If you suspect you have been given a counterfeit bill please try to get a description of the person that gave you the bill and/or a description of the vehicle and license plate number.



Texas, December 12- Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 0.5 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.08/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 0.7 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.28/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 29.3 cents per gallon nigher than the same day one year ago and are 14.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 15.0 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 32.2 cents per gallon higher than this day one

"Gasoline prices remain in limbo across parts of the U.S. while oil prices continue to swing in different directions as traders digest changes in market sentiment," according to GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "The national average remains subdued close to levels that we saw last week, but prices may soon move slightly higher as they follow a rising trend in wholesale gasoline prices," DeHaan added. GasBuddy operates, TexasGasPrices.com, and over 225 other local gaso-

line pricetracking websites that follow prices at over 125,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. GasBuddy also uses Facebook (facebook.com/gasbuddy) Twitter (twitter.com/gasbuddy), and phone apps to keep motorists ahead of changing gasoline prices.

## Farm Service Agency Offers Producers a Free **Online News Service**

Up-to-the-Minute Farm Program News Direct to Your Email Account or Smartphone

USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, James Douglass announced that farmers and ranchers in Texas now have a more efficient, timely option for receiving important FSA program eligibility requirements, deadlines and related information.

"FSA is now offering free online communications through our GovDelivery electronic news service," said Douglass. "News will now be sent via e-mail right to your home or farm office or to your Smartphone - allowing you to receive immediate notification of farm program news that is pertinent to your agricultural operation," he said.

Through FSA's GovDelivery electronic news service, producers can establish subscriber preferences by choosing to receive federal farm program information by topic, by state and/or by county. Producers can select as many subscriber options as they want, which allows producers who farm in multiple counties or across state lines to receive updates from each county in which they operate or have an interest.

According to Douglass, GovDelivery is a one-stop shop for the most up-to-date USDA program informa-

"If, after using this online system, producers no longer wish to receive hardcopy newsletters from their local county office, they should contact the office and make their preferences known," said Douglass. "Gov-Delivery will enable FSA to keep producers better informed and allow us to conserve resources and reduce taxpayer expenses associated with the preparation, printing and distribution of hardcopy newsletters," he






