| Hansford County residents gathered at "Zulu, Texas" on Saturday, Sept. 25, for an Open House, tour and ribbon cutting ceremony. <br> This celebration was to commemorate the completion of a replica of the Zulu Stockade. "It's the fruit of our dream," Climentine Renner stated when talking of the completion. She added that the project had lasted for approximately 20 years. <br> We realize it is a far cry from the original, but to make it last for years to come like we'd hoped, we had it made of modern materials," she said. In explanation she said the walls of the original stockade were of pickets hauled from Morse creek, while the roof was pickets covered with sod. The floors of the building were dirt covered with burlap sacks. The replica of the stockade located at the Station Master's House Museum is built with half logs in a vertical position, the roof is steel and the floor is cement covered with burlap sacks. <br> Although the materials are not exactly the same, the replica is the exact dimensions of the original - | and living quarters. Renner commented that the remainder of the building will be used for other historical artifacts from Hansford County. <br> "We rebuilt the Zulu Stockade to preserve some of the Hansford County History," Clementine stated. She added that the post office was established in Zulu, Texas on Dec. 20, 1888, under Rutherford V. Haze, administrator and Horace Manord, postmaster general. The first postmaster of Zulu Texas was Jim Cator. <br> The building of the Zulu Stockade replica was made possible by donations, Clementine said. She added that the Station Master's House Museum Committee hired some of the work, but most of it was done by J.D.
