



Weekly Update Texas, August 6 - Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 6.5 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.40/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 9.3 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.60/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 15.4 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 22.1 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 19.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 6.5 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"Watching the national average last week, one might have expected war broke out in the Middle East or a major hurricane shutting down production, neither of which happened, yet gasoline prices spiked," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "The scary thought is what may happen to gasoline prices should one of the two actually take place. The Great Lakes was hosed with refinery issues and a major oil pipeline issue, and while other regions saw increases, they paled in comparison to those in the Great Lakes states. The good news for motorists is that the end to the summer driving season and change to winter-spec fuel is in view, which will likely put downward pressure on gasoline

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors for August 7, 2012: Conditions remained hot and dry with temperatures at or above 100 degrees most of the week. Some areas received rain, from 0.16 inch to 2 inches. Soil-moisture levels were very short to adequate, with most counties reporting very short to short. Corn was in very poor to good condition, with most reporting fair. Most of the early planted corn was in fair shape, but laterplanted corn was suffering as irrigation water had to be shared with other crops. Some cornfields were abandoned due to drought conditions. Cotton was in very poor to excellent condition with most reporting fair. Irrigated cotton was in good shape with little insect pressure. Dryland cotton, however, was barely holding on under the extreme temperatures. Rangeland and pastures were in very poor to excellent condition with most reporting very poor to poor. Due to lack of wind to run windmills, some cattlemen in some areas had to haul water to livestock. Some cattlemen were taking advantage of the emergency Conservation Reserve Program grazing. Cow/calf producers who still had cattle were feed ing hay and culling herds and shipping calves.

But, Haile will continue serving people regardless of his employment circumstances. He has a genuine concern for people.



Sheriff Jack Haile has had to do it all: patrol officer, public relations officer, transport officer, jailer, dispatcher, bailiff, personnel director, civil process, and he is responsible for his office's budget each year. Many times during the past twenty-four years he has been the only officer on duty in the city of Stratford and Sherman County as well.

Jack Haile was sworn in as Sheriff of Sherman County on November 14, 1988 When he became sheriff, Sherman County's level of technology consisted of a #2 pencil and a Big Chief Tablet. He has completely updated the SO and brought it into the digital age which is not an easy task for someone who claims to be "computer illiterate."

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I think that one of the things that has made him so successful in his career is his disarming personality. He has this remarkable capacity to cause people to like and trust him. He is also a world class storyteller.

The people of this community have trusted him to protect their property and their lives. We have not been disappointed.



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

In the eleventh week of the Season of Pentecost, we learn more of the "bread of life" and what it means to be called by the Lord as we study 1 Kings 19: 4-8, Psalm 34: 1-8, Ephesians 4:25-5:2.

Elijah has defeated and destroyed four hundred prophets of Baal and Queen Jezebel vows to kill Elijah. Elijah flees. After running for a day, the prophet lays down under a broom tree to rest and sleep. Elijah prays that God will take his life. An angel awakens him and commands him to "Get up and eat", food had been provided. Elijah sleeps again and the angel awakens him again. Again Elijah is commanded "Get up and eat, otherwise the journey will be too much for you." Elijah got up and traveled forty days and forty nights to Mount Horeb, the mountain of God. Even the bravest of believers can succumb to fears; even the bravest of soldiers can break after going into combat too many times. Learn from this that we must learn to rely on God for our strength and that regardless of the strength of our enemies, the strength of God is greater. God's steadfast love s always with us.

The Psalmist sings a song of praise. God has deliv-ered the Psalmist from all his fears. The Psalmist asks all to join him in blessing God. The theme is expressed best by, "The angel of the Lord encamps around those who fear him, and delivers them. O taste and see that the Lord is good; happy are those who take refuge in him."

Paul charges the Ephesians to be "imitators of God. as beloved children, and live in love as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." Paul lists things which promote unity in the Church, please read them. When you read them notice that Paul is calling upon the Church to live in love and even more to act in love. You are called to be a "little Christ"; learn what this means.

Our lesson commences with Jesus' statement to the crowd, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty". The Jews respond, "Is not this Jesus the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he say, 'I have come down from heaven?' The Jews have heard Jesus' message but they have not understood it. We are much the same. We judge others by what we know, what we have learned, and it is difficult to consider a 'radical' idea. Jesus said in this passage No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day. It is the work of the Holy Spirit to enable my faith in Jesus The Christ through the grace of God. Our renewal comes in doing God's will; doing God's will requires us to "eat of the living bread." This is expressed elsewhere as, "In God we live and move and have our being". You see dear Christian, our "being" is in God; without God we do not truly exist.

FSA Accepting Emergency Loan Applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought January 1, 2012 and con-tinuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Perryton, Texas, James M. Heck said today.

All counties in Texas were recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production and physical losses resulting from the drought.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 2.25%

As a general rule a farmer or rancher must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of crop production or suffered any physical loss to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan under this disaster designation. Pro-ducers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their production loss. Additionally, any insurance proceeds received by producers as a result of the physical loss will have to be considered in determining their total loss.

Application for loans under this emergency designation for physical or production losses will be accepted until March 12, 2013 but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

FSA Announces Continuous Sign-up for CRP Highly Erodible Land Initiative

Rick Hargrove, Executive Director for the Hansford County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA), announced that continuous sign-up for the Highly Erodible Land Initiative under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) started on July 23, 2012. Texas received a total allocation of 50,000 acres. Offers will be accepted until either the state acreage allocation limit is reached or September 30, 2012, whichever occurs first. "CRP is a voluntary program that has protected environmentally sensitive land for more than 25 years," said Hargrove. "This initiative will accept offers with an erosion rate of at least 20 tons per acre per year for new cropland or CRP acres that expire on September 30, 2012; however, existing grass stands that are not considered expiring CRP will not be considered eligible," he said. Producers can stop by the Hansford County FSA office to determine if their land qualifies for the Highly Erodible Land Initiative and to receive additional location-specific details. Landowners enrolled in CRP receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish longterm, resource conserving covers on eligible farmland. Incentive payments are not authorized under this initiative. New land contracts approved during this continuous sign-up initiative will become effective the first day of the month following the month of approval and are valid for 10 years. CRP contracts set to expire on September 30, 2012, may be offered for consideration and approved contracts will become effective October 1, 2012, and are also valid for 10 years. 




