Filing for upcoming elections underway

Although elections for Gruver and Spearman City Council and School Board are not until May 6th, people are already starting to sign-up for the positions available on these openings.

The Spearman City Council has three positions available to be filled. So far, only three people have applied for these positions. Incumbents Steve Benton and Ed Gardner have applied again to the Council, as well as new comer Brian Gillaspie.

The Spearman School Board is also up for elections this year. As of yet, two people, Craig Schuman and Bob Boxwell, are the only people signed up for the positions avail-

able.

Gruver's City Council has put forth only one name so far on the positions available. Archie Nelson has applied for Mayor.

Also, the Gruver School Board has had two people sign-up for the positions available. Marquerite Nelson and Buddy Lowe have applied for the Board positions.

The Morse School Board will be having two people with terms expiring. However, only person, Mike Martin, has applied for the openings.

Deadlines for filing on any of these positions is March 22 at 5:00 p.m. Again, the elections will take place May 6th.

City of Spearman holds regular session

The meeting of the City of Spearman was called to order by Mayor Buchanan last February 21 in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

After the invocation by Charles Elliot and the pledge of allegiance by Bob Boxwell, the Council began work on the consent agenda. The first consideration was that of the minutes of last meeting on January 17th, which were approved. Next, the Council considered the monthly fire, ambulance, police, municipal court, animal control, and solid waste reports for January. They too were all approved. The Council then considered and approved the paying of the bills amounting to \$407,765.76.

The Council then moved on to the regular agenda. A public hearing concerning the rates for electric service by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) was opened, with Doyle Bunch, executive Vice President, explaining many of the features of SPS. After the presentation and hearing, the Council immediately passed Ordinance #642, which establishes the rates for electric service by SPS. A very important issues was then brought before the Council on the annual gas leak survey. Five different bidders applied for the contract, but Knauf explained that B & N Con-

sultants have performed the gas leak survey several times before, and the staff was very pleased with the job. An extra bonus to the job was that B & N were also the lowest bidders for the contract.

Still on the regular agenda, the Council went on to adopt Resolution #3-95. This resolution was explained by Knauf that several times in the immediate past, the employees have interpreted the rules differently than management had interpreted this policy of standby/call; out pay; holidays; and overtime. Finally, the Council made a motion to approve a contract with the county for jail services to detain city prisoners at the same rates as the past several years. This motion was also carried.

The last order of business for the Council was a request by Spearman ISD representatives Willard Murrery, Superintendent of Spearman Schools, Scott Beedy, and Bob Boxwell for help on the repair of the school's tennis courts. The idea was also brought up that the Council and the school could possibly join in the building of new tennis courts.

Motion was then given by Garner to adjourn and it was then second by Elliot, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:46 p.m.

FYI: Panhandle counties lead state list of highest per capita incomes. The two leading Texas counties both have small populations total which result in driving up the average levels, according to State Comptroller sources. Sherman county, population 3,000, showed a per capita income of \$36,822 and Hartley County, which has a population of 4,600, showed averages of \$30,630. The Panhandle produced nine of the 23 counties in Texas with incomes ranging from \$20,000 to \$40,000. In addition to Sherman and Hartley counties, data shows Dallam, Hansford, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Parmer and Swisher counties all had per capita incomes ranging from \$20,000 to \$40,000.

Reed returns to States

Navy Seaman Michael B. Reed, a 1993 graduate of Spearman High School of Spearman, recently returned to San Diego after completing a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific with the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk.

Reed was one of 5,000 sailors and marines who completed the 31,000-mile voyage which included military exercises with Korea, Japan and Australia. Reed also participated in Operation Tandem Thrust, an exercise involving 15 ships and 14,000 people from all the services as well as the Australian Navy.

Reed's ship led a nine-ship battle group which included guided missile cruisers equipped with Tomahawk cruise missiles.

Overall, Reed and his shipmates spent 133 days at sea, conducting more than 8,300 carrier takeoffs and landings. With more than 70 tactical aircraft aboard, the aircraft carrier and its accompanying ships

provided a formidable forward presence capable of moving more than 700 miles a day.

Reed and his fellow shipmates also hosted a number of distinguished visitors including: the Secretary of Navy, South Korea's President, Japan's Minister of Defense, and several other state officials of various nations.

While deployed, Reed visited Hong Kong, Singapore, Japan and South Korea.

