On July 6, 2000, the Amarillo Globe-News published an article in their paper concerning teacher shortages, pay issues and the challenges facing rural Panhandle school districts in hiring new teachers. There were several statements in the article by Matt Gleason regarding Gruver ISD and Spearman ISD that were untrue and a misrepresentation of the facts. During interviews with both Gruver ISD and Spearman ISD, Mr. Gleason inquired about vacancies and quality of applicants. Gruver ISD responded that many quality applications were received. When talking about quality, it was stated that quality is always an issue, just like in all professions. The article stated that the GISD Superintendent, Laura Blassingame, said that they had not seen any quality applicants. This made it look like everyone hired exhibited a lack of quality, which is certainly not at all true. The Gruver ISD Superintendent did not say anything to imply that there was a lack of quality in the applicants applying or being hired.

Spearman ISD Superintendent, Rodney Sumner, was quoted as saying that while a lack of applications was not the problem, the problem was a lack of quality personnel. The Spearman ISD Superintendent did not say or imply anything regarding current personnel or lack of quality of applicants.

We both take issue with reporting that is a misrepresentation of our statements and implies that there is a lack of quality in personnel applying or currently employed. Furthermore, when the Guymon Radio station KKBS read the article over the air, they had not checked out the information and continued to spread these untrue statements. This perpetuated and compounded the problem further.

The Amarillo Globe-News did print a correction in the paper on Saturday, July 8th. However, not many subscribers read the correction, and even KKBS had not seen it. Gruver ISD contacted the radio station and issued a clarification. KKBS was cooperative in assisting the district in airing the correction. To this, we are very appreciative. The Amarillo Globe-News did print a correction, but the correction was vague and not accurate either. Another issue was salaries. Both Gruver and Spearman ISD pay above state base. This is not a bonus. However, Spearman and Gruver both attempt to pay the best salary that each district is able to generate. Spearman Superintendent, Rodney Sumner, and Gruver Superintendent, Laura Blassingame, appreciate their teachers and support staff. They both attempt to pay salaries that are comparable to the job market and the responsibilities held. Both Superintendents are in agreement that the statements in the Amarillo Globe-News reflected negatively upon the respective Districts and that all steps should be taken to ensure that this situation is rectified to adhere to the positive qualities that each district possesses. Lessons have been learned by the Superintendents regarding telephone interviews and what one says is not necessarily what comes out in print. Another lesson is that the pen is mightier than the sword. It is hard to undo negative reporting or slanted information. We both hope that the communities of Hansford County, as well as all of the readers of the Amarillo Globe-News, and the listeners of KKBS radio in Guymon understand the clarifications in this letter and hope that it has cleared up any misrepresentations that were falsely reported.

Perry Explains Children's Health Insurance Program

As the father of two children, I have always taken for granted that Griffin and Sydney Perry would have access to quality health care. My wife, Anita, is a former registered nurse and her father, Dr. Joe E. Thigpen, practices family medicine in Munday, Texas. Anita and I have peace of mind knowing that those family ties, along with health insurance coverage, mean that our son and daughter have access to doctors, dentists and other health providers anytime they need it.

But many other Texas children are forced to receive care in an expensive emergency room situation, or even worse, they may forgo health care because of the cost of health insurance. The problem is especially acute for lower-income families who earn too much to qualify for Medicaid coverage but not enough to afford private health insurance coverage.

insurance coverage. Fortunately, during the 1999 Legislative Session, Governor George W. Bush and legislators of both parties passed the Children's Health Insurance Program, known as CHIP, to help provide affordable health insurance for families earning up to 200% of the federal poverty level.

Funds from the state's tobacco settlement - to the tune of \$ 180 million - are being used to pay for the program and the federal government is contributing \$3 for every \$1 Texas spends.

After months of planning and preparation, the CHIP program begins on April 3rd. The new TexCare Partnership -- an initiative linking public and private-sector resources with the Texas families who want the best for their kids -will begin processing CHIP applica-

Texas families are able to phone in their applications by calling tollfree 1-800-647-6558. Customer service representatives will help match Texas parents with children's health insurance to fit their budgets. The applications of families who appear to qualify for Medicaid health insurance or for coverage through the Texas Healthy Kids Corporation will be forwarded to those programs to complete the processing.

Who is eligible for CHIP? The income test varies based on family size. For example, families of four with net income of \$34,100 or less would qualify. Net income is salary or wages minus deductions allowed for child care expenses, work-related expenses, and child support received. Children from birth to age 19 can qualify for this program and they cannot be excluded based on a pre-existing condition.

pre-existing condition. The application process is simple and straightforward. The form itself is short -- one piece of paper front and back. There are easy-to-read instructions. When the application was tested with Texas families, it only took them an average of eight minutes to complete.

Families whose children qualify for CHIP will get comprehensive health insurance coverage designed for both healthy children and those with special health care needs, such as chronic conditions like asthma or disabilities like cerebral palsy. Each child will have an insurance card issued by a private HMO or insurance company. Each child will have access to doctors, hospitals, specialists, lab tests, x-rays, immunizations, dental, mental health and substance abuse services, or speech or physical therapy when they need them. How much a family pays for coverage will depend upon the family's ability to pay. Those who qualify for Medicaid health insurance will pay nothing at all. CHIP-enrolled families will make co-payments for doctor's office visits, prescription drugs, and emergency-room care depending on income and the service being received.

Premium amounts range from \$15 per year per family to \$18 per month per family, based on the family's ability to pay. Families who receive coverage for their children through the Texas Healthy Kids Corporation will pay competitive monthly premiums that vary depending on where the family lives.

CHIP is an investment that will pay big dividends down the road. Regular preventative health care is key to a happy and productive life. Illnesses that are detected early can often be treated and cured more quickly and at a lower cost. CHIP means that there will be fewer sick days for children and fewer missed work days for parents. That is not only good for our children and families, it's good for Texas businesses who depend on their employees to get the job done day in and day out. I applaud the leadership and

vision of Governor Bush who supported and signed CHIP into law, of Senator Mike Moncrief and Representative Patricia Gray who sponsored and shepherded the CHIP legislation, and of Texas legislators who showed that our children matter more than politics or process.

CHIP extends a helping hand to the most fragile Texans - uninsured children - and in doing so ensures that the future of the Lone Star State is healthier, brighter and more productive for us all. U.S. veterans of the Korean War are now eligible for a commemorative 50th Anniversary Korean War pin issued through the U.S. Department of Defense.

"I want to make sure that our Korean War veterans, who bravely fought for our freedom, will be able to receive the recognition they deserve," Rep. Larry Combest said. "This 50th anniversary pin is a small token of our immense appreciation and admiration of their courage."

commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Korean War, commonly known as the "Forgotten War." Throughout the country, America's brave men and women who served their country so proudly against Communist aggression will be hon-ored. During the 37 month war, 33,651 Americans died in action and over 100,000 were wounded.

Any veteran who served in the theater of war-- on Korean soil, off

This year, the U.S. will begin to the shore of Korea, or through air support missions to the Korean War during the Department of Defense recognized dates (June 25, 1950 to July 27, 1953), is eligible to receive the commemorative pin. Spouses or families of deceased veterans who served during these dates are also entitled to claim one pin per family.

To apply for the pin, veterans will need to provide their name, address, telephone number and dates of service. They should also provide a copy of their report of separation, commonly known as a "DD-214" or a corrected version of that document. a "DD-215." National Guard members should provide their statement of service equivalent, "NGB Form 22." All branches of the U.S. Armed Services will be recognized.
