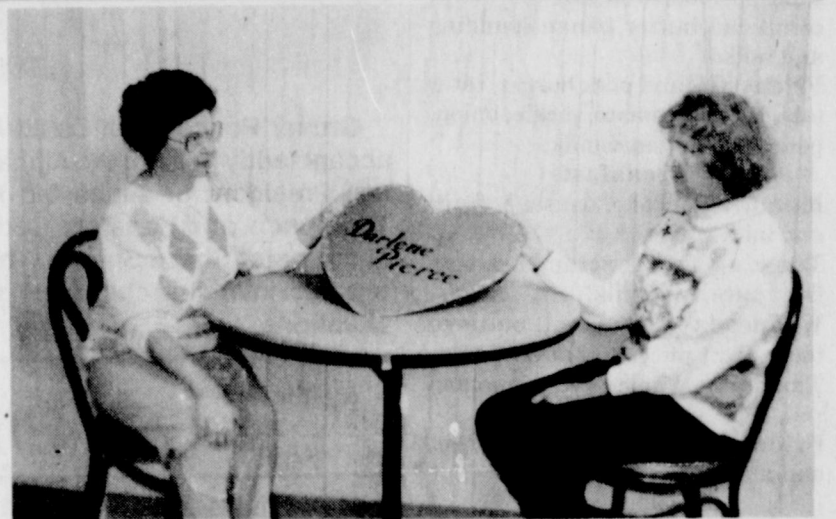
Individuals can also participate in a silent and live auction scheduled for the evening.

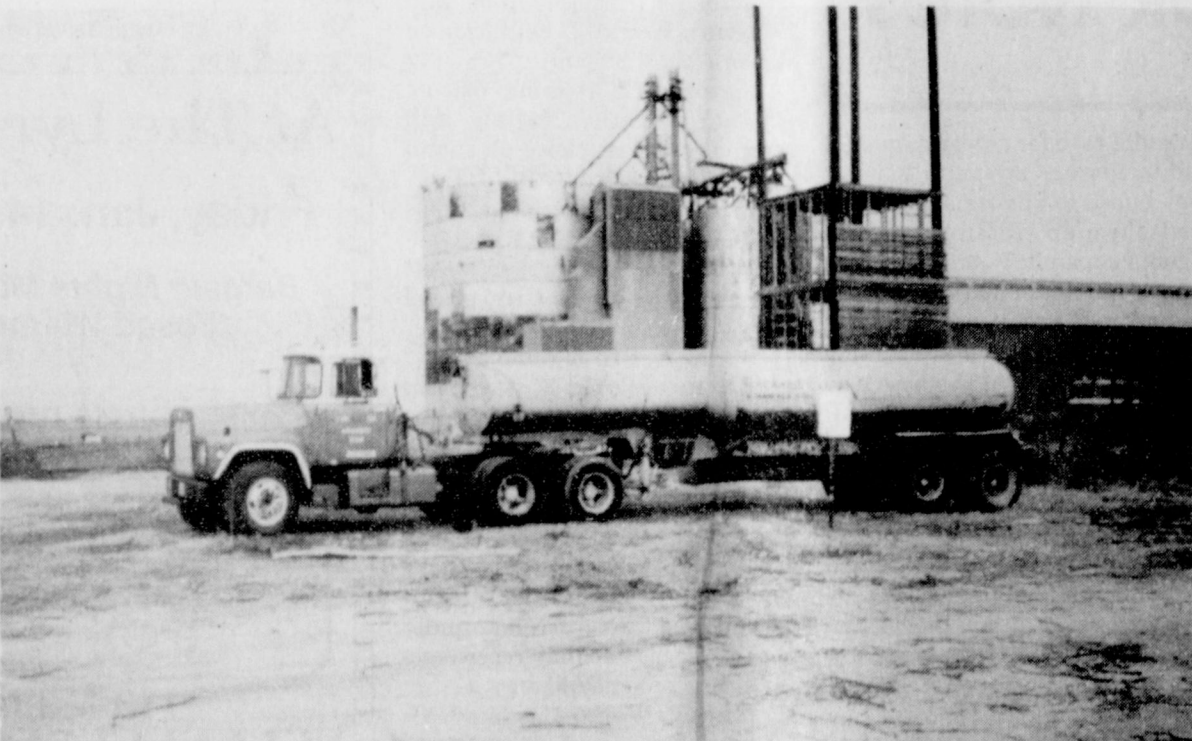

She reported that 99 percent of the seniors have passed the TAAS exit test and expects all members of the class to pass that test before graduation. Gruver Volunteer Fire Department seeks donations to complete project

The Gruver Volunteer Fire Department is \$3,000 short of their \$18,000 goal for their tanker truck project.

