Lynx Capture Bi-District Title

The Spearman Lynx were in excellent form Friday night, capturing the 1-2A Bi-District Championship Trophy. The powerful offense and punishing defense of the Lynx team was just too much for the Memphis Cyclones. Scoring in all 4 quarters of play, the Lynx beat the Cyclones 44-8.

This brings the Lynx to a season record of 10-1.

Britt Savage put the Lynx on the scoreboard with a 27 yard field goal in the first quarter. In the second quarter Michael Lusby scored on a 12 yard run and Jake Howard had a 2 yard touchdown run. Michael Witten scored twice in the third quarter with a 1 yard run and an 18 yard run. In the fourth quarter Lusby scored again on a 16 yard carry.

Savage was successful on 5 extra point kicks.

The Lynx defensive squad has been a power to reckon with all season, allowing an average of only 7 points per game scored against the Lynx. So far this season, Blake Beedy has assisted on 117 tackles and has 17 unassisted tackles. Michael Lusby has 20 unassisted and 95 assisted tackles. Travis Loomis has 64 assisted and 22 unassisted tackles. Tony Clement has 49 assisted and 6 unassisted tackles. Tom Kirk has 38 assisted and 14 unassisted tackles. Dillon Miller has 38 assisted and 8 unassisted tackles. Eric Cudd has racked up 12 interceptions. Loomis has recoverd 5 fumbles and Eric Varnon has recovered 4 fumbles.

The Lynx offense has averaged 34 points per game. Jake Howard's passing average for the year is 51.4% with only 8 interceptions. Michael Witten has rushed for 1391 yards and Michael Lusby has rushed for 771 yards.

10. I am forwarding my marriage certificate and my 3 children one of which is a mistake as you can see.

11. Unless I get my husband's money pretty soon, I will be forced to lead an immortal life.

12. You have changed my little boy to a girl, will "this make any difference?

13. I have no children yet, as my husband is a truck driver and works night and day.

14. I want money as quick as I can get it. I have been in bed with the doctor for two weeks and he "doesn't do me any good. If things don't improve, I will have to send for another doctor.

15. In accordance with your instructions, I have given birth to twins in the enclosed envelope.

I called Oliver Tyler of Guymon to see if he could help us on why soldiers would have been stationed at Lucerne. Oliver's paternal grandfather was Judge Stanley Tyler and his maternal grandfather was T.A. Cook who came to the County in 1906 when he bought the ranch owned by the Gus McKay family. Mr. Cook had some part in starting Lucerne and promoting the Enid, Ochiltree, and Western Railroad Company.

He said he would get back to me on Lucerne, but he has loaned me a journal his grandmother Tyler kept for part of 1894, and parts of 1903, 4, and 5. The entries are short and sparse on detail, but they tell a story. The entries beginning July 23, 1894 have Ora hauling rock, so I think they were getting ready to build the big stone house. Gwenfred Lackey had told me years ago that when the Tylers were hauling stone for the house 4 year old Ollie was run over by the wagon hauling the stone.

The entry n July 31 "Oli went with Ora after rock, fell, and the wagon ran over him breaking his leg." We go from "Oli very sick. Everybody here and very kind," to August 5 "Oli had his leg set today. Mr. Cator, McCrae, McKay, Jones, Bessie was all here. Oli sick after taking ether. His leg seems to be all right."

I think the Bessie is Mrs. Les Cator, mother of Bessie Mitts of Gruver.

Sharp Delivers November Sales Tax Rebates

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, today delivered a total of \$206.2 million in November sales tax payments to 1,083 Texas cities and 116 counties.

"Total city and county sales tax rebates year-to-date are 8 percent higher than those for the first 11 months of last year, as the Texas economy continues to clock along at a good pace," Sharp said.

Sharp delivered city sales tax rebates totaling \$190.5 million, 4.9 percent above the payments in November 1995 of \$181.5 million. Rebates of \$15.7 million to Texas counties were 2.1 percent below the \$16 million payments of November of last year.

This month's payments to Texas cities and counties include taxes collected by monthly sales tax filers on September sales and by quarterly filers for July, August, and September, and reported to the Comptroller in October. Amarillo received a rebate of \$3.2 million, 3.8 percent more than the first 11 months of 1995.

