## Gruver I.S.D. reviews consultant firm resumes

The Gruver I.S.D. Board of Trustees reviewed resumes of engineering and consulting firms interested in working on the proposed heating and air conditioning project for the district.

After reviewing the resumes, the board decided to invite Therman James of James and Huseman, Inc. of Amarillo to visit with the board during the November meeting to discuss the planning and supervision of work on this project.

In other business, the board voted to join the Panhandle Area Association of School Boards for a fee of \$15 and certified the delinquent tax roll for 1992-93.

A discussion was held on a policy regarding senior trips. Upon advice of the school's legal counsel, the board tabled the item. They will work on the policy's wording. The first reading of the proposed policy will be heard during the November meeting.

The board approved naming Dennis Stedje as the district's nominee to serve on the board of directors of the Hansford County Appraisal District.

Gruver High School senior Lee Bob Harper was recognized as the Student of the Month of September. High School Principal Lloyd Looper gave introductions and informed the board that Lee Bob has been active in vocational agriculture activities and UIL activities. He is also serving as a class officer.

They adopted an update to the policy manual. Update 44 brings the current policy in line with legislation passed during the last legislative session.

The board received reports from both Business Manager Margaret Fry and Superintendent Barry Haenisch.

In regular businesses, the board approved the minutes from the previous meeting and approved the payment of bills in the amount of \$80,185.09.

Bid forms have been issued and will be open at the superintendents office on the afternoon of November 4. These bids will be presented to the board during the November

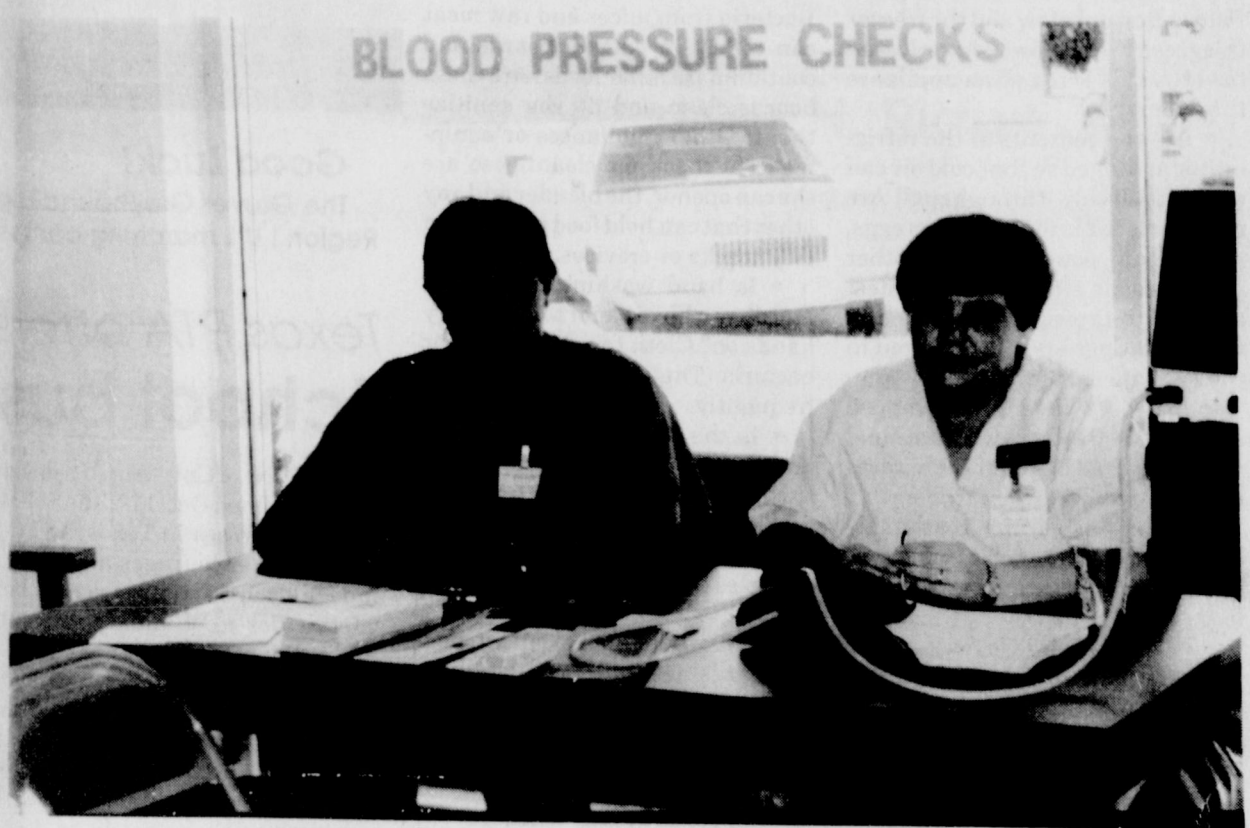
8 meeting.

## Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. holds public hearing on proposed tax rate

The Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District held a public hearing during the board meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 13, to discuss the proposed property tax.

It was reported that the proposed tax rate for the fiscal year be set at \$1.23 per \$100 valuation. Superintendent Beryl Sears stated that last year's combined local and CED tax rate was \$1.228 per \$100 valuation. This rate consisted of \$0.33223 local and \$0.896 CED. He added, "Since the CEDs were abolished, the district will collect all the taxes, and then distribute some funds to comply with Senate Bill 7."

The tax rate was approved during a special meeting was held on Tuesday, Oct. 19.

In other business, Jean Anne Behney, language arts teacher, explained the Academic Teaming Program that has been implemented this year. The Teaming Program is led by a campus team that monitors all students in all subjects. Referrals are made to the team when a student is having academic, social or home problems. Then the team meets with the student to find solutions to the situations.

Behney also reported on her gifted and talented program. She reported that she is serving the Middle School students with enrichment activities that are curriculum related in the regular classroom.

Dana Minton, Middle School so-

cial studies teacher, presented the current seventh grade class budget to the board. She also discussed proposed fund-raisers for the budget.

In other business, the board was informed that the copy machine lease for the teacher workroom expires at the end of November. The lease is currently with Stanfield Printing. The board will be considering proposals for leasing a new copy machine at a future meeting.

Superintendent Beryl Sears reported on school activities scheduled for the next month. October 25

- 29 will be National Red Ribbon Week. Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. will be participating in the War Against Drugs with activities scheduled during the Red Ribbon Week. A drug awareness assembly will be Monday, Oct. 25. On Tuesday, Oct. 26, students will be tying red ribbons. The "War Against Drugs" Carnival will be Thursday, and the Drug Abuse Resistance Education program (D.A.R.E.) will be Friday.

For the final item of business, the board approved operating expenditures in the amount of \$18,933.65.

## Polysonic meter helps farmers measure water flow under pressure

Irrigation farmers can now obtain accurate water measurements from their wells, either at normal flow or under pressure. An electronic flowmeter used in conjunction with an elbow placed in the well discharge pipe and a squeeze valve enables increased working pressure to be placed on the well without endangering existing low pressure irrigation pipelines.

This procedure can assist the farmer in determining the irrigation pumping plant's working condition. This information can then be utilized to evaluate pump repair needs or determine the proper nozzle package if converting to a center-pivot sprinkler system.

The electronic flow meter has two transducers on a bar. The prin-

ciple it operates on is a signal transmitted by one and received by the other upstream and vice versa.

The transducers are attached to the pipe and the measurement is conducted through the pipe wall. The computer then calculates the difference in the speed of the two soundwaves.

Based on the known inside diameter of the pipe and the velocity of the water passing through the pipe, the computer is able to tell how many gallons per minute are flowing through the pipe within a 2

percent accuracy.

