Crisis Center Marks Sexual Assault

Awareness Month The Texas Association Agains Sexual Assault (TAASA) is sponsor ing the Twentieth Annual Sexual Assault Awareness Month, April 2003. The theme of this year's observance is "Texas: A No Rape State." The focus will be on the potential strength of unified communities working together to fight the sexual

violence that plagues our great state. During this month, sexual assaul programs across the state have intensified their efforts to promote public awareness of sexual assault issues, including the need for citizen involvement in reducing sexual assault (by confronting rape-supportive attitudes rather than relying entirely on the criminal justice system), and the need to increase com munity support for agencies providng sexual assault crisis and educa onal services.

Watch For War-**Related Scams**

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott issued a warning urging consumers to be wary of scam artists posing as representatives of charities seeking donations for military families or others inclined to help during

the war effort in Iraq.
"Just as the climate following the 9/11 disasters spawned a mood of charitable giving among people in al walks of life, here too we have a sit uation that stirs deep sympathies and a sense of patriotism, Attorney General Abbott said. "Con artists know this and will take every oppor tunity to exploit military families and others for personal gain.

In addition to bogus charities Abbott warns consumers to be aler to a number of ploys that play off current global affairs and target military families. These include risky of bogus oil investment schemes, work at-home plans that entice stay-athome military spouses, credit card or mortgage deals, and phony life insur ance plans that are designed to appeal to military couples with chil-

Telephone and e-mail scams askfor money to help war and poli ical refugees reach asylum are also on the increase. Add to that Internet retailers that claim to be affiliated with the Red Cross or other organizations. One web retailer selling shirts promoting American's victory over Iraq purported to donate a por tion of its proceeds to the Red Cross Red Cross officials told the Attorney Generals Office its organization had no affiliation or business relationship with the retailer. The business has since stopped making those claims.

Abbott urges those who get such offers to take the time to fully evaluate a source's credibility by asking for background information, refer ences, phone numbers, addresses and other information that would help in

making a decision. Regarding charities, when an individual knocks on the door or calls asking for a charitable donation to help in war-related efforts, take the time to ask a few questions before

offering money. Here are a few tips: *Verify the organization he or she epresents by asking for credentials including exact name, and phone number of the organization, particu

larly if the charity is unfamiliar. * Call the charity and confirm that

the solicitor is connected to it. * Be alert to questionable charitie using names that closely resemble

those of well-known charities. *Find out the planned uses for the money you give; will proceeds directly benefit those in need?

* Be wary of appeals that are long on emotion and short on description about providing help to those in

* A legitimate charity welcome background checks on their opera tions. Don't succumb to high-pres

sure tactics and demands for ar mmediate decision.

* Never give a credit card number to a telephone solicitor.

* Never give cash and never agree to give money to a courier. Write check in the name of the charity, no he individual doing the asking, and et a receipt.

Cop Follows A Different "Beat" In Kosovo Mission

With ears lopped off and his nose sliced, Qeni, a dog adopted by the United Nations Mission In Kosovo (UNMIK) civilian police, is not like any other dog you've ever seen.

But then the border crossing between Kosovo, Yugoslavia and Albania is not like any place, Larry Kenealy, former Spearman Chief

of Police, had ever seen either.

Qeni, which means "the dog" in Albanian, is visible evidence that the land in which Kenealy serves is a land far remote in miles and culture to that he knew in Spearman.

Cutting off the ears of dogs and slicing their noses is a means the inhabitants of this distant country use to make dogs more aggressive.

However, the investment of a few wieners and a little patience by Kenealy and other officers at the border checkpoint, eventually proved this theory fallible.

Qeni soon became a friend of the police and often stands between them and anyone who approaches.

As the Chief of Operations of a civilian police force of the United Nations, Kenealy is on his second tour of duty Kosovo/Yugoslavia.

Learning over the internet of the United Nation's need for police officers in Kosovo through an agency known as DynCorp, Kenealy became interested in the prospect of serving.

"He thought it was something he could do that would really make a difference," Kenealy's wife Caroline said. "It is a place where he felt he could be of most benefit since the area is the major transport from the Golden Triangle of drugs and white slavery.

With that intention in mind, Kenealy began his first tour of duty with the civilian police force in July of 1999.

That tour of duty was followed by a second beginning in October 2002 and will continue until October of this year.

If Kenealy was looking for a challenge, he succeeded. He found electricity and water were both in short supply. With no housing provided, members of the recruited police force were on their own in finding living quarters.

"Larry and another member of the force found housing in the by an older lady. Since the two officers worked different shifts, the apartment owner had her own police protection around the clock," Caroline said. Not only has Kenealy found himself in a new land with new customs, he also worked daily with

fellow officers from Germany, Russia, Pakistan, England, Turkey, France and Africa, whose first language is not English.

It has become Kenealy's daily way of boosting morale to print a joke of the day. Then he watches the reaction of the officers as they

"They will read it first, then laugh, then pull out their translators, think a moment, and then

really laugh," Kenealy said. The jokes are only a temporary respite from the vigilance the offi-

cers must keep.
During the "Iraqi Freedom" war, border agents have been on heightened alert. April 16th was a day of very intense alert as hordes of Albanians were expected to cross the border in commemoration of the date the Serbs drove them from the area with only what they could

It was with great relief that the the border was not flooded with the 50,000 that were expected.

Being separated by thousands of miles from his family is another part of Kenealy's job. It is a fact of life that Caroline and the Kenealy's daughter Kathleen, an eighth grader, have grown accustomed

The Kenealys keep in touch by phone and the internet, but even those means are often undependable.

But the Kenealys situation may not be unique as a civilian police force of over 1,500 officers is now being requested for Iraq. This is the third request for civilian police officers, the first being in Bosnia, and the second in Kosovo.

With his second mission past the halfway mark, Kenealy has expressed the desire to extend his mission by another year. After that, has considered returning to work on his Masters degree and teaching, but that is only one pos-

"Larry is a cop and is dedicated to law enforcement.," Caroline said. "I can't imagine him being happy in any other field."