According to Fire Chief Sam Gruver, the department has received approximately \$15,000 in donations since the project kicked off in the middle of December. He explained that the department sent letters to anyone having a fire in the last three years and to owners of large amounts of CRP and grass-land.

He continued that as of Tuesday, Jan. 11, 50 individuals have responded with donations. "It has been a better turnout than we ex-

pected," Sam stated.

In the letter, the department explained that they are in the process of purchasing and outfitting a 5000 gallon tanker truck in order to have an immediate supply of water for rural fires in our area of response.

They explained that the tanker truck is needed since there are over 40,000 acres of CRP alone surrounding many homesteads. Sam stated in the letter that the truck will meet the majority of all the water needs of CRP ranch land, feedlot and structural fires in the Gruver area.

"For years the department has fought everything with me truck, but with CRP there is more that can burn and we have to have more

equipment to be able to fight it," Sam stated. The department currently owns three fire trucks that the tanker truck can haul water to.

Thus far, the department has purchased a 1982 Mac truck and a 5,000 gallon stainless steel tank. The tank has been replumbed and an additional pump was added so they have the ability to draft and pump.

Although the goal is expected to be completed at the end of January, there is still a lot of work to be done. "We are still looking for donations to complete the project," Sam said.

He concluded by saying that the department appreciates the donations they have already received and will be grateful for any other donations to the project.

Commissioner's Court opens bids for pickup

The Hansford County Commissioner's Court opened bids for a pickup for Precinct #3, Kent Guthrie's precinct.

Gillaspie Auto and Truck Center submitted the low bid and it was approved by the commissioner's to purchase the pickup for \$13,988. Gruver Ford also submitted a bid for the 4X4 heavy duty 1/2 ton pickup. Their bid was for \$14,395.

In other business, the commissioner's approved the jail contracts with the City of Spearman and the City of Gruver. According to Judge Jim Brown the contract is the same as last years. The cost is \$20 per inmate and \$4.25 per meal.

The ambulance contract with the City of Spearman was extended for one more year.

Two road easements were approved and one was tabled. A easement for G.T.E. passed for Precinct #1, Worley Smith's precinct. An easement for C.E. Harmon Oil, Inc. was tabled because no papers were received Brown stated. He continued that an easement for a dedica-

tion of a new road was approved for Precinct #4, Val Winger's precinct.

Members of the 1994 Grievance Committee were appointed. There are four committee members and two alternates. However, Brown explained that individuals appointed had not been contact as of Tuesday, Jan. 11, to see if they will serve. Brown explained that these individuals were selected because they were the last people to serve on the Hansford County Grand Jury.

The commissioners approved bonds for R.L. McFarlin, Jr. and John L. Hutchinson.

Sam Gruver of the Gruver Volunteer Fire Department informed the commissioners that an engine was in need of repairs. Brown stated that it was a budgeted item and no action was needed.

The commissioners heard concerns from the ladies from extension clubs and 4-H sponsors about replacing Karen Babitzke.

In regular business, the commissioners approved the minutes from the previous meeting, the treasurer's report and investments, and paying the bills for the period.

S.I.S.D. Board of Trustees approves sale of vehicles

The Spearman I.S.D. Board of Trustees approved the sale of a station wagon and bus to the high bidder during the regular meeting held Monday, Jan. 10.

According to Superintendent Willard Murrey, \$735 was the high bid for the 1983 Chevy Station Wagon. It was submitted by Bob McArthur of Guymon, Okla. Three other bids were received for the vehicle.

The high bid for the 1964 Silver Eagle Bus was \$6,400, according to Murrey. This bid was submitted by Ralph Lane of Wichita Falls. Four other bids were received for the bus according to Murrey.

The board was informed that the district had received an adjustment notification from the TEA. The adjustments take affect immediately. Based upon data from the previous three school years, a negative adjustment of \$94,275 is being made. Murrey stated that this means less money for the district.

