## Spearman Tennis Claims Boys' & Girls' District Championships

Thursday, April 5th was a beautiful day for tennis in the Texas Panhandle and the Spearman Lynx and Lynxettes took full advantage claiming the District Championships in both boys' and girls' divisions. The Lynxettes won their 4th consecutive District Championship with 35.5 team points over 2nd place Highland Park. The Lynx scored 30.5 points defeating Childress for their title. Spearman will send 11 players this year to the Regional Tennis Tournament on April 18 & 19 in Odessa.

Kyla Walker (Spearman) won her second District Championship in girls' singles defeating Slade Garnett (Spearman), but both girls will represent Spearman as Regional Qualifiers. Shelby Hanna/Luis Vela (Spearman) defeated Cassidy Odegaard/Derrick Zimmerman (Spearman) for the Mixed Doubles District Championship. Cassidy and Derrick went on to win their playback match against a Highland Park team to earn their spot to the Regional Tournament. In Boys' Singles, Peyton Garnett (Spearman) won the silver medal while Tanner Baird finished with the bronze medal.

Paige Pierson and Katy Miser (Spearman) also defended their Girls' Doubles District Championship defeating Cook/Quinlin (HPark) in three sets. Jayme Pack and Cynthia Mendoza finished 4th among the girls' doubles teams. The boys' doubles teams of Clay Jackson/Tyler Robinett (Spearman) and Brody Hargrove/Alec Cenicerros (Spearman) had everyone on the edge of their seats by the end of the day. The boys were forced into the playback match with the winner qualifying for the regional tournament. A long hard-fought three set match was played with Clay and Tyler narrowly defeating Brody and Alec for the silver medal.

Spearman will have 11 players in Odessa on April 18 & 19 for the Regional Tournament. Seniors Cassidy Odegaard, Shelby Hanna, Derrick Zimmerman, Juniors Kyla Walker, Luis Vela, Paige Pierson, Katy Miser and Freshmen Clay Jackson, Tyler Robinett, Peyton Garnett and Slade Garnett.



## Panhandle Crisis Center Holds Ground Breaking Ceremony

Panhandle Crisis Center held a ground breaking ceremony on Monday, April 9, 2012 for an addition to their current facility located at 301 South Ash in Perryton.

Panhandle Crisis Center selected David Pearson from J&M Service Center in Perryton as its general contractor. Construction should be completed in 4 to 6 months. September 30, 2012 is the projected completion date.

Panhandle Crisis Center has raised 79% of the funds needed. There is \$53,173 left to raise. We continue to ask for the community's support through donations to raise the remaining funds.

Panhandle Crisis Center provides services to adult and child victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Ochiltree, Hansford, and Lipscomb Counties. The Center began a capital campaign in December of 2011 in order to raise funds to combine its office and shelter operations in anticipation of funding cuts scheduled to occur in September of 2012.

According to Executive Director Cindy Smith, this consolidation of services increases efficiency of operations by over \$39,000 annually and enables the Center to ensure 24-hour emergency shelter remains available in years when less federal/state funding is available.

Each month an average of 180 adults and children receive services through the Center's main office and shelter in Perryton and at outreach locations in Hansford, and Lipscomb Counties. In 2011, the agency served 1,199 individuals.

The Center operates a 24-hour hotline and emergency shelter where one to families seek refuge each month; therefore, the Center incurs the cost of staffing its services 24 hours per day, 365 days per year.

In September of 2011, we were notified by our second largest funding source, Office of the Attorney General, to prepare for unspecified funding cuts in September of 2012. This one source provides over \$101,000 annually to the

agency. In comparison, the cost of operating the 24-hour family violence shelter alone, including salaries and operating expenses, is \$108,000. In response to the anticipated funding decrease, the Center formulated a plan action to combine operations.

The trend of combining shelter and office operations has increased in recent years in Texas due to the cost-effectiveness and operational efficiency of such arrangements. While the location of the shelter will no

longer be confidential, the new site will be less than 2 blocks from the Perryton Police Department and less than 4 blocks from the Ochiltree County Sheriff's Department. The increased response time by law enforcement is a benefit which enhances the security measures already utilized by the family violence shelter. The shelter will be a three bedroom home and serves a place of peace and respite for adults and children fleeing abusive situations.

