

For a number of years Brownwood has been asking for the privilege of entertaining the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. This continuous knocking at the door finally Our Duty As brought results, and last year at the Amarillo convention, the big Hosts Brownwood delegation by sheer

force of enthusiasm and persistence persuaded a rather receptive convention to vote for Brownwood in 1937. It was an honor well deserved, and certainly worthy of the effort put forth to obtain.

Well, the time is near at hand when the convention visitors will begin pouring into Brownwood for the meeting. We are reminded of the nearness of the date by the establishment in Brownwood this week of the convention office of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, in charge of J. A. Rix, assistant manager. He is here to see that preliminary work in connection with the convention is handled properly, that every assistance from the sectional organization be given the local chamber of commerce in preconvention plans, and that a smooth working organization to guide the assemblage of many interests through a business like session be provided.

In accepting the honor of being host to West Texas, Brownwood has assumed an obligation. It is not a light one. The success of the convention, and the credit which will reflect upon Brownwood, will be in proportion to how well that obligation is met. The Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, of course, is assuming responsibility for leadership, but the accomplishment will depend upon the attitude of every citizen of Brownwood.

In addition to the usual duty of the host, that is, of seeing that the visitors are properly received and emertained and that officers of the organization receive every cooperation, is a responsibility for the success of the sessions of the convention. That can be assured, Mr. Rix says, by attendance by Brownwood people at the sessions, and can best be guaranteed by pre-convention registration of Brownwood citizens. Unless there is a large registration of Brownwood people, and attendance at the convention sessions, the 1937 convention will not have accomplished its purpose. During the coming weeks, committees will canvass Brownwood citizens for preconvention registration. Convention days alone can tell how well local citizens attend.

But if the enthusiasm shown prior to and at the Amarillo convention last year is evident again this year, the WTCC officials have no cause for worry about the success of the Brownwood convention.

years of existence of the CCC. It was on April 5, 1933, that the Civilian Conservation Corps was created by President Roosevelt as a measure to provide wholesome employment for several hundred thousand idle youth of America.

When it was created, there was little thought that the CCC would be of any value, other than putting men to work. And yet, in a surprisingly short time, a definite work program was arranged, whereby the GCC camps were enabled to perform valuable conservation work and constructive programs which will be of lasting value.

Brown county has been particularly fortunate in having, during most of the program, two CCC camps located within its borders, each doing a distinctive type of work. The Brownwood camp, engaged in Soil Conservation work under the direction of the Soil Conservation Service, has been of inestimable value to the farmers of this county. The value of their work, apparent now, will become increasingly evident as the years go by. Through the conservation of the resources of the farms, farming in this section is being revolutionized, and the result will be an increased prosperity for generations to come.

At the Brownwood State Park on Lake Brownwood, another CCC camp is at work, creating a State Park which gives promise of becoming one of the most popular recreational centers in the Southwest. Here, as is true with the soil conservation camp, the work being done is not alone for the present, but for the use and enjoyment of generations to come. The camp is making available and accessible the natural recreational advantages to be found at this remarkable and beautiful lake. Their work is the most effective that could be done to make Brownwood a tourist and recreational center, and to make available to the people of this section an area which cannot in the future be encroached upon by private interests or denied the public.

And yet these are the secondary purposes of the CCC. In the larger field of restoring usefulness to those who otherwise might not have found their rightful place in society under the complex conditions which then confronted them, the CCC has proved its worth. It is encouraging that as the fourth birthday of the service is being observed, plans are being completed for the establishment of the CCC upon a permanent basis.

vious desire of a large majority of the people of Texas will have been defeated. There is no question that most Texans favor repeal of the law, and want to see repeal accomplished without delay.

A few years ago when betting was legalized, there was little opposition from those sections distant from the race tracks, although most people thought the move an unwise one. Favorable sentiment came from the cities. Now the situation is reversed, and city merchants are leaders in the repeal movment. It is rather remarkable that Senators from the cities are now leading the opposition to repeal.

He was a Mexican general in command at Matamoras, of which town he was also mayor, and from 1859 to 1875 Texans thought him responsible for the many murders and thefts of cattle both in Texas and Mexico. His men grew in marauding expeditions between the Nueces and Rio Grande until in the 1870's they were shipping many shiploads of stolen Texas cattle to Cuba, through the Mexican port of Bagdad




