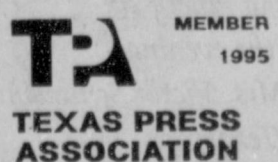

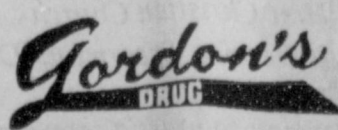

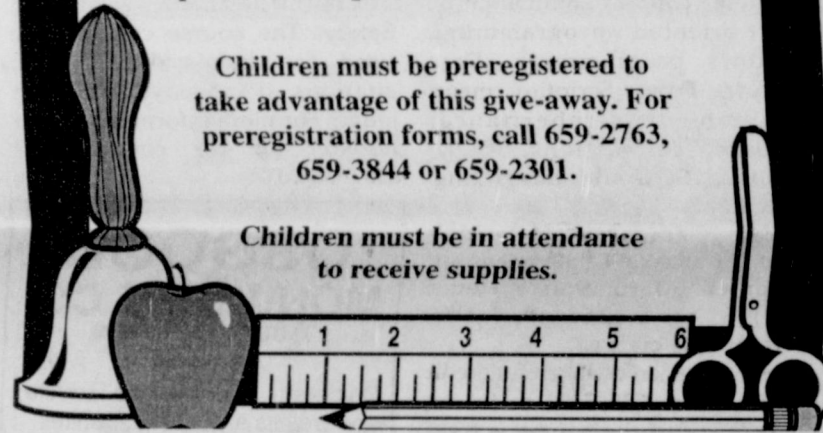

Focus On The Family

QUESTION: What is the most common marital problem you hear about in your office?
DR. DOBSON: Let's suppose I have a counseling appointment at four o'clock tomorrow afternoon with a person whom I've never met. Who is that person, and what will be the complaint that brings her to me? First, the patient will probably be Mrs. Jones, not her husband.

A man is seldom the first to seek marriage counseling, and when he does, it is for a different motive than his wife seeks it. She comes because her marriage is driving her crazy. He comes because his wife is driving him crazy.

Mrs. Jones will be, perhaps, between 28 and 42 years of age, and her problem will be extremely familiar to me. Though the details will vary, the frustration she communicates on that afternoon will conform to a well-worn pattern. It will sound something like this:

"John and I were deeply in love when we got married. We struggled during the first two or three years, especially with financial problems, but I knew he loved me, and he knew I loved him. But then something began to change.

"I'm not sure how to describe it. He received a promotion about five years ago, and that required him to work longer hours. We needed the money, so we didn't mind the extra time he was putting in. But it never stopped.

"Now he comes home later every evening. He's so tired I can actually hear his feet dragging as he approaches the porch. I look forward to his coming home all day because I have so much to tell him, but he doesn't feel much like talking.

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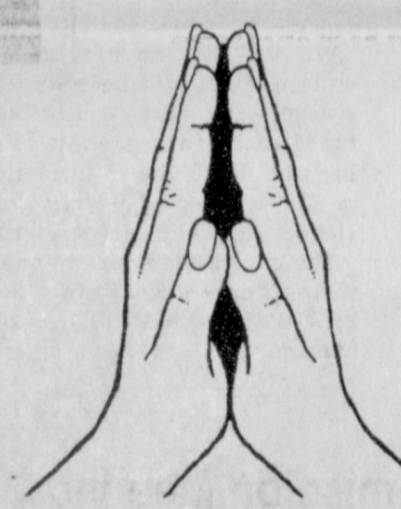

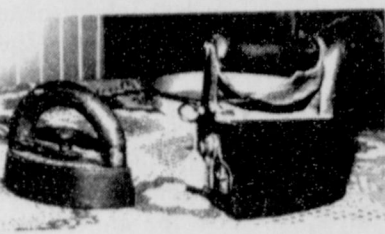

Ironing anyone? This is almost an "art" of the past. It really would be if we had to do it like the women of bygone days.

One of the irons at the Museum has a detachable handle. The base of it would be put on the cookstove to heat, then the wooden handle would be reattached to iron. Those little critters are heavy too.

The other iron has a place to put hot coals in so the iron will heat. It has a vent to let out steam. This was the original steam iron with no water.

Our 1902 edition of the Sears, Roebuck & Co. catalog lists Mrs. Potts' Sad Irons with forged stretcher handle, in sets of three with detachable wood handle for 67 cents. The set came in different weights. One iron was 4 pounds, one was 5 1/8 pounds and one was 5 3/8 pounds. The handle will not break if dropped. The set comes with a finely polished stand. (A person would not have to lift weights after a day of ironing.)

