Local Family Farm Honored in Austin



In a celebration of agriculture and family heritage, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples honored 104 farms and ranches spanning 67 Texas counties at the 37th Annual Family Land Heritage (FLH) ceremony on Thursday, November 8, 2012. The ceremony, which was held in the House Chamber at the Texas State Capitol, recognized Texas families who have kept their farms and ranches in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more.

The Gustav Adolph Olsen family farm was one of those honored at the State Capital House of Representative Chamber. Mary Frances Olsen accepted the award from Commissioner Staples. Several family members attended and were honoree's at a "Barbeque under the Tent" on the Capital south lawn. Mary accepted the Citation on the House of Representative Floor with the support of Hansford County Judge Benny Wilson and State Senator Kel Seliger.

November 8, 2012, marked the annual tradition of the Texas Department of Agriculture recognizing hardworking Texas families who have kept their farms and ranches in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more. In a press release by Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples, Commissioner Staples stated "Agriculture is not an easy way of life. The days are long, the work is hard and even the best-laid plans can be cast into ruin by drought, floods, wildfire, pests and disease. To endure and survive the unforeseen ups and downs takes a lot of backbone and even more perseverance. To do it for 100 years or more is a remarkable legacy of family, land and heritage. To those families who surpass the 100-year milestone-and to those who make on behalf of all Texans who, knowingly or not, depend on you each and every day." The Olsen farm was founded by Gustav Adolph Olsen in 1910. Born in Norway Mr. Olsen moved to Nebraska and then traveled to Guymon Oklahoma by train. He bought 320 acres in the Oslo community in Hansford County, Texas. Gustav farmed his corn, wheat and milo with horses, and raised cattle, hogs and chickens. Gustav and his wife, Johanna, had eight children. After Johanna died in 1915, Gustav moved to Goodwell, Oklahoma so the children could attend school. Gustav Adolph Olsen Jr then farmed the land. He trained mules to harness for the use of them. Gus and his wife Helene had seven children. The children lived on the farm and attended Oslo School and Gruver School. Helene died in 1946. cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.12/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.7 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.39/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 4.4 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 11.8 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 11.3 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 10.0 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"While the national average continues to fall, we've done the math- the yearly average in 2012 is all but guaranteed to set all time record highs," said Gas-Buddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "We still stand at \$3.63/gal for a yearly average, and gasoline prices would need to average no more than \$2.35/gallon for every day left in 2012 for the national yearly average to drop below 2011, something that appears impossible. In the meanwhile, we have lowered our forecast for Christmas gasoline prices to average between \$3.25-\$3.35/gallon," DeHaan said.







In the second week of the Season of Advent, we learn of being prepared as we study Malachi 3: 1-4, Luke 1: 68-79, Philippians 1: 1-11, and Luke 3: 1-6.

The prophet declares that the Lord is sending his messenger to prepare the way for him. When God's messenger appears he will be like a refiner's fire and like fuller's soap. The messenger will purify the priests and the people so that they will present offerings to God in righteousness. Substance of the message, the priests and people need to repent. God will make clean that which s unclean.

The reading from Luke which takes the place of our Psalm is sometimes called "The Benedictus" or "The Song of Zechariah". After the birth of his son John (The Baptist), Zechariah prophesies: A savior will be born from the house of David. God will fulfill his promise to Abraham. Zechariah's son, John, will be a prophet of the Most High who will go before the Lord to prepare his way. Light will come to those in darkness and in the shadow of death. In the Season of Advent we celebrate that the light has come even as we wait for the "full radiance" of our Lord's return.

Paul thanks God for the Church at Philippi. He is thankful for their sharing of the gospel, for their love of Paul, and for their sharing of God's grace. By this prayer of thankfulness, Paul is contrasting those who preach out of envy, rivalry and partisanship. Paul prays that the Philippians will overflow with love and gain more knowledge and full insight of the gospel message. Those who abide in God's love put aside petty disputes because of love for one another and for the service of the gospel. If we follow this way, we too will be prepared for the "full radiance" of our Lord's return.

Luke places John the Baptist in the time when Tiberius is Emperor of Rome, Pontius Pilate is governor of Judea, Herod is the ruler of Galilee, and Phillip ruler of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene. John the Baptist is present during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas. Luke shows all those who exercise authority over the people to contrast them

with the prophet of God, John the Baptist. John proclaims the people's need for repentance and baptizes them as a ritual cleansing and declaration of their turning back to God. Luke tells us that John is the one like Elijah, "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." The Lord is coming, be prepared! May the Holy Spirit keep you alert so that you may celebrate the birth of our Lord and be prepared for his return. Even so, come Lord Jesus!
