The First Baptist Church of Spearman will celebrate its 75th anniversary on Saturday and Sunday, March 23rd and 4th.

Saturday's events will consist of a dinner and recognition of past ministers. It will be held at the O'Loughlin Center at 6:00 p.m. The cost is \$7.00. If you plan to attend, please RSVP at 659-5557.

Sunday's worship services will be led by Dr. Russell Dilday. Dr. Dilday is the distinguished professor of homiletics and special assistant to the president of Baylor University's Truett Theological Seminary in Waco. The morning service will begin at 11:00 a.m., and the evening worship service will begin at 6:00 p.m.

Gary Anthony will be the music evangelist for the Anniversary Celebration. He is currently Minister of Music at Gaston Oaks Baptist Church in Dallas. Gary has served in

various areas of music ministry. He was previously Minister of Music at New Hope Baptist Church in Mansfield and at Mayfield Road Baptist Church in Arlington.

Part of the celebration will include a service of dedication for the newly installed Rodgers 805B organ. The organ was purchased with funds given as memorials over a period of several years.

The dedication service will feature a concert by Dr. Joyce Jones, organist in residence at Baylor University. Dr. Jones has performed concerts around the world and is considered one of the premier organists of our day. We are indeed fortunate to be able to bring her to Spearman.

Benton Selected For TALL TEXANS Conference

Sheri Benton, librarian at the Hansford County Library, received notification earlier this week that she has been selected as one of only twenty-four participants chosen statewide to attend the 1996 Texas Library Association TALL TEXANS Leadership Development Institute to be held June 17-21 at Harambe Oaks Ranch near Austin. June Kahler Berry, Project Manager for TALL TEXANS, noted that the large number of applicants was gratifying to the Selection Committee, but made the task of selecting participants very difficult. In order for a library professional to be considered for this honor, he or she must be nominated and have worked in the field for a minimum of five years. Sheri was nominated by the president of the Hansford County Library Board, Myrna Biggers. Back in November, applications were mailed to all nominees for completion to be returned in January along with three letters of reference from people familiar with the nominee's qualifications.

Each participant chosen has been recognized as a potential leader in the library profession. TALL (Texas Accelerated Library Leaders) TEXANS Leadership Development Institute began in 1994 providing librarians a process-oriented, interactive career development opportunity. It is intended to foster leadership capabilities, define leadership development for Texas Library Association members and foster cultural diversity in library leadership in Texas. This institute will teach leadership tools, techniques and interpersonal skills as well as helping participants understand and apply political processes and decision-

making alternatives to the professional environment.

Sheri was extremely surprised to find that she had been chosen as one of the 1996 TALL TEXANS since the competition for only twenty-four positions comes from not only other public librarians, but also from school and academic librarians. Most of the participants selected are from the metropolitan areas of the state and are usually from larger libraries. Since the beginning of TALL TEXANS back in 1994, only one person has been chosen from the panhandle area each year and both of those were from Amarillo. This year's list includes eleven from the Dallas-Ft. Worth area, five from San Antonio, three from the Houston area, one from El Paso, one from Lubbock, one from San Angelo, one from Edinburg and one from Spearman!

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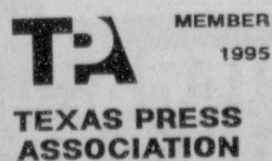

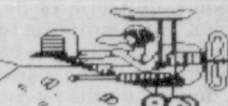
Christian Slater, in his good guy "Bed of Roses" mode, tries to keep things on the right track.

On a trip to Washington, D.C., my hotel was located next to the room of a famous cellist who was in the city to give a classical concert that evening. I could hear him through the walls as he practiced hour after hour.