The Charcoal Iron is listed with a removable top, wood handle with tin shield, and one flue. This has a weight of 6 1/2 pounds empty. The retail price is 85 cents.

My prediction is Gruver 8-2 with a district championship, and Spearman 7-3 with a district co-championship; but, only

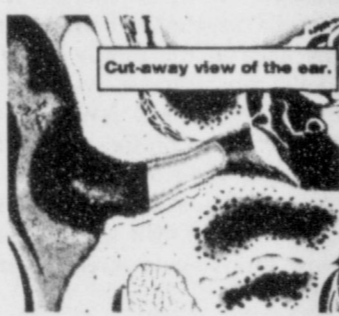
because Gruver's schedule is easier.

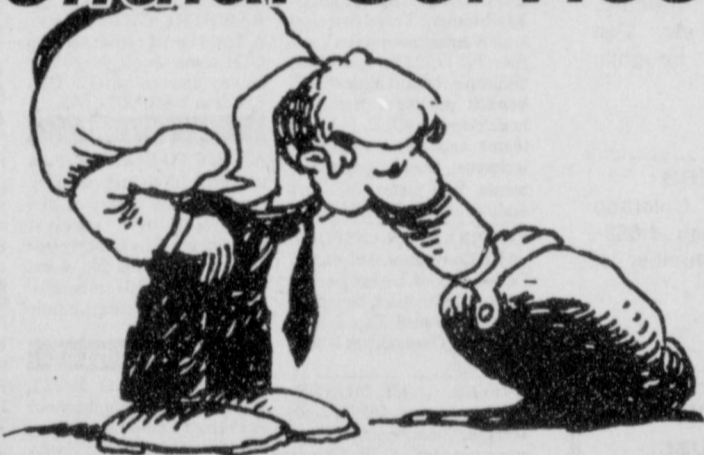

Agriculture News

"Assistance is available to producers of seeded small grain forage who lost forage production because of drought conditions occurring from September 1995 through June 1996," said Harold Bob Bennett, State Executive Director of the Texas Farm Service Agency. This assistance is offered through the Non-Insured Assistance Program, or NAP.

Hansford County has been designated as an eligible NAP area for the September to June drought and the only crop eligible for NAP benefits under this designation at this time is seeded

small grain forage. Producers who suffered seeded small grain forage losses due to the drought should have timely reported their acres, losses, evidence of production and all other information required to determine their eligibility for NAP benefits at the county office. Acreage reports, notices of loss, and NAP applications filed now are considered late-filed.

"Seeded small grain forage producers must meet the late-filing deadline of August 30, 1996, to apply for NAP benefits," said Bennett. Any requests for NAP for 1996 seeded small grain forage filed after this date will not be approved.

Seeded small grain forage producers must file all necessary information with the Hansford County FSA Office by August 30. This includes acreage reports, notices of loss, and applications for payment, along with acceptable records of both historical and current year production.

Only a person who actually owns or leases the acreage, plants and produces the seeded small grain forage crop, and grazes or leases the acreage for grazing to another person is eligible for NAP benefits.

Seeded small grain forage includes fields seeded to wheat, barley, oats, rye, triticale, or any combination of those crops. Seeded small grain forage acreage eligible for NAP includes:

- acreage planted and reported with an intent of full season grazing (fall, winter, and spring)

- acreage planted and reported with an intent of fall and winter grazing only, followed by grain production in the spring

- acreage planted and reported with an intent of spring grazing only (in limited cases only)

- small grain forage interseeded in an existing stand of grass

The Hansford FSA county director, Preston Wright, is asking all interested producers to please come to the office. A worksheet has been prepared to help producers organize the required information. Mr. Wright would like all producers to pick up the worksheet prior to making application. Once the worksheet has been completed and the supporting documentation assembled producers should contact the Hansford County FSA for an appointment to complete the application process.

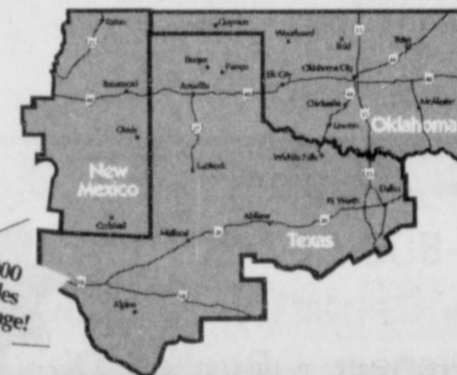

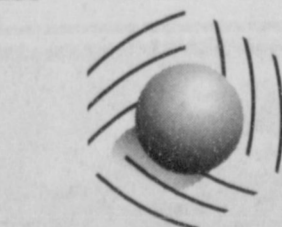