Gruver received a rebate of \$6,431.53, a 14.83% increase over last year's rebate of \$5,610.44. This brings Gruver's year-to-date payments to \$84,889.49, a 79.64% increase over last year's \$47,252.85.

Spearman received a rebate of \$10,793.87, a 0.36% decrease from last year's rebate of \$10,833.52. Spearman's year-to-date payments are \$147,848.80, a 8.21% increase over last year's \$136,628.90.

The totals for Hansford County are as follows: Net Payment this Period - \$17,225.40, a 4.75% increase over last year's \$16,443.96; 1996 Payments To Date - \$232,736.29, a 26.56% increase over last year's \$183,881.75

The Perryton Center of Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority (TPMHA) is hosting the second of its quarterly workshops on Tuesday, November 26th, 6-8 p.m. These workshops are designed to educate families how to live with severe mental illness.

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Class study will focus on behaviors (or lack of them) that doctors and families observe as well as what is going on in the chemically-imbalanced brain that causes them.

Because they are facing one of life's most devastating tragedies, some families of patients believe that nothing can relieve their pain except the patient's recovery. Many families do, however, rise above their pain and sorrow. They discover reserves of strength they didn't know they had and take charge of the feelings that have been overwhelming them. They thus reserve their energy to help their disabled relatives and rebuild their own disrupted lives.

"Patients and families alike are caught in chronic grief. Both need understanding and comfort

from the professionals who are working with them. In fact, before information can be received by either the patient or family, the current grief stage needs to be validated," stated Carol Ann Vaughn, B.A., Adult Family & Community Education Liaison. She speaks from personal experience. Her own family has learned to cope with serious mental illness in their midst. She knows that families CAN develop the skills they need to handle the highly demanding tasks of living with mental illness, but they need emotional support to be enabled to cope with their ongoing trauma, and they also need education about all

serious mental illnesses. "Giving troubled family members what they need, when they need it, provides the essential ingredient for movement through the grief cycle to take place. Without this healing grace, it is impossible for family members to manage the transcendence from anguish to acceptance," Vaughn continued. The Perryton Center of TPMHA

provides state-of-the-art, innovative mental-health services to persons of all ages in Ochiltree, Hemphill, Hansford, and Lipscomb Counties. The priority population consists of children and adolescents in need of mental-health interventions and adults who suffer from severe mental illnesses.

Individuals appointed to serve on the Perryton Advisory Committee are: Mary Frances Ellzey and Pat Peckenpaugh representing Ochiltree County; Wilma Eubank and Jan Mathews representing Hemphill County; Myrt Bohanan and Erin Bergin representing Hansford County; and Louise Chase and Judy Longhofter representing Lipscomb County.

It is in keeping with the goals and mission of TPMHA, that classes are being offered to educate not only families currently receiving services at the Perryton Center, but also any other interested family in the Perryton area.







HCFB Joins Fight To Reform Property Taxes

The Hansford County Farm Bureau has joined the fight to win property tax reform in the next session of the Texas Legislature. Aubery Rasor, President of the Hansford County Farm Bureau said, "Farmers and ranchers here in Hansford County stand with home owners and other concerned Texans in calling for elimination of the property tax in funding Texas schools.

Aubery said the property tax is unfair, and getting worse. He

appointed a 17 member Citizens Committee to examine the property tax issue. The committee heard testimony and examined options during 14 public hearings held across the state during the

the option we like best," Aubery said. "With a \$500,000 standard deduction, small businesses can be protected and still raise adequate funding for education." The business activity tax is one of the options proposed by the governor.

It is usually described as a tax on the difference between a business's gross receipts and expenses. Aubery Rasor and others have

pointed out that the Texas economy is now much more dependent on the service industries than in the past. Still, the tax system still leans on land and capital intensive industries to fund education, even though they produce a small percentage of the gross state product.

According to Aubery, capital intensive business, representing only 38 percent of the gross state product, pays 56 percent of all local and state business taxes. On the other hand, service and trade industries represent 62 percent of the current gross state product while paying only 17 percent of the business taxes.

Aubery noted that the property tax has more than doubled in the last ten years. "Our goal is to eliminate the property tax as the primary funding mechanism for education," he said. "We must insure quality education in Texas, and the property tax has become ill suited for the job."








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