## AARP Texas To Voters: Homestead Tax Cap Not At Risk

There's some misinformation circulating about what will be on the ballot in the upcoming May election. A spam email has been making its way across the state, warning voters that the homestead tax cap for people 65 and older is up for a vote.

This simply isn't true. Here are the facts:

In 2006, The Texas Legislature passed a law reducing property taxes for all homeowners. However, the legislation left out senior and disabled citizens whose property taxes were already "frozen." As a result, seniors and people with disabilities didn't receive the same reduction.

AARP Texas tackled this issue during the 2007 Session, and the Texas Legislature passed a bill calling for seniors and disabled citizens to receive the same benefits from the tax reduction as other Texans. In May of that year, Texas voters passed the amendment extending property tax relief to seniors and disabled Texans.

This problem was solved over four years ago. There is no constitutional amendment election scheduled in Texas in May 2012. Seniors and disabled Texans can rest easy, knowing their homestead tax cap is not at risk.

## Important Election Dates

### May 29th Primary Election

The last day to file for a place on the May 29th Primary Election ballot was Friday, March 9th.

The first day to apply for a ballot by mail is March 30th and the last day to apply for a ballot by mail is May 22nd. The last day to register to vote is April 30th.

The first day of early voting is May 14th and the last day of early voting is May 25th.

Local offices on the ballot and those filing include: District Judge - William D. "Bill" Smith; District Attorney - Mark Snider; Sheriff - Tim Glass; Tax Assessor/Collector - Linda Cummings; County Attorney - John L. Hutchison; County Commissioner - Precinct 1 - Butch Reed; and County Commissioner - Precinct 3 - Tim Stedje.

### May 12th Limited Election

The May 12th limited uniform election date will be held as usual. (This election is for cities and schools only). The last day

to file for a place on the ballot was Monday, March 5th.

The City of Spearman has two Alderman positions up for reelection - Jon Garnett and Charles Elliott, as well as the Mayor. As of Monday, March 5, 2012, the following have filed: Mayor Brian Gillispie has filed for re-election. Alderman Jon Garnett has filed for re-election. Also filing for Alderman are Armando Martinez and Bryce Williams. Alderman Charles Elliott did not file.

Spearman ISD has two terms up this year for School Board. At this time no one has filed. The two terms expiring are Maria Sibley and Glen Ray Mackie.

By joining our growing organization of more than 1,000,000 members—the largest of its kind in the United States means that you have the support of: Over 150 aircraft locations with more than 300,000 safely flown medical flights; Network extending out across 23 states; The stability and resources of the largest independently owned and operated air ambulance service in the United States; Highly skilled nurses, medics and pilots professionally trained for medevac emergency medical situations.

Your membership in the program offers significant benefits. We will work on your behalf with your benefits provider to secure payment for your medical evacuation. Whatever your benefits provider pays for your emergency air ambulance services will be considered payment-in-full for your medical evacuation.

## FAQs

Here are some frequently asked questions with answers about the MTC Membership program:

**How did the MTC Membership program get started?** In July 2009 Med-Trans Corporation partnered with Shannon AirMed1 in San Angelo, Texas who had an existing membership program. A decision was made to offer membership through Med-Trans Corporation and their partners.

**What is the benefit of membership to you?** Although you do not have to be a member to be transported, membership offers several important benefits: First, as one of our over 1,000,000 members, we will work on your behalf with your benefits provider to secure payment for your flight, with any uncovered amounts considered to be fully prepaid. As such, members who are transported by any network

provider, will not receive a bill for the flight. Importantly, your membership is valid across 25 states with over 160 base locations, so you are covered while traveling in those areas. Second, becoming a member is a good way to support the health care needs of your local community. Our membership base - the largest of its kind in the United States - helps us operate in rural areas where having a quick response time to critical medical situations can save lives.

**How can a membership be so inexpensive and yet still be able to cover the costs of the flights?** An individual's membership fee covers only a small fraction of the cost of a flight. Our membership support helps subsidize our program, but our primary revenue is derived from our transports, the vast majority of which are non-members.

