Cluck Named President/CEO Of Interstate Bank

Former Perryton banker John T. Cluck will take the reins of Interstate Bank on August 22 as president and chief executive officer (CEO).

"I will remain as chairman of the board," said H. C. Brillhart Jr., in making the announcement.

"I am leading a group of local investors, " Cluck said, "who have entered into a contract to buy controlling interest in Interstate. Brillhart will retain an interest with that group."

"We have brought in a number of new investors,"Brillhart said. "We will also add to our current board members"

Brillhart declined to name the new stockholders or board members.

Spearman ISD News

The Spearman ISD has made several improvements during the summer in preparation of the new school year, beginning Thursday, August 15th.

The lighting and temperature control equipment in the high school is being upgraded as a result of the Loan Star Energy Conservation Loan in the amount of \$127,000. To be eligible for the loan, the school had to have an engineer to do the work, and be able to prove that the money saved would be able to pay back the note and interest within eight years. According to the figures for Spearman High School, the savings should be pay back the loan in only four years.

Other changes within the district include several changes in personnel. A graduate of Texas Christian University, Cluck also hold s a graduate degree in banking from Rutgers University. He was president of the North Panhandle Bankers Association in 1985 and served as district chairman of the Texas Bankers Association in 1988.

Gruver Boys Clubs New Schedule



This loan was not approved until late July, but most of the classrooms have already been updated. Light fixtures in the hallways, band hall, and a couple of other rooms will be finished as soon as possible.

Several updates have been made at the junior high as well. The gym was painted, a sealer was put on the west exterior wall to protect it from moisture, and the swamp coolers were replaced with window refrigeration units.

As a result of CAP (Capital Aquisition Program), the heating _system will be replaced in the gym, as well as the lights will be lowered.

Spearman ISD was one of the 46 panhandle school districts to receive the TIF (Telecommunications Infrastructure) grant. This grant covers additional cableing, wiring, equipment and a microwave dish, which will create an Area-Wide Network. This will also include a direct connection to the internet. Spearman is hoping to have this in place by January 1st. All 46 school districts are scheduled to be completed by the end of the school year.

The Spearman ISD has also added 14 Pentium 200 computers to the district. These computers were distributed to all three campuses. In addition, a new file server was also added to the high school. School ESL (English as a Second Language), Thedra Reynolds will teach Elementary ESL, Diane Thorp will teach. High School Math, and Nanci Weaver will teach Junior High Special Education. Martha Jones will move from part-time Elementary Librarian to full-time.

The first day of classes for the Gruver Independent School District is Tuesday, August 19th. The expected enrollment is around 450 students.

The Gruver ISD has hired three new teachers for the 1997-98 school year. They are Glen Hallum, who will teach 7th and 8th grade social studies, as well as be the head boys basketball coach; Kay Hallum, who will teach 1st grade; and LaVon Reid, who will teach kindergarten.

Other changes within the school system include a new elementary principal, Diane Brown, and a new high school principal, Tim Garland.


Said Ramon, "I have a feeling that rock removal could be a big business in the near future."







Laverne Rawle was frightened recently by an incident which occurred one night on the highway between Amarillo and Fritch.

"I was going home from visiting my husband, John; who has a broken hip and is having to stay in Amarillo. Suddenly, a car behind me started flashing its lights and they kept doing it for a long time," said Laverne. She just kept driving, though, because she didn't know what the people in the car had in mind and she couldn't tell anything was wrong with her car. "You just don't stop in this day and time," she added.

Finally, the vehicle pulled around her and drove on into Fritch. When she arrived in Fritch, she drove to the post office to check her mail and the other car followed her there. Two

young men stepped out of the car and approached her by explaining that something under her car was dragging on the highway and creating sparks. They said they were afraid her car would catch on fire.

"One of the men got under there real quick," Laverne said. "He pulled out a big piece of barbed wire."

She credits the young men, James Burk and Bob Phillips of Spearman, with possibly saving her life. "I congratulated them and told them that I was really grateful to see a young person that helpful," she said.

Laverne said the young men were on their way home to Spearman when they saw the sparks flying from under her car.



If we are unable to reach you and your child has no credit, I will personally lend your child the money for lunch. After the first loan, we will provide a peanut butter sandwich. Thank you for working with us on this. We realize that our system was not as good as it could have been last year and we are striving to improve.







Many wonderful prizes were given away during the four-day event, but the grand prize was a black '32 duce coupe won by a couple from Kilgore, Texas.







School Policy For Free & Reduced-Priced Meals

Spearman I.S.D., Gruver I.S.D., and Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. announce their policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast Program. Each school and/or the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by an interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reducedprice benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC/TANF only have to list their child's name and food stamp or AFDC/TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.

Households that do not list a food stamp or AFDC/TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE." The
