Commissioners Court Lifts Burn Ban

Hansford County The Commissioners Court in a called meeting voted to lift the burn ban in Hansford County effective July 8, 2008.

Due to recent rain and the end of 4th of July fireworks sales, it was decided by a 5-0 vote to end the burn ban.

With increased fuel prices, and volunteer firemen busy with their jobs, we ask your cooperation to avoid fire runs that are not necessary. Before igniting any fire, please contact the Sheriff's Office at 659-4140 or 733 2901. After your call, the appropriate fire department will be paged to inform the volunteers if they need to respond.

As always, anyone starting a fire will be held liable for any damage to property resulting from your action. Also, be advised that there are certain rules set by the TCEQ (Texas Commission on Environmental Quality) that need to be followed, regardless of Burn Ban Status



Soil moisture varied from surplus to very short, with most areas reporting short to adequate. Corn was mostly fair. Cotton was rated from very poor to excellent, with most areas reporting fair to poor. Peanuts, sorghum and soybeans were rated mostly fair. Wheat was poor to fair as the harvest continued. Oats were rated good. Range conditions were very poor to excellent, with most counties reporting poor to fair. Cattle were in fair condition.

National Run Honors Fallen Soldiers in Iraq

Relay Team Covers 4,000 Miles To Arlington National Cemetery

Hamilton '03, in honor of his roommate Hamilton Michael Cleary '03 and Iraqi Freedom, has organized a memorial cross-country relay beginning at Fort Irwin, CA, and finishing at Arlington National

Cemetery. Run for the Fallen began on Flag Day, June 14, and will end on Sunday, Aug. 24. Erin Kavanagh, to whom Cleary had been engaged, and his sister Shannon Cleary are also organizers of this initiative with

The relay team, comprised primarily of Hamilton alumni, will plant a flag with the name of a fallen soldier at each mile on the 4,000-mile route. Shauna Sweet, Eric Janes, Taylor Janes, Triona Dombroski-Fritsch and turns running the 13-state route along with the Kavanagh and Shannon Cleary. Three other Hamilton alumni, Andrew McKay, BJ Gardiner and John McKay, are creating a documentary of the effort throughout the summer. The group welcomes interested runners. OLIVER WALLIN

Oliver Wallin, the son of Arthur and Minnie Wallin, was only 18 years old when he enlisted in December of 1943. He eft behind his family and childhood chum and sweetheart to train for and take part in the Normandy invasion.

Oliver survived the brutal beach landing on June 8th two days after D-Day) and got as far as Saint Lo, France, with his battalion. The capture of Saint Lo was imperative if the Allied troops were to break out of Normandy and push on across France to drive the Germans out and liberate this country. Saint Lo was captured on July 18

His battalion went on into the South of France, where

Oliver was injured on August 10, 1944 when a hand grenade caught Oliver. He realized immediately that he had lost his leg and sustained multiple injuries, but there were no survivors around him to offer first aid. (It was later learned that he was the sole survivor of his entire battalion at Saint Lo.) He managed to make a tourniquet for his upper leg out of his belt and a second tourniquet for his arm from his handkerchief, and then Oliver crawled onehalf mile until he reached the medics behind the front lines.

Months and months followed in the military hospital in Temple, Texas for this 19year-old Gruver boy.

Opal, who married him soon after his discharge, says, "Oliver always felt fortunate

that he came back as whole as he did. He wore a prosthesis the rest of his life, and at times needed crutches, but he told people he wasn't disabled, only handicapped." The Wallins were engaged in farming and reared three children over the following 43 years. Oliver died of cancer in January of 1989.

"He never talked much about the war, "Opal muses today. "He never felt any bitterness in the loss of his leg because he loved his country and believed he had been meant to fight to keep it free.'

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

Words from Faith & Grace

In the tenth week of Pentecost we experience the presence of God as we study Isaiah 55:1-13, Psalm 65:1-8-9-13 Romans 8:1-11, and Matthew 13:1-9,18-23 Isaiah shows that the Word of God is effective, it carries

out the tasks assigned to it. The task is the restoration of these believers into a perfect relationship with God. The Psalmist sings praise to God for his presence which

causes things to grow and to produce fruit.

Paul answers in Chapter 8 of Romans the problem of sin in the life of a Christian which he describes in Chapter 7 Paul mentions the Holy Spirit ten times in eleven verses. His premise is that all men die because of sin. We are condemned in Adam's sin. Paul condemns living in the "flesh" but by this Paul means living according to our human nature in its weakness; living our entire lives from the human point of view; living our lives to satisfy our "flesh" literally. The sins of the "flesh" also encompass shortcomings of our spirit. Therefore, it follows that if we are dead because of sin, we are alive because of the Spirit of Christ Jesus that dwells in us. Through God's grace we receive His Spirit that guides us to faith which leads us to baptism and the remission of our sin. We have not overcome our sin, the Holy Spirit that dwells in us, has. Think about this, when the Holy Spirit is inside you, you wake up, the Holy Spirit gets into your spirit, you come truly alive! Spirituality is the essence of being; it can change our reality. Yes, we will sin as long as we are in the mortal body and yes, this body is dead to God, BUT, while the Holy Spirit, God's presence, dwells within us, we have life both in our mortal body and our spirit forever!

Our study of Jesus moves from his teaching in the synagogues to his teaching in the countryside. Jesus teaches in parables. Parables are like riddles, the hearer is to find the answer. Parables make the truth concrete. They move from the here and now to the there and then. Parables only have one point and it is aimed at the hearer. Hence if we study parables, we must learn something of the nature of life in first century Palestine so that the truth strikes us in the same manner it did those in the early faith community. The parable of the "Sower" is one of two parables with an explanation by Jesus. Understanding the explanation will help us when we study Jesus' other parables. The "Sower" represents the one who is spreading the Word, presence, of God. The seeds/Word which fell on the hard, packed path and were eaten by birds, represent those people whose minds are so closed, whose opinions are so set that the love of the gospel cannot penetrate their barriers. That which fell upon stony ground, represent those who hearing the Word rejoice, but like the soil of much of Palestine they are shallow, and the Word does not take permanent root. The seeds/Word which fell among thorns and was choked out represents those who gladly receive the Word but who have so many "irons in the fire" that they never act on the Word and are lost. The seeds/Word that fell on good soil represent those who gladly hear the word, understand it, implement it in their life, and share it. When you share the seed/Word, do not expect quick results, but pray that the Holy Spirit will nurture that Word which you have helped to plant.

May the Holy Spirit abide in you that you may have life eternal and share the joy of God's presence.







Time is drawing near for wildlife. If crop production is includes high residue-prothe expiration of many Conservation Program (CRP) contracts on the South Plains and High Plains regions of the state.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) wants to remind landowners with expiring CRP contracts to come by the local field offices to review their conservation compliance plans before making decisions on the future use of their land.

"The bulk of the state's expiring CRP contracts are located on the South Plains and Panhandle regions,' said Mickey Black, NRCS assistant state conservationist in Lubbock. "It's important for landowners to understand USDA compliance before putting a plow in the ground. Producers should know the options available to them."

According to the Farm Service Agency (FSA), in this region there are over 78,000 acres in CRP contracts due to expire in October. Almost 680,000 acres of CRP will expire in October of 2009, and over 507,000 acres in October of 2010.

NRCS wants producers to know that it's never too early to start considering what to do with CRP land. Leigh Cranmer, NRCS agronomist

Lubbock "Landowners have several options, including grazing or haying the existing grass cover, making enhancements to target wildlife, or putting it back into production. A grazing or haying system could be set up for relatively little cost, and would offer protection from erosion as well as benefiting