**What is included in my membership?** Members are entitled to transport by a participating partner of the AirMedCare Network's helicopter to the closest appropriate medical facility for medical conditions deemed by an attending medical professional to be "life or limb" threatening, or that could lead to permanent disability.

**Can I cover all of my family on the membership?** With a household membership, all individuals who reside at your residence can be covered by the membership. College students can be covered by the household membership if their primary address is the same as your residence.

**Is there a limit to the number of flights a member can have in a year?** There is no limit to the number of flights a member may take in a year. Each flight is handled the same way and must be medically necessary.

**If I am a member and end up being transported by a ground ambulance or another air ambulance**

**service, who is responsible for the bill?** If a participating partner of the AirMedCare Network does not transport you, you will be responsible for payment of the bill. Our membership program only covers flights by this network.

**Is a membership considered insurance?** No. Med-Trans Corporation is not an insurance company. Our membership is not an insurance policy and cannot be considered as secondary insurance coverage or as supplemental coverage to any insurance policy. Membership provides prepaid protection against air ambulance transportation costs that are not covered by a member's health insurance or medical benefits.

**Does my primary insurance cover the cost of a flight? If so, how much?** This answer varies, with each insurance company offering different plans and coverage. It is up to your individual insurance company as to whether they will cover the cost of a flight, as well as to the amount of economic burden placed on the patient via a co-pay or deductible. We recommend that you contact your insurance company directly to obtain detailed coverage information.

**My insurance company says they will cover 100% so why do I need this membership?** Most insurance companies will pay 100% of what they deem an allowable amount for air ambulance, which does not necessarily mean that the total cost of the flight will be covered. Additionally, people frequently change insurance companies and plan designs. You will want to check with your individual insurance company to find out exactly how much they will cover in the case of an air ambulance transport.

**If I have Medicaid, do I need a membership?** No. Some state laws prohibit Medicaid beneficiaries from being offered membership or accepted into membership programs. As part of our application process, members certify to us that they are not Medicaid beneficiaries.

**If I have Medicare and a supplemental policy, do I need a membership?** This answer varies, depending upon the nature of your transport and your supplemental insurance provider. In many cases, Medicare

and the supplemental insurance coverage should pay for the cost of air ambulance transport if it is medically necessary and if Medicare believes you were taken to the closest appropriate hospital. We have seen cases where the supplemental insurance provider does not cover a remaining balance after Medicare has paid its portion. Many seniors have said they want a membership even if they have complete coverage, in the event that their insurance coverage changes in the future or if the claim is denied.

**If I have a medical emergency, who do I call?** Call your local 911 service. The 911 dispatchers are trained to get specific information about the medical emergency from the caller and determine what type of medical transportation best fits the situation, so the best option is always to call the local 911 service first. The local service is more familiar with your location, as well as the availability of the local emergency resources.

How would emergency personnel know that I am a member? You may make the 911/ground ambulance service aware that you are a member so that in the event they plan to request an air ambulance, they know your preference. As a member, you will receive with your membership an identification card and decals for your vehicle and front door. All of these items allow emergency personnel to identify that you are a member.

**Who determines if and when I will be flown?** If your medical emergency meets certain criteria, such as a heart attack, stroke or a traumatic injury and the 911 dispatcher determines you would benefit from air medical transport, they will dispatch an air ambulance to your emergency, as well as a ground ambulance.

# Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister



In the third week of the Season of Easter, we study Acts 3: 12-19, Psalm 4, 1 John 3: 1-7, and Luke 24: 36b-48. We study some of the appearances of Jesus after his resurrection and ponder what they mean.

In our Acts scripture, Peter and John have just healed a beggar man outside the temple. The man had been lame from birth. The people are amazed and Peter presents one of his first sermons! Telling all who would hear that it was the faith of the lame man in the 'name' of Jesus that healed him. Those in the first century believed that there was great power in a name; Peter recalls that the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob has glorified Jesus and thus, it is Jesus' name which has healed the lame man. Peter calls upon those present to repent and turn to God so that their sins will be wiped out. This sums up our faith in only a few words.

