MARCH 15 - THE IDES OF MARCH

This has long been considered an ill-fated day. The word ides comes from a Latin word meaning "to divide." In fact, the ancient Romans considered the ides of any month unfavorable. The concept of unlucky days survived Julius Caesar (who was assassi-nated on March 15, 44 B.C.—talk about bad luck) and calendar reforms. William Shakespeare made the phrase "Beware the ides of March" a popular saying in his play Julius Caesar.

MARCH 17 - ST. PATRICK'S DAY March 17 is widely accepted as the date of Saint Patrick's death in A.D. 461.

The first St. Patrick's Day parade in the United States was held in New York City on this day in 1762.

Cabbage seeds are often planted today. and old-time farmers believed that to make them grow well, you needed to plant them while wearing your nightclothes.

On St. Patrick's Day, the warm side of a rock turns up, and the broad-back goose begins to lay.

MARCH 20 - VERNAL EQUINOX

Spring begins at exactly 1:48 A.M. (EDT). Wind northeast or north at noon of the vernal equinox, no fine weather before midsummer. If westerly or southwesterly, fine weather till midsummer.

MARCH 21 - FULL WORM MOON

At the time of this spring Moon, the ground begins to soften and earthworm casts reappear, inviting the return of robins. This is also known as the Sap Moon, as it marks the time when maple sap begins to flow and the annual tapping of maple trees begins.



Local Vietnam War Heroes **Honored By** Classmates

Members of the Spearman High School Class of 1966 placed a wreath on the Vietnam Wall replica that was in Perryton last week. Members of the class met at 4:00 p.m. Saturday, March 8 to place the wreath in honor of fallen classmates Lloyd Lynn Busgard and Caerge Thomas Cibner Buzzard and George Thomas Gibner. Tommy and Lynn were killed in June 1969

in Vietnam.

Lloyd Lynn Buzzard and George Thomas Gibner are the legal names of our Class of 66 Vietnam casualties. Both went by their middle names Lynn and Tommy. The Class of '66 had 79 Seniors. Lynn held many honors his senior year, including Student Council President, Sentinel for FFA, Mr. SHS, was in Who's Who, as well as playing football.

Lynn was the son of Dorothy Buzzard and the late Lloyd Buzzard. His grandparents were the late Irvin & Ethyl Hester and the late George & Clara Buzzard. He has one sister, Patty Butt of Spearman. Lynn had mar-ried his childhood sweetheart Bette Brown, who was also from the Class of 66, and they had one boy, Travis Buzzard, who was 6 months old when Lynn was killed. Dr. Travis Buzzard and wife, Megan live in Salt Lake City, Utah. Bette remarried and moved to Arkansas.

Lynn has several cousins still living in Hansford County including Jerald Ray Scribner, who grew up with, buddled with and went to college with him. Tommy was the son of the late Woodrow & Lois Gibner, grandson of the late Dr. George Paton & Minnie Gibner and has one brother, Lynn Gibner, who moved to Portland, OR. Tommy played bass fiddle for and sang with the Lynx Minstrels, was a choir officer, and also played clarinet in Sam Watson's "Marching White Army", who got to play in the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day 1966 in Dallas.



This week we contemplate Palm Sunday by a study of Psalm 118: 1-2, 10-29 and Matthew 21:1-11 and/or we experience Passion Sunday by studying Isaiah 50:4-9a, Psalm 31:5, 9-16, Philippians 2:5-11 and Matthew 27:11-54. The Palm theme is blessed is he that comes in the name of the Lord, as in Psalm 118, "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his steadfast love endures forever!" Matthew 21:1-11 shows Jesus reception in Jerusalem after he has raised Lazarus from the dead in Bethany which is two miles east of Jerusalem. The theme is that Jesus whose essential nature is God emptied himself and took on the nature of a man for our salvation We as Christians are not above our lord and master and therefore should humble ourselves and give God the praise for our successes. The question is not "What would Jesus Do?" Jesus is the Son of God! The first lesson in humility is that 'I am not God'. The question for our lives is "what would the Spirit of God which dwells in me want me to do?" Your challenge dear Christian is not to be better than others, but to be better than yourself through faith.

After weeks of Lenten review of our lives, we each know our short-comings, we each know the joy of the grace of God's salvation, read humbly and carefully the full passion story in Matthew 26:14-27:66. It will convict you. It will call you to repent as we prepare to meet our risen Savior! May the Holy Spirit open your heart to God's grace. Maranatha!





Protect Your Rights "Render Your Taxable Property By April 15th"

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1 of this year. The rendition form is available at the Hansford County Appraisal District.

WHO MUST FILE A RENDITION? You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

ARE THERE ANY ADVANTAGES TO YOU? Yes, the advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in

2007. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2008.

Start seedlings of annuals without causing too much soil disruption. Give peas a chance. The earlier they mature, the sweeter they'll be. Sow them right under the snow, if nec-essary, but save some for a later planting as well. Spread dark plastic intended for mulch over the garden site to hasten the warming of the soil. This will provide for earlier and better germination. Start seedlings of annuals in flats — aster, larkspur, alyssum, and balsam should be started now (or six to eight weeks before the last frost date in your area). If your summer season is short, zinnias should be started now. They will need to be potted up in individual pots after four to five weeks. Start some vegetables in flats now: Brussels sprouts, broccoli, cabbage, cauli-