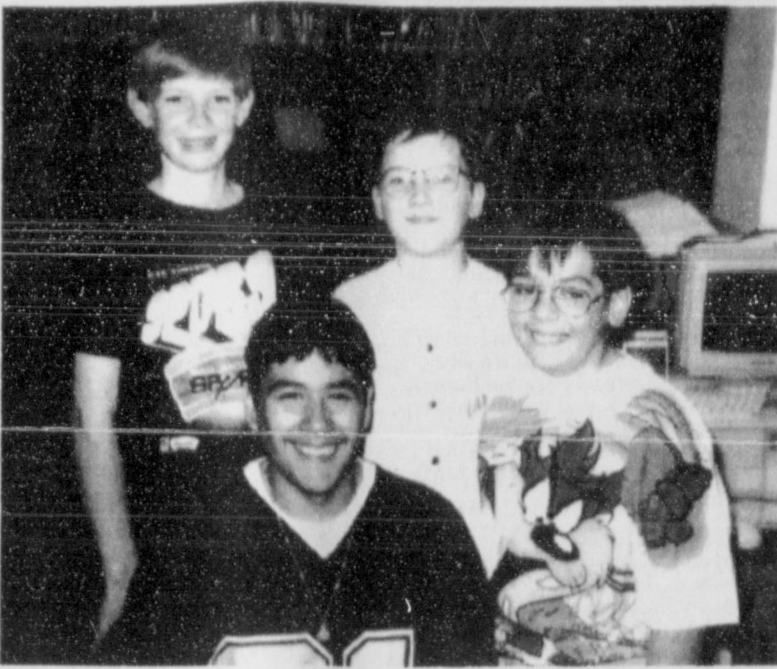

Jim said he saw a bald eagle Friday. There are more of the shy blue herons around, and cormorants are back. They can be best seen from the south side of the Lake.

Of the animals that live in Palo Duro Park, I suppose the raccoons are considered the cutest. I have yet to see one in the Park, but since their tracks are so numerous, we must have a good population of these masked bandits. Jim Derington told me that fishermen never leave your fish on a stringer in the water at night if you don't want the raccoons to have a fish dinner.

Ralph Reynolds of Gruver gave me the following raccoon story:

"Ross and Edna Marie Walker, Skeeze and Cease Riley, and Lola and

I were on a fishing trip over at Lake Fryer. The day before, I had found bananas on sale in Borger - a big grocery sack for one dollar. They were really ripe, but still good, and we had them on a picnic table to snack on. That evening Skeeze said he would put the bag in his pickup to keep the 'coons from getting them. Then he noticed that one of the windows was down about 5 inches.

The next morning the cab of the pickup was a complete mess of smeared bananas. They ate the fruit, skin and all, but they weren't dainty about it. Seats, steering wheel, windows, rear view windows (both outside and in), and even the hood had been streaked with the pulp. Skeeze had quite a job cleaning it up.

The theory that raccoons wash their food before eating it is false. They are omnivorous, and whatever they can catch, they'll eat. When we had a communal garden with the Rochell Smiths close to the Palo Duro Creek, the raccoons left it alone until the sweet corn was ready. I don't know if it gave off a smell that told them it was time, but they always came.

Businesses Must Render Property

In accordance with state law, Texas businesses must render their property with county appraisal districts by April 15. To render is to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1996.

"While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner - including homeowners, farmers and ranchers - may render their property with county appraisal districts," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Property owners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," Sharp noted. "They are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills."

If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect or old address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus late payment penalties, Sharp added.

State law requires anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1st to render with the local appraisal district. An exception is a business

that receives the freepoint exemption for managing cotton stored in a warehouse.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal districts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the chief appraiser estimates the value."

Sharp also announced that property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. Property owners may file the decreased value report about their property's condition on January 1, 1996.

Property owners may ask the chief appraiser for additional time - through April 30 - if the owners can demonstrate good cause. The chief appraiser must grant owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Railroad Commission an extension to April 30 to file the reports and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owners request it in writing and show good cause.

On the renditions, property owners can record their opinions of their property's value. By stating their opinion, property owners make sure that the appraisal district sends them a notice before placing a higher value on their property. This notice allows property owners the time to gather information to protest the appraisal if they believe the appraisal district's value is too high.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office. Taxpayers may contact the county appraisal district office for the rendition forms, or they may call the Comptroller's property tax hotline at 1-800-252-9121.