Reed's involvement in the deployment is an example of how U.S. sailors are serving aboard ships, submarines and aircraft carriers around the world from the Persian Gulf and Western Pacific Ocean to the Mediterranean Sea. Whether delivering humanitarian assistance, cargo, or troops from the seas, these highly-trained naval forces provide a unique crisis-response option, which can be withdrawn quickly when no longer needed.


The article, however, also mentions one of Gafford's bad nights when she finished only two of 11 from the field.



Gruver Greyhounds lose heartbreaker, 63-53

I do not remember exactly where this quote came from, nor do I remember the exact quote. Perhaps it was from a young NFL coach quoting an older, wiser one. It may have been Mike Ditka quoting Vince Lombardi, or it may have been Bart Starr quoting Vince Lombardi. The quote went something like, "The only time you ever lose, is when you quit trying."

Despite their 63-53 loss to the Panhandle Panthers in their bi-district basketball game this past Thursday night, February 23, at the Tex Hanna Fieldhouse in Borger, the Gruver are neither quitters, nor are they losers.

"The kids played well," said Hounds Coach Tim Garland following the game. He continued, "They played a big time ball game, and played really hard. Statistically, we outdid them in every phase of the game. We did not shoot the ball well in the second half, and that 12-0 run really hurt us. We outrebounded them 48-32, and had only 7 turnovers. Our kids did not quit."

The Hounds took a 2-0 lead on a Jace Dawson jumper, but then fell behind. It was not until the very end of the first quarter, with 18 seconds left, that the Hounds took the lead back. Phil De La Cruz hit a pair of free throws to give the Hounds a 14-13 lead at the end of quarter one.

The Panthers regained the lead 15-14, but Max Frick hit a jumper with 7:05 left in the half to give the Hounds a 16-15 lead - a lead they would maintain through nearly all of the remainder of the game. A Wylee Maupin trey at the close of the half, after the Panthers had tied it 18-18, really uplifted the Hounds. They left him wide open, thinking the tallest Hound wouldn't dare shoot a trey, and Wylee nailed it. It was his first three-pointer of the year.

The Hounds built a 7-point lead three times in the third quarter, and it looked as though they would win this game, with a 30-23 lead three-quarters of the way through the third quarter.

But the Panthers scored 6 straight points to cut it to 30-29, and the Hounds could manage only a 36-35 lead at the end of the third quarter, in a low-scoring game.

At the start of the fourth quarter, Chad Bertrand of the Panthers hit a crucial trey to give the Panthers the lead 38-36, and really

sparked them. They built a 4-point lead, but the Hounds came back on a 5-0 run, and on a Brant Armes jumper the Hounds had the lead back 41-40.

But Panhandle regained the lead, and maintained it. With 3:57 left in the game, after a pair of Maupin free throws, the Panthers led only 49-47. That is when disaster struck. The Hounds shooting went ice-cold, and the Panthers were red-hot.

The resulting 12-0 run broke the game open, 61-47. That is when the Hounds really showed their heart, and continued to fight hard, though the game was lost. De La Cruz and Roma Tomlinson nailed treys in the last minute to give the Hounds their final 6 points. But the Panthers lead was just too great. Panhandle outscored the Hounds 28-17 in the fourth quarter for the ten-point victory.

This year's team finished with a lackluster 16-17 record, but that does not speak all. They were 5-12 the first half of the season, and 11-5 the second half.

Seven seniors played their last game. Roma Tomlinson, Kevin McNett, Ryon Atwood, Jace Dawson, Eric Wright, Ricardo Soto and Aaron Frick bid their farewells in a Hounds uniform. They will be sorely missed. Next year's team

figures to have an unbelievable 11 seniors on it, and they will be a force with which to contend. They will almost certainly be district favorites, and possibly state-ranked.



Extension News

Many of us resort to sandwiches for our quick meals. These too can be nutritious. A healthy sandwich is more than a pile of sprouts atop turkey on two slices of bread. There are many healthy sandwich makings that you can try.

Choose enriched, whole-grain breads such as whole wheat, multi-grain, rye, oatmeal, or bran bread. Wrap fillings in soft tortillas or spoon into pita bread. There are also a number of bakery rolls that can be split and used for sandwich variety.