## Would Your Kitchen Pass A Health Inspection?

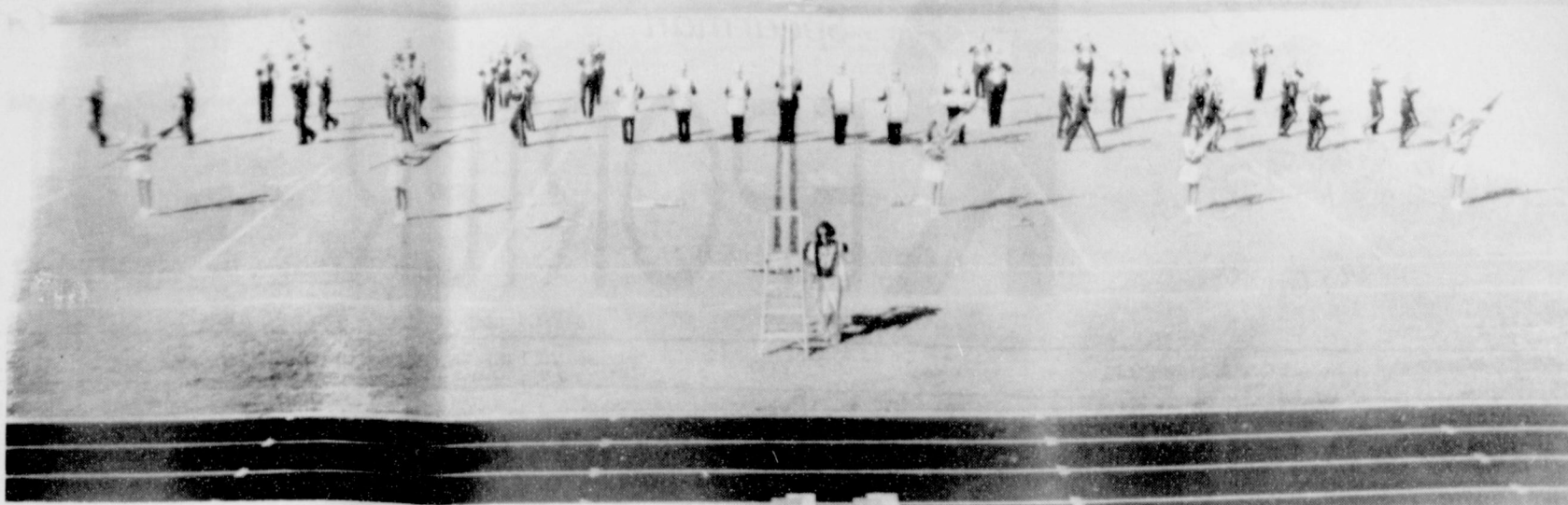
With increasing emphasis on the importance of handling food safely to prevent foodborne illness, consumers may want to ask themselves "would my kitchen pass a health inspection?"

To answer this question, check for these standards in your kitchen:

- Does your refrigerator maintain a temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below and the freezer 0 degrees F. or below? The only way to verify this is to use an appliance thermometer.
- Are the contents of the refrigerator arranged so that cold air can circulate freely throughout? Are most perishable foods such as eggs, milk, meats, poultry, fish and other protein foods stored in the coldest areas of the refrigerator, never on the door? Eggs should be stored in the original carton.
- Are foods covered or wrapped securely? A Bacteria in the air and from uncooked meats or their juices can settle and grow on foods.
- Is the refrigerator reasonably clean? Bacteria from bits of food on shelves can contaminate other foods.
- In the pantry, are foods stored in tightly closed containers and is the pantry area clean and preferably in a cool, dry, dark location? Foods that are stored in dampness,

such as under the sink or close to hear, such as over the range, deteriorate much more rapidly.

- Are cleaning supplies stored out of reach of children?
  - Are work surfaces, the skin, utensils and appliances kept clean? Do you have separate cutting boards for raw meats and foods that are not to be cooked such as vegetables? Bacteria from juices and raw meat can collect in cutting boards and contaminate other foods. Are these boards clean and do you sanitize them? Other appliances or equipment to check for cleanliness are the can opener, the blender and any other that can hold food particles in tiny cracks or crevices.
  - Is hand washing convenient and do you have paper towels to dry hands on? Cloth towels can harbor bacteria. They need to be washed frequently.
  - Is the oven reasonably clean and is there an oven thermometer to check for accurate over temperatures?
  - Is the dishwasher free of food particles that could feed bacteria or insects?
- By following these clean kitchen standards and safe food handling practices, you can help protect your family from the consequences of foodborne illness.