The Psalmist sings a lament. Yet, he praises the God who answers him when he calls. The Lord frees the Psalmist (as if from a noose) and allows him 'room' to question and ponder the working of the Lord in the Psalmist's life. The Psalmist shows us a way of responding to God by prayer and 'right' sacrifice. The end result of such a life is the confidence to lie down and sleep in peace, for God himself watches over us.

Luke shows us the entrance of Jesus into the upper room where the disciples are hiding. This occurs just after the disciples who met Jesus on the road to Emmaus have reported their recognition of the risen Jesus to the others. The disciples are startled by Jesus' sudden appearance. Jesus displays his wounds and eats a piece of fish in their presence (to prove he is not a ghost). As the disciples wondered at this, Jesus explained from the scripture all that had been fulfilled. Jesus charges the disciples to be witnesses of the Good News.

May the Holy Spirit give you 'room' to understand the steadfast love of God for you that you may be a witness to God's grace through Jesus The Christ.

## County Employment and Wages in Texas

Employment rose in 22 of the 23 largest counties in Texas from September 2010 to September 2011, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) reported today. (Large counties are defined as those with employment of 75,000 or more as measured by 2010 annual average employment; comparable data for Brazos County were unavailable.) Regional Commissioner Stanley W. Suchman noted that three Texas counties ranked in the top ten for job growth nationwide. Montgomery County's 4.8-percent gain led the state and tied for the 2nd fastest growth in the nation. Also sharing top-ten national rankings were the Texas counties of Webb (4.4 percent, tied for 5th) and Fort Bend (4.2 percent, tied for 8th). (See table 1.)

Employment nationwide advanced 1.6 percent from September 2010 as 271 of the 322 largest U.S. counties registered increases. Williamson, Tenn., recorded the fastest rate of employment growth in the country, up 5.4 percent, while Frederick, Md., registered the largest decline, down 2.6 percent.

Among the largest counties in Texas, employment was highest in Harris County (2,054,100) in September 2011, followed by Dallas County (1,448,700). Three other counties, Tarrant, Bexar, and Travis, had employment levels exceeding 500,000. Together, the 23 largest Texas counties accounted for 77.8 percent of total employment within the state. Nationwide, the 322 largest counties made up 70.5 percent of total U.S. employment.

Williamson County, Texas, recorded the fastest growth in average weekly wages among the state's largest counties with a gain of 10.2 percent from the third quarter of 2010 to the third quarter of 2011. (See table 1.) Among large Texas counties, Harris had the highest average weekly wage in the third quarter 2011 at \$1,156 per week, followed by Dallas at \$1,102. Nationally, average weekly wages rose 5.3 percent over the year to \$916.

Employment and wage levels (but not over-the-year changes) are also available for the 231 counties in Texas with employment levels below 75,000. Among these smaller counties, 92 percent (212) had average weekly wages below the national average. (See table 2.)

### Large county wage changes

Fifteen of Texas's 23 large counties recorded wage growth above the 5.3-percent national increase from the third quarter of 2010 to the third quarter of 2011. (See table 1.) Williamson County's 10.2-percent wage increase was the highest in the state and placed 4th in the national

ranking. Five additional Texas counties registered wage growth ranking in the top 50 nationally: Brazos (8.3 percent, 16th); Galveston (7.7 percent, 27th); Brazoria (7.4 percent, 32nd); Nueces (6.8 percent, 48th); and Denton (6.7 percent, 50th). The slowest wage increase among the state's largest counties was in Bell County at 1.7 percent (309th). No large county in Texas recorded an over-the-year decline.

Among the 322 largest U.S. counties, 315 had over-the-year increases in average weekly wages. Lake County, Ohio, had the largest increase in average weekly wages in the third quarter of 2011 with a gain of 17.1 percent. Within Lake, the manufacturing industry had the largest impact on the county's over-the-year increase in average weekly wages. Santa Clara, Calif. was second with wage growth of 11.7 percent, closely followed by Oklahoma, Okla. (11.5 percent). Clay, Mo., experienced the largest decline in average weekly wages with a loss of 2.3 percent over the year.