Prepare sandwiches with a variety of mustards, horseradish, or a drizzle of plain low fat yogurt instead of high fat spreads. When preparing salad spread, use less mayonnaise or substitute some plain yogurt.

Substitute chicken or turkey, lean roast beef or lean ham instead of high fat lunch meats. Sprinkle on shredded cheese instead of thick slices of cheese or use a low fat variety of sliced cheese.

Pile sandwiches high with vegetables such as lettuce, spinach, sliced tomatoes, cucumbers, green

pepper slices, shredded carrot, radishes, or zucchini.

Include more chopped vegetables such as celery, onion, cucumber, green pepper, and shredded carrot in chicken, tuna, or egg salad. You can even add coleslaw on top of chicken or turkey sandwiches.

Saute onion, green peppers, and mushrooms and add to a roast beef or turkey sandwich. Diced apple, pears, or grapes and crushed pineapple could be added to chicken, tuna, or turkey salad.

After preparing the sandwich, serve with raw fruits, vegetables or chilled salads and a glass of milk passing up the chips. This can be a healthy meal that is not loaded with fats and calories.

Many homemakers enjoy cooking with copper utensils. This note of caution.....copper is a very reactive metal that can leach into food and easily reach toxic levels if it comes in contact with food. When the inside lining of your pan wears to the point that the copper is showing through, discontinue cooking in it and use only for display.

Recycling Words

Some of the old recyclers have slipped and some of the new recyclers don't know all the rules. Sometimes we think that the rules have changed because we look in the bin and someone else isn't recycling the way that we were told to recycle. It is rule review time - one recyclable at a time. First we look at steel cans. Steel cans are easy to sort and recycle and involve a few simple rules.

Rule #1 is rinse your cans. Even in the spring like temperatures of last week unrinsed cans were taking on new personalities in the recycling bins in Gruver. Can you imagine the proliferation of life and the fiesta of odors that would spring from those same cans in the summer heat, not to mention the other critters this may attract.

Rule #2 is sort your cans. You can tell an aluminum can from a steel can, a steel is magnetic and has a seam. If you run across a can that is a combination of aluminum and steel recycle it in the steel bin.

Rule #3 remove the labels. Most of the label is removed through vacuuming at the detinning plant but some pieces get through lowering the quality of the product. If you remove the label you eliminate this contamination. The tin removed is chemically altered to become stannous fluoride in toothpaste.

Rule #4 is more of a suggestion that a rule but squash your cans if you can. The recycler in our area will have to make less trips if the cans are squashed saving them money and enabling them to run a more profitable operation. It is to our benefit that they are profitable so they may remain in business to serve us through the pending close of the Spearman landfill.

In addition to cans our recycler accepts caps, lids, frozen juice container ends and cookie tins. They do not accept aerosol cans and paint cans...yet. Take just a minute to rinse, peel smooth and sort. Your one minute could save them hours.

If you are not recycling, you are throwing it all away.


Protection is against polio, diph-

Hutchison County Ag Seminar set

Thursday, March 23 is the date scheduled for the Hutchinson County Ag Seminar. The program will begin with registration at 8:30 a.m., with coffee and donuts at the Stinnett Community Building.

The morning program will consist of an explanation of the new crop insurance program by Steve Amosson. Evidently the deadline for purchasing this has been extended in some cases. Amosson will also discuss which level of coverage seems to be the most economical for producers in this area. Leon New, Irrigation Specialist, will cover irrigation and chemigation techniques. There will also be some discussion of drip systems.

One area in production that is often overlooked has to do with proper planting. For example, research has shown that a one inch error in planting spacing of corn results in a three bushel loss. Bobby Knoll of NC+ covers this topic quite well and tells of a study where 73% of the fields examined had a 12 bushel per acre loss due to improper planting. Rounding out the morning program will be J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range Specialist. Cadenhead will offer suggestions on how we can treat some of the CRP land that will be coming out within the next year or so. Questions that always arise regarding CRP are what options are available

to the producers regarding the disposition of this land? If it is to be grazed, how do I treat it? Should I burn it? If so, when?

Following a noon meal sponsored by NC+, Brent Bean and Carl Patrick, Extension Specialist, will discuss No Till Wheat following a corn crop, Worker Protection Standards that is now law, requirements of posting pesticide signs, and a pesticide update when using No Till.

Four CEU's will be given to those attending. The program is free and is expected to conclude by 2:30 p.m.