## Texas PTA offers school bus safety tips School bus safety week Oct. 17-23

AUSTIN -- Gov. Ann Richards has proclaimed Oct. 17-23 as School Bus Safety Week in Texas, and the Texas PTA encourages all parents and children to observe school bus safety rules to eliminate preventable accidents.

While students and their parents trust the security of school bus transportation, safety responsibilities not only lie with the bus driver and the occupants but also with motorists on Texas roads.

Recently, the state of Texas changed laws for school bus loading and unloading and instituted new penalties for motorists who disregard these laws. The fine for passing a stopped bus went from "no less than \$50 and no more than \$200" to "not less than \$200 and no more than \$1,000."

It is Texas PTA's hope that Gov. Richards' proclamation of Oct. 17-23 as School Bus Safety week in

Texas will bring awareness to all motorists, parents and children that safety is everyone's job.

Texas PTA encourages all parents to discuss the following safety tips with their children:

- Leave home early enough to arrive at the bus stop several minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive. Avoid running to the bus stop or being shuttled to the bus stop by parents.
- Wait for the bus in a safe place, off the roadway. Avoid horseplay and always respect the privacy and property of others.
- Respect the "danger zone", a 10-foot wide area surrounding the bus on all sides. When waiting to board, remain far enough away from the bus that you can clearly see the driver's face. That's usually about 10 giant steps. When you are sure that the driver has seen you, approach the bus in a single line with-

out running or pushing.

- When it is necessary to cross the street upon boarding or leaving the bus, walk far enough away from the bus so that you can see the driver's face. Wait for the driver to signal that it is safe for you to cross.
- Enter the bus in an orderly manner. Go directly to an available or assigned seat. Remain seated and facing forward at all times while the bus is moving.
- When the bus driver gives you directions, follow them.
- Do not extend your hands, elbows or head through the windows.
- Do not throw or pass objects to someone outside the bus.
- Do not allow large objects such as musical instruments or athletic equipment to block the aisles or emergency exits.
- When leaving the bus, immediately step far enough away from the danger zone so the bus driver can see you. When the bus has pulled away, you can leave.
- Do not return to the bus to pick up anything you left behind. The bus driver might not see you come back to the bus. Purses, sweaters, lunch boxes and school papers can all be replaced. Children can't.
- At the end of the ride, thank the bus driver for getting you home safely.

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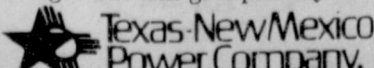
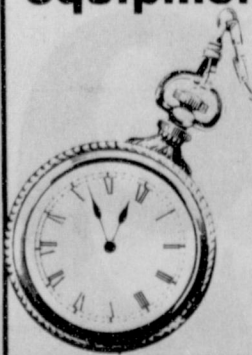

During the regular meeting held Wednesday, Oct. 13, the Gruver City Commission approved a resolution adjusting the electric rates of Southwestern Public Service Company.