### Large county average weekly wages

Average weekly wages in 4 of the 23 large Texas counties were at least 10 percent above the national average of \$916 per week in the third quarter of 2011. Harris County led at \$1,156 per week and ranked 21st among the 322 large counties nationwide. Harris was followed by Dallas (\$1,102, 36th), Collin (\$1,038, 48th), and Travis (\$1,010, 60th). Four additional Texas counties — Williamson, Fort Bend, Jefferson, and Tarrant — reported average weekly wages slightly above the U.S. average.

Texas also had three of the five lowest-paying large counties in the United States, all located along the border with Mexico: Cameron (\$591, 321st), Hidalgo (\$602, 320th), and Webb (\$629, 318th). Other lower-ranking areas on the national large county list included El Paso, also situated along the border with Mexico (\$671, 312th), and two counties which are home to large universities, Lubbock (\$703, 305th) and Brazos (\$719, tied for 296th).

Nationally, weekly wages were higher than the U.S. average in 109 of the largest counties in the country. Santa Clara, Calif., held the top position among the highest-paid large counties with an average weekly wage of \$1,857. New York, N.Y., was second at \$1,647, followed by Arlington, Va. (\$1,550), Washington, D.C. (\$1,527), and San Francisco, Calif. (\$1,457). Of the largest counties in the United States, 212, or nearly two-thirds, reported average weekly wages below the national average

in the third quarter of 2011. The lowest wage was reported in Horry, S.C., at \$561 per week. Joining the Texas counties of Cameron, Hidalgo, and Webb among the bottom five was Yakima, Wash. (\$619). Wages in these five lowest-ranked counties were one-third or less of the average weekly wage reported for the highest-ranked county, Santa Clara, Calif.

### Average weekly wages in Texas' smaller counties

Nineteen of the 231 smaller counties in Texas — those with employment below 75,000 — reported average weekly wages equal to or above the national average of \$916. Three of these smaller counties had wages that not only exceeded \$1,000 per week, but also were the highest in the state: Carson (\$1,466), Sutton (\$1,198), and Kenedy (\$1,167). Real County registered the lowest weekly wage, averaging \$427 in the third quarter of 2011. (See table 2.)

