## by JoAnn Morten Editor <br> This month's city sales tax ebates to both Spearman and February, according to the State Comptroller's office. In addition, receipts of city sales taxes for 1991 receipts of city sales taxes for 1991 are less than the 1990 total receipts Figures from the Comptroller's office show the City of Spearma received $\$ 22,298.46$ in returned cit cent decrease as compared with the $\$ 23,358.50$ received in February 1990. Gruver's check for $\$ 5,081.75$ reflects a decrease of 7.90 percent from the February 1990 receipts of 5,517.6\%. <br> Total payments to date for Spea man amount to $\$ 31,776.58$, a 9.99 per cent decrease from 1990 payments date of $\$ 35,303.80$. Gruver's payments to date total $\$ 8,017.7$, down 5.32 percent from the $\$ 8,468.5$ received through February 1990 . For Hansford County as a whole, rebates were $\$ 77.39021$ this month down 5.18 percent from the $\$ 28,876.17$ received during the same month last year. Payments to date for the county total $\$ 39,794.35$, a decrease of 9.09 percent from 1990 payments to date, <br> which totaled $\$ 43,772.34$. AIDS. It is aimed at heterosexuals who have more than one sex partne
A TDH survey showed that wine percent of all Texas adults were se ually at risk of contracting the AIDS causing human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, only 10 percent actual
ly believed themselves to be at risk "If you don't see yourself as bein in danger, you're not likely to tak precautions against that danger,
