Winegarner Certified To Train Food Safety

Peggy Winegarner, Hansford county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has recently been certified to train area food service managers

in food safety. Mrs. Winegarner was one of more than 190 county Extension agents certified as a trainer through the Food Protection Management Training Program sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the National Restaurant Association, Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association and the Texas Department of Health. The train-the-trainer program is designed to bring the latest in food safety to food

service establishments. As a certified instructor, Mrs. Winegarner will be offering this information to food managers, who in turn, will train their employees on food safety practices. Once managers have completed the 15-hour course, they will receive a certificate from the National Restaurant Association. They also will be eligible to join the Industry Council on Food Safety and to receive a decal to place in their window, which lets customers know the manager is certified in food safety.

"In addition, food service

operations under the Texas Department of Health's jurisdiction that have managers who complete the course will receive a 10 percent reduction in license fees each year while the certification is in effect," Mrs.


According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 24 to 81 million people get sick and more than 10,000 related deaths occur due to food poisoning in the United States each year.

"In most cases, foodborne outbreaks can be prevented if people receive safety training and learn to follow simple food safety practices," Mrs. Winegarner said.

"For years, we have been providing consumers with an enormous amount of information on food safety precautions to take when handling food at home," Mrs. Winegarner said. "Now, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is joining the food industry to train those who are providing meals for us when we are away from home."

Training materials for the course are being provided by the SERVSAFE Program from the Educational Foundation of the National Restaurant Association.

Many of us when we think of crappie also think of Jim Kate and Kelly Garrett, citizens of Gruver from almost the beginning and now dead, who used to go to East Texas to see relatives and to fish. They brought back big catches of crappie, fileted and frozen, that they shared with friends. The memory of how good that fish was could make me start fishing if I thought I could catch crappie like that.

A sunning bobcat was lying in the middle of the pavement a half a mile south of the office one morning this week. Jim stopped and took pictures. The cat sauntered off unafraid. He was different from the one he photographed some weeks ago in that his spots weren't very noticeable and his grayishbrown color was not the same.

Kenneth Seyfferrt, one of the birders up from Amarillo last week, sent a list of the bird species he had recorded at Palo Duro Lake so far. There were 123 birds listed, and I did not find Golden Eagles, Ravens, or Greater Roadrunners. He did list Osprey, an eagle - like, fish catching bird I would like to see. In fact, I couldn't identify many of the birds, but some like the White-faced Ibis and Blackcrowned Night-Heron sounded

I'm sure Jim or Joan would be glad to copy the list for anyone interested. Do we have any serious birders in the county? Mr. Seyffert wrote that many more species could be added if the area was birded daily during spring and fall migration.

The picture and article on Wilson Buchanan, Palo Duro River Authority Board member, in Monday's Amarillo Daily was great. Our acquaintance began in the two-story stone Tyler house when he was a young man and I was a child of six. He worked for awhile for my father, Haden Hart, and was kind enough to read stories at night by the light of the kerosene lamp to the five Hart children.

Every time you prepare a meal at home there's a safety risk involved. It does not involve dangerous cooking appliances or sharp kitchen utensils. It has to do with the way you handle your

Foodborne illness is a sickness waiting for the right opportunity to develop. It happens in the home as well as at eating establishments.

With over 24 million cases of foodborne illness in the U.S. each year, resulting in over 9,000 deaths, it is not something to be taken lightly. According to a report from the Food and Drug Administration, arthritis, kidney damage and heart problems can result from food contamination, and in some cases death.

It poses a greater risk for infants, older persons, pregnant women and people who have an immune deficiency disorder. These people should never eat raw fish, raw seafood or raw or undercooked meat products.

Although foodborne illness can be caused by viruses, fungi, parasites, heavy metals and chemicals, most cases reported are

caused by bacteria commonly found on raw foods.

Even harmful bacteria cannot do their work without proper conditions. All that's needed for bacterial growth is the right combination of time and temperature, moisture and nutrients.