Alice Peddy of the Hansford County Appraisal District addressed the board. She review property tax values and answered questions from the board. The 1993 tax roll was approved.

In other business, the board checked with the districts legal counsel on participation in TASB Workers' Compensation Self-insurance Fund Class Action Suit. The board was advised to take no action, so that is what the board did, Murrey stated. He explained that by taking no action the district will be a participant in the class action suit.

Golden Spread's bids for the gas and diesel were approved. They submitted a bid of 56¢ for gas and 58.25¢ for diesel.

The next regular meeting has been rescheduled to Monday, Feb. 21. This meeting was set for February 14; however, it was a school holiday. Murrey added that the commissioner of education will be in Amarillo on February 14 and wants to meet with the high school principals and superintendents of Region 16.

Budget amendments were approved. Murrey stated that the board transferred money from one account to another in these amendments.

John Zimmerman, Choral Director, informed the board that Carol Alvarado will be competing in state choir in San Antonio. They will be

The Municipal Court is probably one of the least favorite and least understood City departments. No one likes having to go to Municipal Court because it usually means that you have been charged with a misdemeanor such as speeding, disorderly conduct, or violation of a City ordinance. Most citizens don't understand that if you are found guilty of a misdemeanor and have to pay a fine, part of the fine goes to the State of Texas. The rest of the fine is kept by the City of Spearman.

Below are some samples of misdemeanors or violations and listing the amount which goes to the State and the amount kept by the City.

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Minding Your Own Business

C.O.P.E. with 1994

Recently, I was visiting with a small business owner who felt that life's pace was accelerating too rapidly. I agreed, and we discussed how the rapid changes in the way we live and work affect every aspect of how we do business.

This frenzied pace leaves most of us anxious at times. There is often more pressure, shorter deadlines and more to be done. As the pressure builds, so does the stress. As stress levels increase, our productivity diminishes and we find ourselves caught in a vicious circle.

How do we slow down life's merry-go-round? How can we lower stress levels and enjoy our lives? How can we stay productive on the job?

Here are four tips gleaned from writings of several experts. I like acronyms, so I've formed the word C.O.P.E. from the four key words of these tips. I hope it will allow you to remember them throughout 1994.

Change

The first step in learning to cope is to embrace change. Many of us fear change. We are afraid of the unknown. We are comfortable in our routine. Yet change is inevitable.

To lower your stress levels, anticipate change. Rather than resisting new programs or technology, reach out for them. You will find that as Franklin D. Roosevelt said, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself."

Spending your creative time looking for the positive side of change. Dwelling on the negative or reliving the past will not cause the inevitable changes to go away. Don't waste your energy on a fight you won't win.

Organize

Those of us who surround ourselves with piles of work we're going to do soon are organizationally deficient. We adamantly declare that we know where everything is in our piles, but in truth we lack organization.

Be a filer, not a piler. This tip has helped me organize my life to some degree. Any item worth piling up or storing away for future reference or

use, is worth saving in a logical, organized manner. I waste time nearly every day looking for something in my pile. I'm getting better, but I still need to improve.

Prioritize

Prioritizing your life is a great way to reduce stress and save time. If you have trouble getting everything on your "to do" list done, try this technique. First, determine the most important work to do and focus on getting it done. Second, work your way down the list and finish the next most critical items. Finally, use any leftover time to complete the least important work.

The key to prioritizing is to set aside all but the most important element. Clean off your work area so you can stay focused on one task. Otherwise, you may find your mind wandering from one project to another.

Enjoy

Look for ways to make work fun. Search for ways to have fun that have nothing to do with work. Life is short. Work hard when you work, but allow time to enjoy smelling the flowers. I doubt that as we near death's door, we'll look back and say, "I wish I'd spent more time at the office or store."

Personally, I find it depressing to be around people who are too serious. Now don't get me wrong, my work is serious, your work is serious, your business is serious. However, we shouldn't take ourselves too seriously.

Enjoy every minute of every day. Stay focused on the positive and look for ways to have fun.

ENABLING VS. EMPOWERING

The goal of good parenting is to guide children and youth from dependency to independence and self-responsibility -- a demanding process that takes a long time. Parents behave and act in a variety of ways to achieve this goal.

