a \$15,000 general exemption from their principal home's value for school taxes. In addition, certain disabled homeowners and those aged 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homes.

"A tax freeze, or ceiling, for school taxes is a benefit for homeowners once they become 65 years old," Peddy said. "State law provides that homeowners who turn 65 may apply during the year, rather than waiting until the next January 1st.

"An elderly homeowner's taxes that pay for public schools cannot increase above the total school tax amount on that home in the first year that the homeowner receives the over-65 homeowner exemption," Peddy continued. "But, it may increase if the homeowner improves or adds to the house, such as adding a room or patio."

a room or patio." The law provides an additional school tax benefit for certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over-65 homeowner is at least 55 years old at the time of the older spouse's death, then he or she can keep the school tax ceiling. The tax ceiling, however, does not apply for other taxing units, such as the county and city.

The surviving spouse also may retain the over-65 homeowner's exemptions offered by the local taxing units, if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of the older spouse's death and owns and lives in the home.

The chief appraiser appointed out that homeowners age 65 or older do not need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Homeowners turning 65 during the year may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year from the date they turned 65, owned the home, and lived in it as their principal residence. Only those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling such as the surviving spouse age 55 or older - must apply in 2000.

Homeowners are also eligible for a \$3,000 general exemption for their county taxes because the county levies a tax for farm-to-market or flood control.

Peddy added that any taxing unit may offer a local-option exemption that allows a percentage reduction in each residence homestead's appraised value. In 2000, a taxing unit may exempt up to 20 percent of each qualified home's appraised value. Taxing units offering the percentage exemption and the percentage they offer are: City of Spearman, Gruver ISD, Pringle-Morse CISD, Hansford County, Hansford Hospital - 20%, and North Plains Water District and Palo Duro River Authority - 5%.

River Authority - 5%. The taxpayer pamphlet also describes other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans and other disabled persons.

Productivity appraisal is another type of tax relief available to agricultural or timberland owners. It is available in two forms, referred to by its location in the Texas Constitution: "I-d" or agriculturaluse appraisal and "I-d-I" or openspace land appraisal.

Landowners who wish their land to receive 1-d appraisal must apply each year. The landowner must file a signed, sworn application with the chief appraiser by May 1st. However, owners of land receiving 1-d-1 appraisal do not need to reapply, unless the chief appraiser requests in writing that they do so. The only applications required this year are the ones on property that has changed ownership or a change of use has occurred during this past year

Because the qualifications are less strict, many landowners choose to apply for 1-d-1. However, if the land's use changes to a non-agricultural one, the period for recapturing lost taxes is five years for 1-d-1. For 1-d, the recapture time is three years for change of ownership or use.

"Appraisal district staff can offer more information about special and appraisal, tax renditions and exemptions," Peddy said.

She said the *Remedies* pamphlet also contains information about protesting to the appraisal review board (ARB). The ARB is a citizen board that hears taxpayer protests to ensure that property values are fair and uniform.

Another section deals with how voters can petition for an election to reduce the amount of a tax increase adopted by any taxing unit.

adopted by any taxing unit. "I urge all property owners in the Hansford County Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and learn about the property tax system and all possible property tax relief," Peddy said. "Remember, taxpayers must file exemption applications with the appraisal office by May 1 and any protests by May 31 of this year."