Usually, a large number of bacteria must be present to cause food-borne illness. Therefore, illness can be prevented by controlling the initial number of bacteria present, preventing bacteria from growing, destroying the bacteria by proper cooking and avoiding recontamination.

Several factors cause contamination of raw and cooked foods --- poor personal hygiene, improper cleaning of storage and preparation area and unclean utensils.

Mishandling of raw and cooked foods may increase bacterial growth. Most bacterial growth occurs between 40 degrees and 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

It is important to remember to keep hot foods hot, above 140 degrees Fahrenheit, and cold

foods cold, below 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

Undercooking or improper processing of home-canned foods can cause a very serious food type of poisoning called botulism, which results from the ingestion of toxin produced by Clostridium botulinum. The toxin can be destroyed by boiling foods for 10 minutes. This toxin may also be present in baked potatoes that have been left standing at room temperature for too long of a time period

Extension food safety experts say that good food safety procedures involve care in selection, storage, handling and cooking of food.

When grocery shopping, select items that are packaged properly. Make groceries the final stop before going home. Pick up refrigerated and frozen foods

When you get home, make sure food is stored properly. Refrigerate meat and dairy products. Store canned foods in a dark, cool place for no longer than a year. Use perishable foods within a short time and keep frozen foods stored at 0 degrees Fahrenheit. A food storage time table chart is available at the county Extension office.

When preparing foods, follow these simple steps: Wash your hands thoroughly with warm water and soap before preparing a meal; make sure all food equipment is clean and stays clean; wash raw fruits and vegetables; reheat leftovers thoroughtly; cook pork and poultry until well done; never taste home-canned foods before cooking them; do not allow prepared food to stand at room temperature for more than two hours; and aovid contamination of cooked foods through the use of cutting boards or other utensils that may have been in contact with raw foods



NOTICE OF PROPOSED SURCHARGE

GTE* has filed an Application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish a maximum \$1.06 monthly surcharge to be added to the monthly bill of each customer for each access line. The purpose of the surcharge is to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with (i) reductions in Extended Area Service (EAS) charges referred to in PURA 95 Section 3.308 and (ii) providing Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) in certain exchanges pursuant to PURA '95 Section 3.304 and the Commission's Substantive Rule Section 23.49(c)(6) and (c)(12). If approved by the Commission, the monthly surcharge will be up to \$1.06 per month per access line. All ELCS customers currently subscribing to basic local service that are currently paying less than the ELCS rates of \$3.50 for residential lines and \$7.00 for business lines, will be surcharged \$1.06 up to a maximum rate of \$3.50/\$7.00 beginning no sooner than the June 1996 billing cycles. GTE will also request that a surcharge of up to, but not in excess of, \$1.06 per month per access line be implemented on an interim basis, subject to refund, until such time as the Commission has entered a final order on this matter. The requested surcharge is intended to (i) replace lost EAS revenues and (ii) replace lost ues and reimburse GTE for the increased direct cost of service associated with all of GTE's ELCS by January 31, 1996. The deadline for intervention in this matter is July 12, 1996. Persons who wish to intervene in or comment up these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Early in my eighth grade year, I began to notice an increase in crime on the news and in our area. wanted to prevent this epidemic from affecting me, my friends, and the rest of Gruver's citizens, so I decided to take action and do what my history teacher, Tim Garland, had always taught us: that we learn from one another and that we should always stand up for what we believe in. I talked with my principal, Laura Blassingame, about talking to my grade about this atrocious problem. The program turned into a panel of experts and to include all of the junior high school students. The program was a success.

School officials liked what I had done, so they asked me to repeat the program my freshman year of high school. The sponsorship of my program was then turned over from Mrs. Blassingame to School Counselor Cathy Potts. The Second Annual Crime Prevention Program was also a panel format with keynote speaker U.S. Rep. Larry Combest (R-19th Congressional District). From a friend at the White House, I was able to obtain a letter from President Bill Clinton to read to the students, which now included both junior high and high school students. The program was again a success.