Young people become independent and responsible when they are empowered. However, most parents are highly skilled at "enabling" and unskilled at "empowering" their children and adolescents, notes Dr. Sarah L. Anderson, family life specialist with the Texas A&M University.

Enabling involves getting between the child or adolescent and life experiences to minimize the consequences of their choices. It involves protecting the adolescent from the consequences of the choices they made. Enabling responses include:

- Doing too much for them
- Controlling or punishing
- Overprotecting and rescuing
- Lying for them
- Giving them too much
- Living in denial

Empowering involves turning over control to the adolescent as soon as possible so that they have the power over their own lives. It involves letting children and adolescents suffer the consequences of the choices they make. Empowering responses include:

- Doing nothing with love (listening and giving emotional support and validation without fixing or discounting)
- Teaching life skills
- Working on agreements through family meetings or joint problem-solving
- Letting go (without abandoning)
- Deciding what you will do with dignity and respect
- Sharing what you think, how you feel and what you want (without lecturing, moralizing, insisting on agreement or demanding that anyone give you what you want)

• Sticking to the issue with dignity and respect.

"Comparing the list of enabling responses and empowering responses makes it easy to see the difference. Unfortunately, the enabling responses are second nature to most parents," says Anderson.

The difficult part of empowering adolescents is that this power over their own lives often leads to mistakes and failures. Only when parents understand that learning from one's own mistakes and failures is an important part of a successful life process, can they understand the importance of using empowerment rather than enabling in guiding youth.

Follow up investigation of aircraft accident reported in Reporter-Statesman, Jan. 6, 1994.

Fatal accidents are investigated by the N.T.S.B. Non fatal major accidents are investigated by the F.A.A.

Since this was not a fatal accident and even though the ultra-lite suffered substantial damage, it was not a certified aircraft according to the F.A.A., they weren't involved.

I am writing this to clarify what happened and to not scar or blemish this sport type flying.

Since 1072 when I received my private pilots license and multi engine in 1983, I have flown over 350 hours of which has included several different aircraft types. Tricycle gear, tail draggers, turbo props and jets.

I operated a F.B.O. (general aviation repair shop) as a licensed A&P mechanic and aircraft inspector. Being responsible for returning to service airplanes after major inspection and or repair from the basic Cessna 150 to Boeing 747.

I have test flown several aircraft, built an airplane and have had 2 forced landings. I have only

bent or broken one, the last one, an ultra-lite.

I feel I am a current and competent pilot and mechanic. Not ever wanting to fly for a living, I enjoy flying and always will.

Thinking ultra-lites would be fun to fly, I bought one. They are extremely fun and safe if you operate them in the manner in which they were meant to be flown. I did and it was.

Here is what happened.

It was so much fun I wanted to share. I made a major modification. Since I had plenty of power and wing, I thought it would be nice if I put a bench type seat on my aircraft. I did and doing so I changed the control stick from the right side to the left of the airplane.

Complacency bit me in the butt. All work went well and was structurally sound. A thorough pre-flight was made and everything worked smooth and well. Except part of the controls (the spoilers) were hooked up backwards.

That is why major alterations or repairs are required to be inspected and signed off by two mechanics on F.A.A. certified aircraft. The com-

placent mechanic messed up.

The ultra-lite did good, what it was told. The pilot did good, what he was supposed to do.

In real certified aircraft, people are killed as a result of the same thing. Control reversal. A real airplane would have been going 70 mph. I was only going 25.

Also, people are killed when they hit 7200 volt power lines. Believe me, approaching power lines 20 feet from above knowing they aren't going to be avoided, I thought I would be dead. They only use 2400 volts in the electric chair.

Hounds, Lady Hounds on victory roll

The Gruver Greyhounds and the Gruver Lady Hounds are playing like gangbusters this past week, each with a pair of victories to their credit. For the Lady Hounds, they have been winning like this most of the season, but for the Hounds it is good to see them on a roll.

"A victory like this does us a world of good," said Gruver Coach Tim Garland Tuesday night, after the Hounds had defeated the defending district 1-AA champion Highland Park Hornets 73-67 in an overtime thriller at Greyhound Gym. "I can see the kids gaining a world of confidence in themselves, with a belief in what they can do. They left their heart and souls on the court."

