

This year about 185 boys and girls, from age 6 to 15, are participating in the Spearman Little League Baseball, Softball, and T-Ball programs.

Livestock Judging Team Excels

The Hansford County 4-H Livestock Judging team recently completed their 1998-99 season with a strong finish. After a fall winning at the Seward County Community College contest and placing second at Scott City, Kansas, the team focused on the spring

The first spring contest was held in conjunction with the Hansford County Stock Show. The Senior Team finished second, with Kirby Johnson placing 5th, Greg Slough-6th, and Brittany Morris-8th. The Junior Team placed 6th at this contest.

Next, Hansford 4-H placed 21st out of over 300 teams at the Houston Livestock Show judging contest. Two weeks later, they made the long trip to San Angelo to compete. The team placed 4th in swine, 6th in cattle, 5th in reasons, and 9th overall in a strong field. The team was paced by Brad Kirby Johnson. (not pictured- Greg Slough and Nick Slough) Holt, who finished 7th in swine.

Closing out March was a trip to Clarendon. The team had a long day at Clarendon, scraping up a 10th place finish in swine. Individually, Kirby Johnson was 15th high overall, and Greg Slough placed 9th in

In April, the team started to mature and show the experience gained through the long hours of training. On April 8th, Frank Phillips College held a practice contest. The team placed 1st in sheep, 2nd in cattle, 2nd in swine, 2nd in reasons, and 2nd overall at Borger. In the sheep division, Brittany Morris was high individual, and Kirby Johnson placed 3rd. In reasons, Kirby placed 2nd and Greg Slough placed 5th. In swine judging, Greg was high individual and Kirby placed 2nd. Adding to Kirby's honors were a 4th place finish in cattle and a 2nd high individual overall.

The next day, the judging team traveled to Levelland for the South Plains College Contest. A real team effort, Hansford County 4-H placed 3rd in cattle and 5th in sheep en route to a 3rd place finish out of over 100 teams.

Finally, it was time for the contest they had been working toward all spring, the District Contest held at West Texas A&M in Canyon. The Junior team, consisting of Clete Vanderburg, Dustin Mackie and Nick Slough placed 2nd in sheep, 6th in swine, 8th in cattle, and 5th place overall at district. Clete led the team with a 3rd place finish in sheep, 9th in cattle, and 8th high individual overall. Dustin placed 4th in swine and 10th in sheep.

The Senior team, consisting of Greg Slough, Brad Holt, Kirby Johnson and Brittany Morris, placed 2nd in sheep, 2nd in reasons, 4th in swine, 7th in cattle, and 3rd

place overall. The Senior team narrowly missed qualifying for state, finishing 4 points out of 2nd place in an 1800 point contest. The top two teams from each district qualify for state.

Hansford's strong finish in the reasons room required contributors from all four team members. In reasons, Greg placed 3rd, Brad placed 8th, Kirby finished 10th and Brittany placed 11th. In sheep, Greg placed 2nd, and Brad finished 4th. Kirby placed 4th in swine en route to an 11th place finish overall. Greg led the team in his final contest with a strong, 4th place finish overall.

Team members are enjoying a break from judging now, but will be starting up the new season within the next thirty days. If you would like to compete in 4-H livestock judging, contact Burt Williams or Bret Burgin.

From the smallest of Texas towns to the largest metropolitan areas, from the earliest days of Texas statehood to the present; six hundred names of Texas men and women are enshrined in a simple polished curve of black granite on the grounds of the Texas state capitol in Austin. Their common bond they all died in their effort to make Texas a

The Texas Peace Officers' Memorial, which was dedicated on May 10, 1999 on the lawn of the Texas capitol in Austin, was erected to honor Texas peace officers who have died in the line of duty.

Among the six hundred honored is the name of one Hansford County officer, Sheriff Robert Eli "Bob" Martin, who was killed January 26, 1911. The sheriff was shot with a shotgun as he and a U.S. Marshal checked on a Hansford County resident who was involved in a property dispute.

Another name soon to be added to the memorial will also have a Hansford County tie. The great grandfather of Gruver City Manager, A.J. Ratliff, Thomas A. Jones, who served as a deputy sheriff in Cisco, Texas and was killed November 20, 1929, is currently being considered for approval. Since all names on the memorial must have documentation before being added to the

tablets of pearl and white granite, the process for Jones should be only a formality. A book about the crime known as the "Santa Claus Bank Robbery" recounts the events of bank robbers, one dressed as Santa Claus" who killed a Cisco police officer and the police chief in the commission of their crime. They later shot Jones while escaping the Cisco jail where the deputy Jones stood guard.

The two escapees were later apprehended, and angry citizens denying the murderers a trial, hung them in the last public hanging in Texas. The short,but interesting book of the Eastland County incident is available at Gruver City Hall for history buffs to peruse.

Both Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and Gruver City Manager A.J. Ratliff were present at the dedication as well as David Martin, grandson of Sheriff Martin and Dan Robertson, great grandson of Sheriff Martin. The memorial whose purpose as defined by Jim Dozier of the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement is, "to express the love of the people of Texas for these courageous officers in the hope that they will rest in peace,... that they are not forgotten."

For generations to come, the names carved in granite will honor officers who paid the price of peace for Texas. And it will serve as a reminder to all, that without law, there is