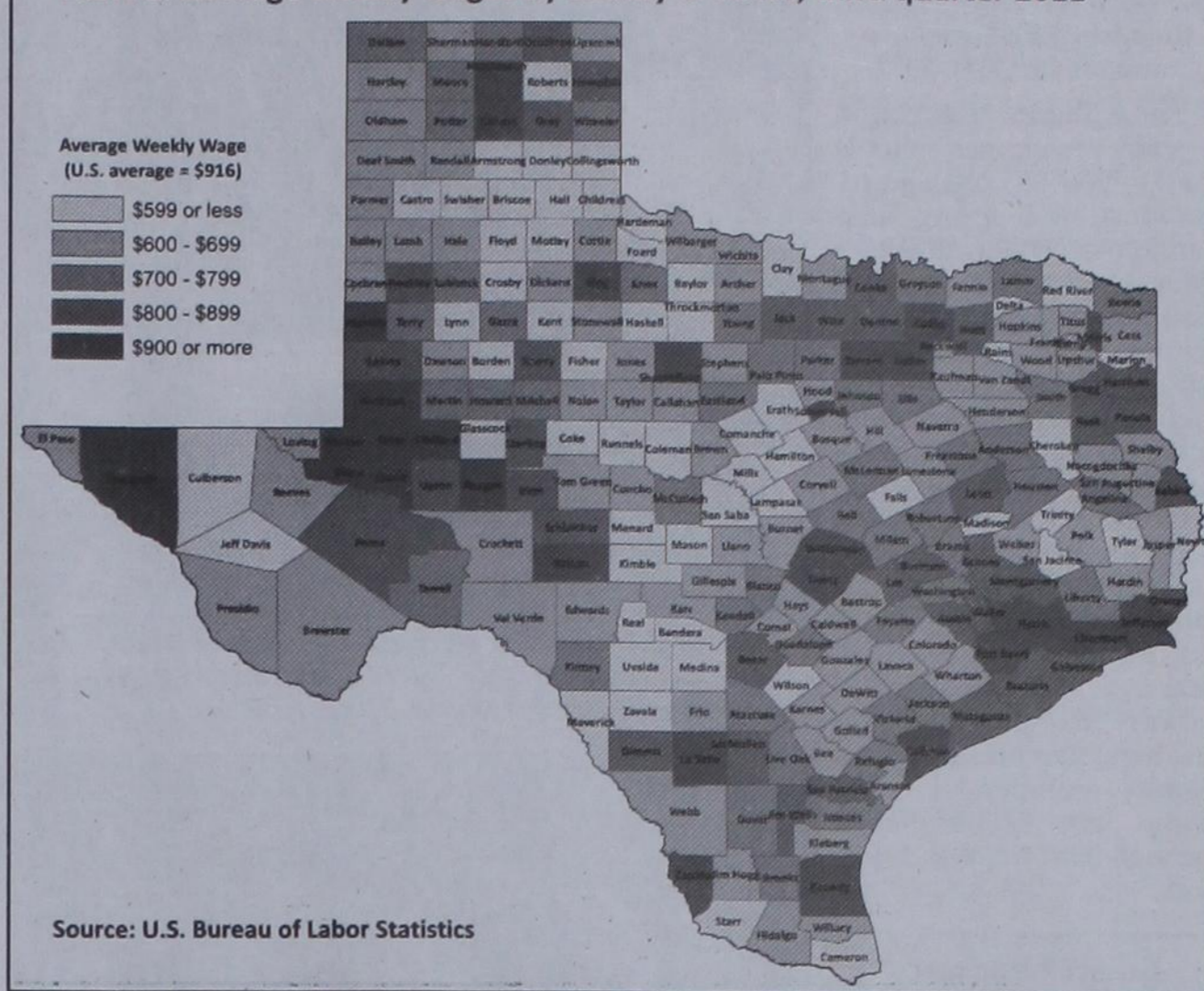
When all 254 counties in Texas were considered, all but 27 had wages below the national average. Fifty-seven reported average weekly wages under \$600, 83 registered wages from \$600 to \$699, 48 had wages from \$700 to \$799, 37 had wages from \$800 to \$899, and 29 had wages of \$900 or more per week. (See chart 1.) The counties with above average wages were generally concentrated around the metropolitan areas of Austin, Amarillo, Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston, Midland, and Odessa. The lower-paid counties, those with wages under \$550, were generally located in the agricultural areas of central Texas and the Texas Panhandle, as well as along the Texas-Mexico border.

### Technical Note

Average weekly wage data by county are compiled under the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) program, also known as the ES-202 program. The data are derived from summaries of employment and total pay of workers covered by state and federal unemployment insurance (UI) legislation and provided by State Workforce Agencies (SWAs). The 9.1 million employer reports covered 130.5 million full- and part-time workers. The average weekly wage values are calculated by dividing quarterly total wages by the average of the three monthly employment levels of those covered by UI programs. The result is then divided by 13, the number of weeks in a quarter. It is to be noted, therefore, that over-the-year wage changes for geographic areas may

reflect shifts in the composition of employment by industry, occupation, and such other factors as hours of work. Thus, wages may vary among counties, metropolitan areas, or states for reasons other than changes in the average wage level. Data for all states, Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), counties, and the nation are available on the BLS Web site at [www.bls.gov/cew/](http://www.bls.gov/cew/); however, data in QCEW press releases have been revised and may not match the data contained on the BLS Web site.

QCEW data are not designed as a time series. QCEW data are simply the sums of individual establishment records reflecting the number of establishments that exist in a county or industry at a point in time. Establishments can move in or out of a county or industry for a number of reasons—some reflecting economic events, others reflecting administrative changes.

The preliminary QCEW data presented in this release may differ from data released by the individual states as well as from the data presented on the BLS Web site. These potential differences result from the states' continuing receipt, review and editing of UI data over time. On the other hand, differences between data in this release and the data found on the BLS Web site are the result of adjustments made to improve over-the-year comparisons. Specifically, these adjustments account for administrative (noneconomic) changes such as a correction to a previously re-

ported location or industry classification. Adjusting for these administrative changes allows users to more accurately assess changes of an economic nature (such as a firm moving from one county to another or changing its primary economic activity) over a 12-month period. Currently, adjusted data are available only from BLS press releases.