For the first three quarters of this game, the lead fairly jockeyed back and forth between the two teams. Gruver held an 11-10 lead after the first quarter, the Hornets led 23-22 at the half, and Gruver had the lead back 38-36 after three. But in the fourth quarter, the Hornets picked up the pace, and had the lead up to seven points a couple of times, and led by six with under a minute to play, 59-53. But that was when the Hounds pulled a miracle finish.

Jace Dawson hit a jumper with 27 seconds left in the game to pull the Hounds within four, 59-55. Then, after the Hornets nailed one of two free throws (they were 10-11 at the charity stripe in the 4th quarter), Dawson was fouled, and hit one of two free throws, to cut the lead to four again, 60-56. That free throw came with only 18.9 seconds left in the game. But the Hounds got the ball back, and Roma Tomlinson quickly nailed a 3-pointer with 10 seconds left, and the Hounds called time out, trailing 60-59. The Hounds fouled, but with only 4.6 seconds left in the game, and the Hornets player hit both free throws for a 62-59 lead. But the Hounds inbounded the ball to Travis Ferguson, and he went the length of the court unheeded to gun in a 3-pointer at the buzzer, and the game was tied 62-62. The Gruver crowd literally erupted with excitement.

In overtime, Kenton Odom started the Hounds off just like he started the ball game, with a jumper to put the Hounds up by two, with 2:49 left in ot. The Hornets tied the game 64-64, but the Hounds went up four as Jarrod Hoel hit a pair of free throws with 2:34 left, and Ferguson hit nicely from under the basket with 1:31 left. Then came a key play, as the Hornets had cut the lead to 68-65. Dawson had the opportunity for a one and one, but missed the front end. Undaunted, he stole the ball after the rebound, and scored on a layup to put the Hounds up 70-65, with only 0:49 left in ot. A technical foul was then called on the Highland Park coach for being on the floor, and Jarrod Hoel hit one of the two free throws for a six-point 71-65 lead. Highland Park cut it to 71-67, but Dawson and Wylee Maupin hit free throws at the end to make the final score 73-67. It was a very pleasing game to coaches, players and fans alike.

The Gruver ladies beat the Highland Park Lady Hornets 39-35 for their 4th straight victory on the season, and making them 4-0 in district competition. Coach Steve Myatt commented, "The free throw shooting (11-14) helped a lot. But we're playing good, and Highland Park is a good team. We're still not shooting the ball week, but we'll come out of it."

The Gruver ladies took the early lead, with 13 unanswered points, 13-2 at the start of the second quarter, and it looked like a blow-out. But the Highland Park ladies came back to score 11 straight points to tie the game 13-13. But Wynn Maupin then hit a clutch jumper with 2:09 left in the half, to break the string, and give the Gruver ladies the lead for good, 15-13. They led by ten, 27-17 in the third quarter, and by eleven 37-26 in the fourth quarter, but the Lady Hornets cut the lead back down to four points with 54.1 seconds left in the game, 39-35. But there was no more scoring, and that was the final score.

Mika McLain and Julie Meyer each had 12 points in the game,

and Maupin added 10, for the very balanced scoring.

The Gruver teams will be playing at Sunray Friday night, Jan. 14.

When asked what she enjoyed the most about her job, Vera quickly

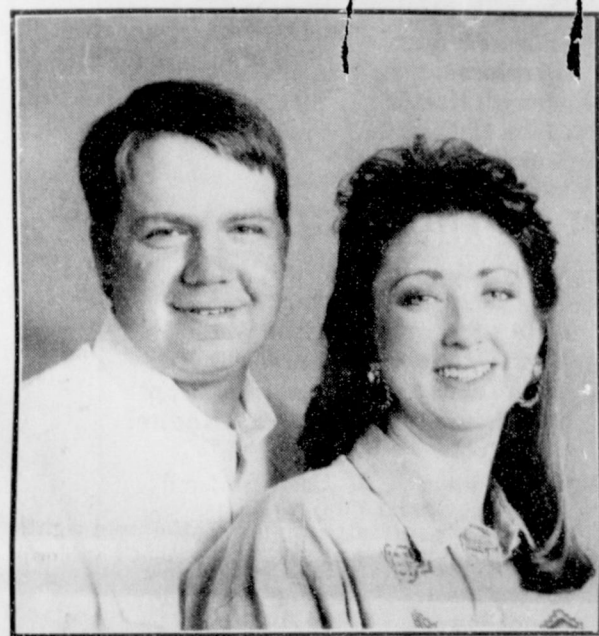
answered, "The association with people, because I like people."

