# **Hospital Board adopts budget** for 1992-93 fiscal year

The 1992-93 budget of \$5,081,584 was adopted at the Board of Directors meeting of Hansford County Hospital held Thursday, August 13 at 7 p.m. in the Hansford Hospital Board Room.

This budget is \$69,147 less than the 1991-92 budget for the fiscal year and will require the use of \$34,241 in reserve funds.

Board members also voted to set the tax rate for the 1992-93 fiscal year at \$0.37 per \$100 valuation. This figure consists of an Interest and Sinking rate of \$0.12754 and a Maintenance and Operations rate of\$0.24246. The rate that the board set is one and one-half cent decrease from the 1991-92 tax rate of \$0.385. It was figured that the tax revenue to the Hospital District would decrease by \$82,792 because of the decline in the tax base and the tax rate reduction. The expected tax levy is \$1,360,208, according to Anne Snow

Another item brought before the board was a long range financial plan. Anne Snow and Albert LaRochelle gave a presentation on the need to implement such a plan

The Palo Duro River Authority voted to award the bid for paving the West boat ramp and roads to Ed Baker of Borger at the Tuesday, Aug. 11, meeting.

Although the tax rate has remained the same, property valuations have decreased. According to the Hansford County, Texas Summary of Property Valuations & Tax Rates for the Ten Years Ending 1992, the property valuations have decreased by \$38,953,098 since 1990. In 1990 property valuations

was \$397,741,894, it has dropped to \$365,897,796 in 1992. Judge Brown said, "This (the 1992 property valuation) is the lowest we've had in 10 years." The property valuation of 1983 was \$367,122.654 and is still higher than 1992s.

In order to keep from raising the tax, some of the reserve funds are going to be used, said Judge Brown.

### Labor day holiday approaches fast, Sept. 7



# Library Book Notes

For instance, if each American family planted one tree, a billion pounds of "greenhouse" gases would be removed from the atmosphere each year. Or, if we all installed "low flow" showerheads, we could save billions of gallons of water every year

and never notice the difference in the spray of our showers.

I urge you to stop by and check out this book and learn how you may be able to save energy and perhaps money, too.

By the way, you might wonder about the answers to the questions just mentioned. Dust on a light bulb can reduce the amount of if light it provides by ten percent and make you think that you need a brighter bulb in the socket, and that would cost you more to operate.

Also, in the winter the air at you ceiling can be 15 degrees warmer than the air at your floor because warm air rises. A ceiling fan run in the "reverse" setting can push warm air from the ceiling down to the floor in the winter and reduce that temperature difference to less than three degrees.