### NOTICE OF ELECTION

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a board election in the Panhandle Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, in order to select a representative of the above-referenced zone to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The Panhandle Boll Weevil Eradication Zone consists of all of Carson, Dallam, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Roberts and Sherman counties.

Any cotton grower having planted cotton in the year 2011 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Panhandle Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton intended to be commercial cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm or from an indemnity or other payment received from or related to the planting, growing, or failure of the cotton. Any person eligible to vote in the board member election that resides in the Panhandle Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received by the Department at its office located in Austin by April 23, 2012, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

The board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed to cotton growers by May 8, 2012. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than May 23, 2012, in order to be valid.

**Mighty Milers Run/Walk-a-Thon**

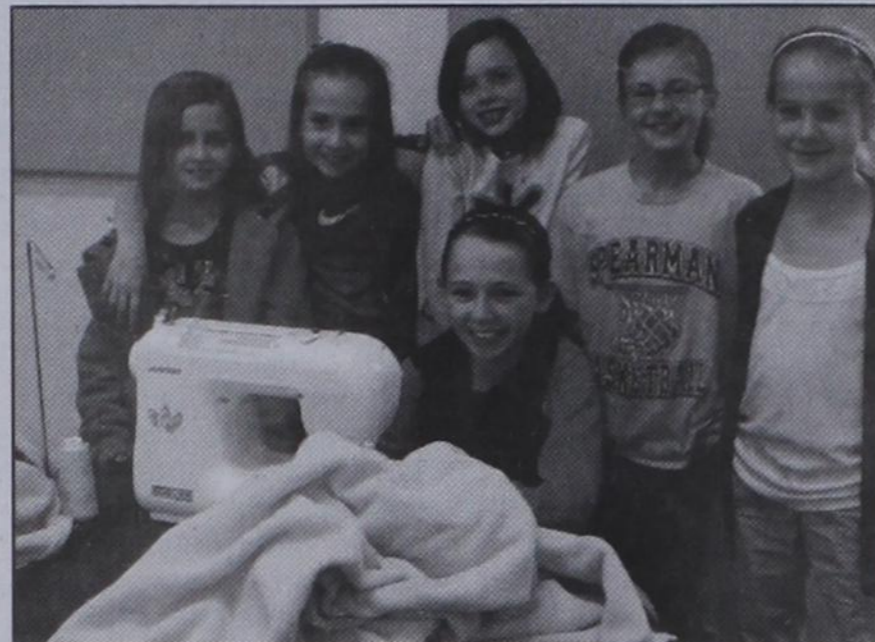

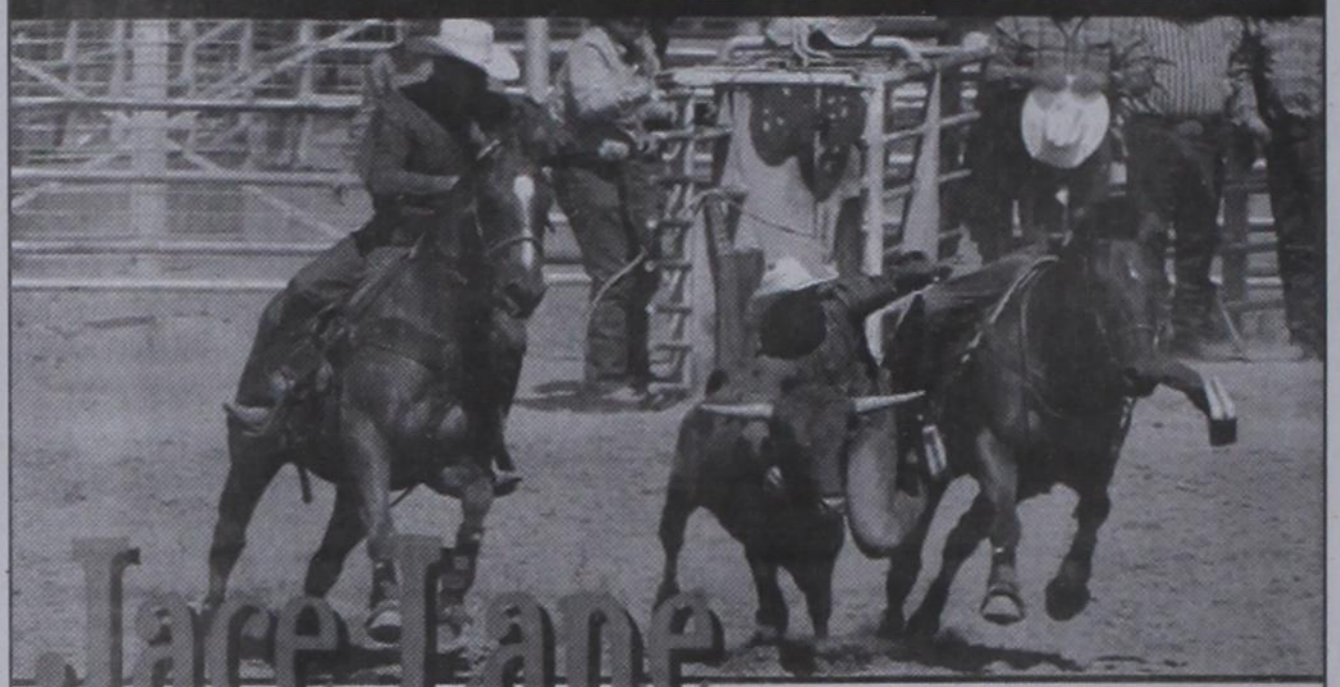

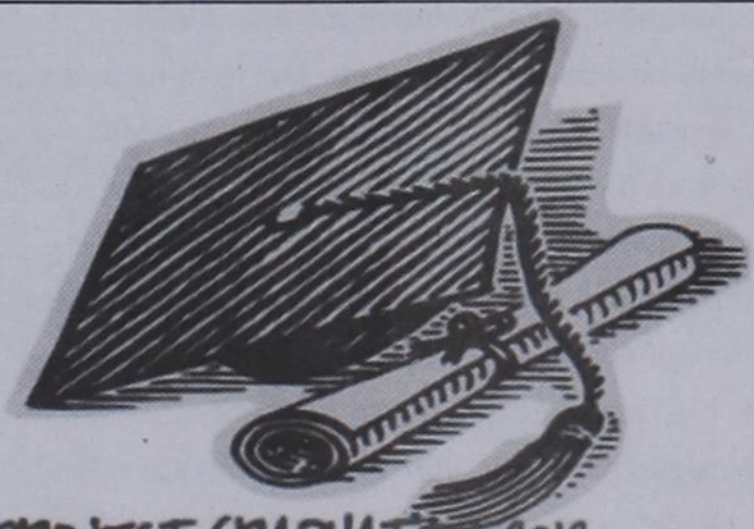

May 1st is the deadline to submit applications for Family Land Heritage Program

In continuing a proud tradition of honoring hard-working generations of Texas farmers and ranchers, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples invites families to apply for the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage (FLH) Program. The program recognizes family farms and ranches that have been in continuous agricultural production by the same family for at least 100 years. Applications are due May 1, 2012.

Through generations of hard work, perseverance and love of the land, these families have operated their farms and ranches for 100

years or more, making Texas a powerhouse of agricultural productivity," Commissioner Staples said. "This commitment to the land is the foundation on which Texas agriculture is built, and thanks to these families and their ancestors, the Lone Star State today stands as a recognized producer of the finest food and fiber in the world."

This year's Family Land Heritage ceremony will be held in the fall at the Texas Capitol in Austin and will recognize farms and ranches established in 1912 or earlier.

Eligible farms and ranches must still be owned and operated by the descendants of the founder, either through blood, marriage or adoption. At least 10 acres

of the land must be in continuous agricultural production for the past 100 years or more. There is no cost to apply for the recognition.

To date, TDA has recognized more than 4,500 properties in 237 counties across Texas. Fayette County, with 151 family operations honored, has been recognized more than any other county since the FLH program began.