He also reported on student enrollment. As of Monday, Jan. 10 there were 378 student in the elementary, 191 in the junior high and 224 enrolled in the high school.

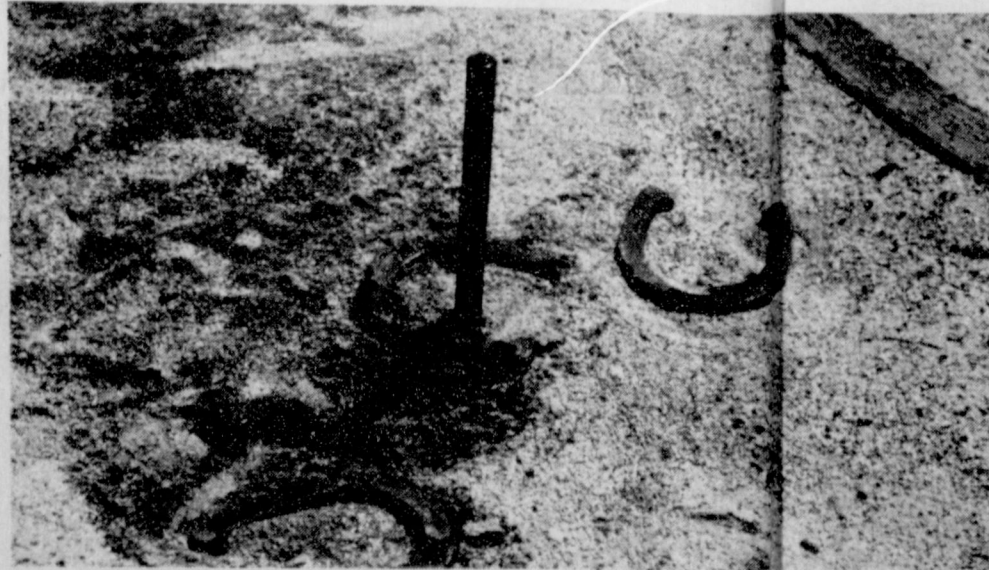

TNRCC announces deadline extensions

The Environmental Protection Agency has granted extensions of effective dates for new requirements for managing municipal solid waste landfills.

The extensions apply to recently-adopted TNRCC rules that impose more stringent landfill management standards required by the EPA. The rules are known collectively as Subtitle D of the Resource Recovery and Conservation Act. They involve landfill location restrictions, facility design and operations, groundwater monitoring, financial assurance, corrective action measures and conditions for closure and post-closure care.

The original EPA regulations were issued on Oct. 9, 1991, with an effective date of Oct. 9, 1993. However, the EPA has since recognized that some communities were having problems meeting the requirements. As a result, the EPA has extended some deadlines.

The TNRCC has adopted the following effective dates to conform to the EPA extensions:

* Oct. 9, 1993 - Landfills accepting more than 100 tons per day must meet all Subtitles D requirements.

* April 9, 1994 - Landfills accepting 100 tons or less per day and not on the Superfund National Priorities List must meet the Subtitle D requirements.

* Oct. 9, 1994 - Landfills that do not qualify for extensions afforded small facilities in arid locales must complete closure.

* April 9, 1995 - All landfill owners and operators must meet new

financial requirements. These include surety bonds, letters of credit, insurance or other guarantees that assure the ability to meet landfill expenses.

* Oct. 9, 1995 - Landfills receiving fewer than 20 tons of waste per day and fewer than 25 inches of annual rainfall must meet Subtitle D requirements.

* Oct. 9, 1996 - Landfills receiving fewer than 20 tons of waste per day and fewer than 25 inches of annual rainfall must complete closure and meet financial assurance requirements.

The effective date of groundwa-

ter monitoring and corrective action requirements varies from Oct. 9, 1993, to Oct. 9, 1996, depending on the amount of waste a landfill receives and whether the landfill is an existing unit or an expansion.

The final EPA rules include a provision that allows for a landfill to base its tonnage on any consecutive 12-month period before October 1993. This provision is designed to provide relief to landfills experiencing unusually high amounts of waste receipts during the previously proposed period of October 1991 to October 1992.
