be nutritious. A healthy sandwich Includemorechopped vegetables is more than a pile of sprouts atop such as celery, onion, cucumber, turkey on two slices of bread. There green pepper, and shredded carrot are many healthy sandwich mak ings that you can try.
Choose enriched, breads such as whole wheat, multigrain, rye, oatmeal, or bran bread Wrap fillings in soft tortillas or spoon into pita bread. There are also a number of bakery rolls that can be split and used for sandwich variety. ty of mustand wiches with a variety of mustards, horseradish, or a drizzle of plain low fat yogurt in-
stead of high fat spreads. When preparing salad spread, use less preparing salad spread, use less
mayonnaise or substitute some plain yogurt.
Substitute chicken or turkey,
lean roast beef or lean ham instead of high fat lunch meats. Sprinkle on shredded cheese instead of thick slices of cheese or use a low fat variety of sliced cheese.
Pile sandwiches high with vegetables such as lettuce, spinach, sliced tomatoes, cucumbers, gree in chicken, tuna, or egg salad. You can even add coleslaw on top of chicken or turkey sandwiches. Saute onion, green peppers, and
mushrooms and add to a roast beef or turkey sandwich. Diced apple, pears, or grapes and crushed pineapple could be added to chicken, tuna, or turkey salad.
After preparing the sandwich, serve with raw fruits, vegetables or chilled salads and a glass of milk passing up the chips. This can be a healthy meal that is not loaded with fats and calories.
Many homemakers enjoy cooking with copper utensils. This note of caution.....copper is a very reac-
tive metal that can leach into food and easily reach toxic levels if it comes in contact with food. When the inside lining of your pan wears to the point that the copper is showing through, discontinue cooking in it and use only for display.