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1996 House Farm Bill

Provisions of House Farm Bill Title I - Agricultural Market Transition Program:

Production Flexibility Contracts - Eligible producers (those who had participated in the wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice programs in any one of the past five years) can enter into seven-year "production flexibility contracts" between 1996 and 2002. Payments would be made on September 30th of each year beginning in 1996. Farmers would also have the option of receiving half of their annual payment by December 15th of the previous year (except in 1996 when the advance payment would be due by June 15th).

Planting Flexibility - Any commodity may be grown on contract acreage with a couple of limitations. First, fruits and vegetables can only be grown on contract acreage in areas in which there is a history of double-cropping (not including lentils, mung beans, and dry peas). Next, haying and grazing is unlimited on the first 15 percent of contract acreage, with haying and grazing beyond 15 percent being prohibited during the consecutive 5-month period during the growing season established by the State CFSA Committee (except that alfalfa harvested on acreage beyond 15 percent is permitted if a producer takes

an acre-for-acre reduction in the contract payment for harvested acres beyond 15 percent).

Peanuts - The legislation saves \$434 million from the federal peanut program, making it a true no-cost program. The price support program for peanuts is extended through 2002, but the quota support rate is lowered from \$678/ton to \$610/ton. The price support escalator is eliminated. The legislation eliminates the national poundage quota floor (currently 1,350,000 tons) and undermarketing provisions of current law. The bill also includes reforms regarding quota, the sale, lease, and transfer of quota across county lines, and offers from handlers.

Sugar - In order to make the program more market-oriented, a recourse loan system is implemented until imports reach 1.5 million short tons for FY 1997 - 2002. The bill terminates marketing allotments and implements a one cent penalty on forfeited sugar. Provisions of current law that require the Sugar Program to operate at no-net cost are retained in this bill. It also retains the loan rate for raw cane sugar and refined beet sugar at the 1995 levels, 18 cents and 22.9 cents respectively, and retains a nine-month loan. The legislation would raise the assessment on sugar

processors to achieve \$52 million in budget savings over seven years toward deficit reduction.

Nonrecourse Marketing Assistance Loans - H.R. 2854 establishes maximum loan rates at the following (1995) levels:

Rice: \$6.50/cwt
Upland Cotton: \$0.5192/lb
Wheat: \$2.85/bu
Corn: \$1.89/bu
Soybeans: \$4.92/bu
ELS Cotton: \$0.7965/lb.

The Secretary would retain authority to make downward adjustments to wheat, feed grains and oilseeds loan rates based on specified stocks-to-use criteria. The bill also establishes a minimum loan rate for rice at \$6.50/cwt and cotton at \$0.50/lb. The bill also eliminates the 8-month cotton loan extension.

Payment Limitations - The bill reduces the current payment limitation by 20 percent, from \$50,000 to \$40,000. The bill extends provisions of current law that limit marketing loan gains and loan deficiency payments to \$75,000 per person per year.

Program Authority Elimination - The bill transfers certain 1949 Act sections necessary for quota programs into the 1938 Act, then repeals the

 remaining 1949 Act, which includes the Farmer Owned Reserve Program and Emergency Livestock Feed Assistance Program. Obsolete provisions of the 1938 Act are also deleted.

TITLE II - Dairy
 Milk Price Support and Marketing Order Programs - This provision phases out price supports on butter, powder, and cheese over five years. Federal milk marketing orders would be consolidated down to 10 to 14 orders by the end of the year 2000.

Dairy Export and Promotion Programs - The legislation directs the Secretary of Agriculture to use the Dairy Export Incentive Program (DEIP) at the maximum volume and funding levels permitted under GATT.

TITLE III - Conservation
 Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) - The bill gives the Secretary of Agriculture authority to enter into new contracts and extend expiring CRP contracts. The bill maintains the current size of the program (36.4 million acres). It also allows CRP

participants to terminate contracts that have been held for a minimum of five years. The most environmentally sensitive lands in the program will not be eligible for termination. Funds saved due to termination of contracts may be used by the Secretary to enroll new lands in the program.

Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP). Currently, nearly all WRP enrollments are under permanent easements. This provision requires the use of only temporary easements and cost-share restoration agreements to enroll new acreage until such time as those two categories account for two-thirds of total enrolled acres. The provision saves about \$390 million over seven years.

Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) - The program is established to help agricultural producers meet environment and water quality mandates. Under the program, \$200 million would be targeted each year through the use of voluntary contracts to assist crop and livestock

producers in dealing with environmental and conservation improvements on the farm. Assistance could be used for animal waste management facilities, terraces, waterways, filterstrips or other structural and management practices to protect water, soil, and related resources.

TITLE IV - Agricultural Promotion and Export Programs

P.L. 480 and Related Programs - The bill reauthorizes the Food for Peace Program and the Food for Progress Program. The bill would change current law, which requires USDA to keep a reserve of up to four million metric tons of wheat to meet extraordinary humanitarian need, to allow corn, sorghum, and rice to be held in reserves through designation of uncommitted stocks or through an exchange of wheat.

Agricultural Trade - The bill reauthorizes several agricultural export programs. It allows credit guarantees for high value and value-added products with at least 90 percent U.S. content by weight. The Secretary is directed to monitor compliance with the agriculture provisions of the Uruguay Round Agreement and report violations to the U.S. Trade Representative. In addition, several unnecessary and outdated provisions of federal agricultural trade law are repealed.

Dairy Trade - The Secretary is authorized to assist the United States dairy industry in establishing and maintaining an export trading company to facilitate the international market development for and exportation of U.S. dairy products. In the event the U.S. dairy industry does not establish an export trading company, the Secretary is directed to indicate which entity autonomous of the U.S. government is best suited to facilitate the international market development for and exportation of U.S. dairy products. The Secretary is also directed to perform a study of the potential impact of new access cheese imports under Uruguay Round on U.S. milk prices, dairy producer income, and the cost of Federal dairy programs.

Market Promotion Program (MPP) - MPP expenditures are capped at \$100 million through 2002 producing a savings of \$60 million.

Export Enhancement Program (EEP) - EEP expenditures are capped at \$350 million in 1996 and 1997; \$500 million in 1998; \$550 million in 1999; \$579 million in 2000 and \$478 million for 2001 and 2002. Total savings from EEP will be \$1.27 billion. In addition,

the Secretary is directed to use EEP to maintain the same percentage market share of world commercial flour markets which the U.S. achieved in the GATT baseline years of 1986-1990.

TITLE V - Miscellaneous

Crop Insurance - The bill eliminates the mandatory nature of catastrophic crop insurance, but requires producers to waive all federal disaster assistance if they opt not to purchase insurance. Dual delivery of crop insurance is eliminated in those states that have adequate private crop insurance delivery. The bill corrects a provision of current law by amending the Federal Crop Insurance Act to include seed crops.

Agriculture Quarantine and Inspection - The bill amends the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 to allow the Secretary to collect and spend fees collected over \$100 million to cover the cost of providing quarantine and inspection services for imports.

Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Interest Rates - Rates on CCC agriculture commodity loans are increased by 100 basic points for a savings of \$260 million over seven years.

Office of Risk Management - The bill establishes within the Department of Agriculture the Office of Risk Management to oversee and supervise the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. The office is charged with oversight of pilot programs involving revenue insurance, risk management and futures markets charged with oversight of pilot programs involving revenue insurance, risk management and futures markets.

Everglades Agricultural Area - The bill provides \$210 million to the Secretary of the Interior for land acquisition in the Florida Everglades for the purpose of environmental restoration.

Other Programs - The bill directs the Secretary to establish a business interruption insurance program that allows producers of program crops to obtain revenue insurance coverage in case of loss of revenue. The Options Pilot Program is also extended through 2002.

TITLE VI

Commission on 21st Production Agriculture - The bill restores the Commission that was in the balanced budget bill passed by the House. The commission would monitor the transition and make recommendations about farm programs at the end of seven years.

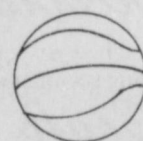