This year, while in preparation for the Third Annual Crime Prevention Program, I asked Bailey Barkley, a senior at GHS, to assist me with the program. He gladly accepted. My asking him to assist me this year was probably the best thing I could ever do for the program! The program was now a team effort

between Bailey and myself. While in preparation for the program, Bailey and I, in a partnership with KFDA News Channel 10 in Amarillo, shot a public service announcement on the subject of "having fun without crime and violence." The p.s.a. is now on a schedule rotation airing on CBS.

Bailey and I invited Senator Robert Dole (R-Kansas) to be

this year's keynote speaker. To our surprise, he accepted and was scheduled to attend on March 9, 1996, but when he decided not to attend a debate in Dallas the night before, he canceled his plans to come to Gruver. The let down did not come without compensation, though. Dole's staffers invited Bailey and myself to San Antonio to meet with the candidate. Bailey was not able to make the trip on March 11th, but I met with Dole, and Senators Hutchison, Gramm, and Governor George W. Bush. Each and every one of them gave me their endorsement and wished Bailey and I the best of luck with the program.

New plans had to be made rather quickly for the program. We asked two gentlemen from Borger, Texas, to speak. Their names were Randy Chavez and Andy Deitz (better known as "Team Extreme"). They literally go out on the streets of Borger to talk to teenagers out of doing drugs, crime and violence. Randy and Andy knew of an inmate at the Dalhart Prison Unit, and we invited him to come and share his story. His name was Jesse Woodward.

This program was the best of the three programs so far! The students main response was that they could really relate to the speakers' stories because they have gone through some of the same things. The speakers made a strong impact on our students because of the fact that their stories were first-hand.

Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison and former Vice President Dan Ouavle sent me letters to read to the student body at this year's program. They sent their best wishes and encouraged paying close attention to the speakers and the students themselves taking action!

Again, this year's program, with the help, with the help of my best friend Bailey Barkley, was definitely very successful. We have learned that if we can change the life of at least one person, then we have accomplished our goal, and we know we did with more than that just one this year. Our message of standing for what you believe in was received clear as crystal!

GHS State Academic UIL Contestants

two students for the 1995-96 University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet held May 2-4 at The University of Texas at Austin.

Qualifiers included: KiKi Carthel, who placed third in State UIL Headlines, and Joni Hart, who placed fourth in State Editorial Writing.

The students qualified for the state meet by placing first, second or third individually at the UIL Academic Meet in Abiline.

"Students who participate in UIL academics are as competitive and dedicated as any athlete or musician," said Bobby Hawthorne, UIL academic director. "They devote untold hours to practice and invitational meet competition, and for many, these hours will be among the most important they spend during their high school careers. Over the years, we've heard from hundreds of students who claim that theses contests were the most fulfilling and rewarding activities of their entire high school careers."

UIL academic contests range from feature writing to accounting, and from computer science to poetry interpretation. Of the 2.2 million students who participated in UIL activities expenses are deducted.

Gruver High School qualified last year, 658,000 competed in one or more of the 22 general academic contests.

> The purpose of these cntests, Hawthorne added, is to teach thinking and problem-solving

> "In its own way, each contest whether math or Lincoln-Douglas debate or editorial writing - is intended to teach the thinking skills students will need in college and in the work force. We know that employers want employees who can solve problems, speak effectively and write clearly. Each contest is designed to help students reach these goals."

Through participation at the State Meet, students qualify for the Texas Interscholasic League Foundation scholarships. Since its inception in 1954, the TILF has provided nearly \$10 million to approximately 9,000 students. This year, the TILF expects to award an extimated 570 new and renewed grants, valued at more than \$700,000. These academic scholarships have been funded by grants and donations from foundations and individuals. Each dollar that the TILF receives goes directly for scholarships and no administrative or other overhead