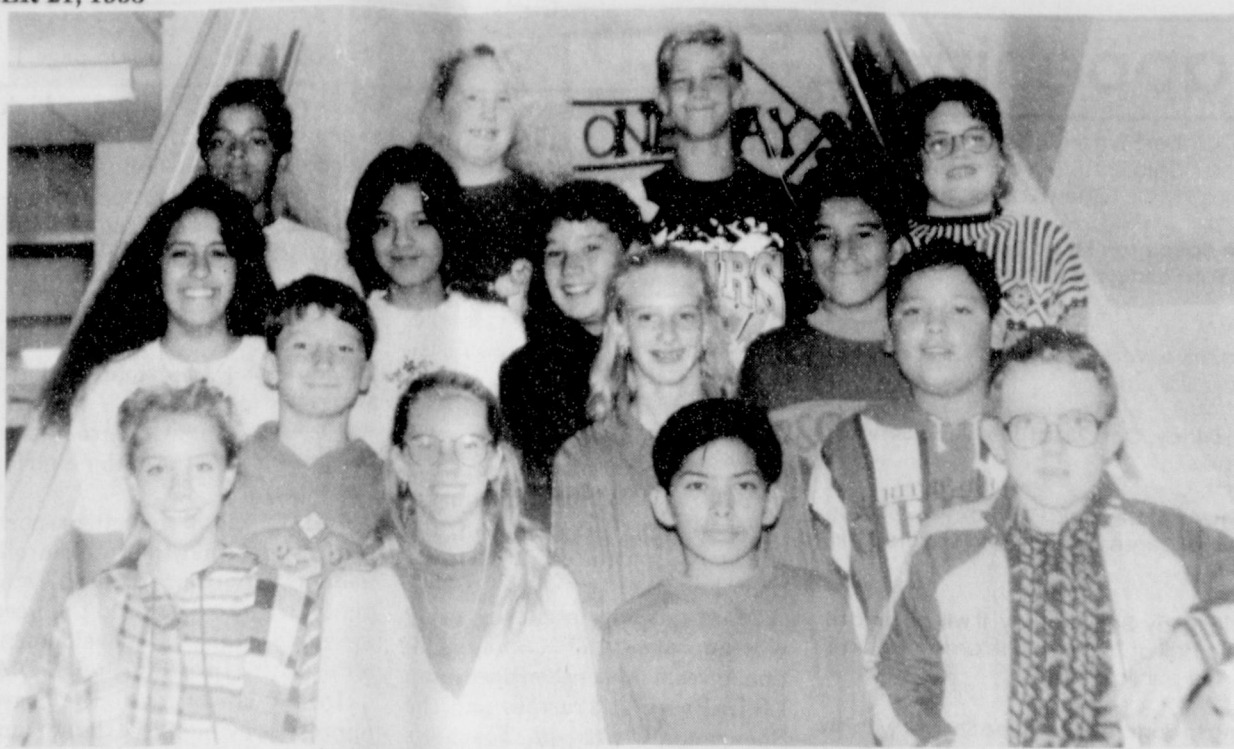

schools, participated in the tryouts.

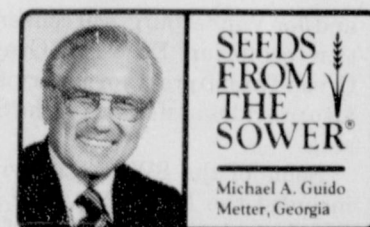
Four of the seventeen Spearman students were chosen and they will go on to the Region I Clinic and Concert on November 6 at the Amarillo Civic Center Auditorium.

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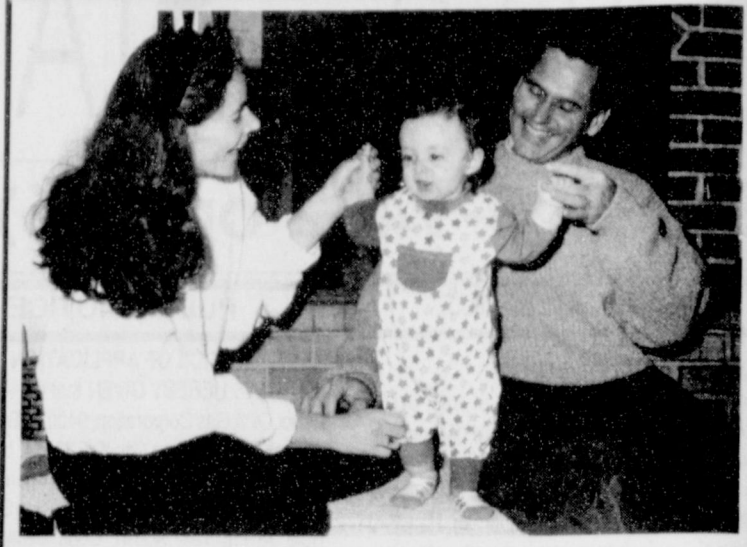
