It was pure Houndball from the jump-ball Jim Potts tipped to Brandt Armes' for a fast two points in the opening seconds to the last two points swished in by Kevin McNett in the last seconds of the fourth quarter.

The Hounds command of their Bi-District game with Follett began with two quick baskets, the opening shot by Brandt and a second score by Jared Johnson. Brandt then went on a scoring streak and poured in 13 points for the Hounds, more than any single Follett player tallied in the entire game. Potts was also hot on the baseline and hit two nice shots and followed with one under the basket. Nice rebounding in the first quarter by Johnson and two buckets by Buster McLain also aided the Hound's efforts. The

In third quarter play, McLain swished in three three pointers and two nice baskets, Johnson found the bucket three times, Brandt added a three-pointer and a basket, and Potts scored one basket. Although Potts was charged with his fourth foul midway in the third quarter, the Hounds at the time had a forty point lead. Follett was also ampered with cold shooting in the quarter. The period ended with Gruver 71, Follett 37.

SPS Lowers Rates

The Spearman City Council approved Ordinance #685, February 13, 1998. This ordinance is a settlement between the City of Spearman and Southwestern Public Service that started as a rate case against SPS from the City of Spearman. SPS agreed to file a revised Surcharge Rate Rider with the PUC that will level the surcharge with Spearman, Perryton, Booker, Darrouzett, Follett, and Higgins. This leveling will mean the average residential electric bill will be reduced by approximately 11%. Similar savings will be seen in commercial applications as well.

SPS also agreed to pay the legal fees incurred to the City of Spearman in the amount of \$35,683.20.

The City of Spearman agreed to withdraw their rate case and cannot initiate another rate case

against SPS until after January 1, 2001.

Also included in this agreement is a waiver of 50% of the surcharge by SPS for economic development in our region. This waiver is applicable to new noncompeting industry only. Noncompeting means that the new customer shall not be in a business which directly competes with existing General Service or Large General Service customers in the area, as determined at the discretion of the company.

"The original intent of this rate case was to get lower electrical rates so to encourage economical development and gain comparative electrical rates around us," stated Mayor Burl Buchanan. "This is just another step to comparative rates and an incentive for economic development to come in to help pay off this surcharge. This is a good deal for Spearman and the other surrounding area cities."

A new telephone fraud has been recently brought to our attention. People are receiving telephone calls by individuals saying they are testing their phone (or things similar to this) and asking the callee to press 9 - 0 - # and then hang up. By doing this, the callee is giving the caller access to their phone lines. The caller can then make long distance calls which will show up on the phone bill of the callee with no indication that the calls were not made from the that telephone. By simply hanging up, the caller does not gain any access, and is unable to make phone calls on the callee's phone line. 





have been blue grosbeaks. The indigo bunting is blue but doesn't have the wing bars.



Income Tax Assistance

Need help in filling out those tax forms? A total of 70,802 North Texans received free tax help at more than 300 Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) sites last year.

VITA/TCE offers free tax help to people who cannot afford to pay a tax preparer. Both programs also give free tax help to disadvantaged people and to those who cannot speak the English language. The TCE program generally offers free tax help to people over age 60.

IRS Acting District Director Ellen Murphy encourages anyone needing help from VITA/TCE volunteers to bring all their income information, including forms W-2 and 1099; social security cards or Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers for all dependents; and any other useful documents and forms. Those items could include: lists, receipts, bills or statements of medical,

February Students of the Month Announced



Next year, Ruth will return to the Houston Show armed with detailed records and a well groomed heifer to compete in a special livestock show competition for additional prize money and awards. , Ruth's County Extension Agent will supervise the project throughout the year.

The calf scramble program has been an important part of the Houston Show since 1942. Since that time, more than 14,200 animals have been given to the youngsters across the state of Texas.

"Since the beginning of our program, generous calf scramble donors have provided more than \$5 million in the form of calf purchase certificates to young people across the state. And many of our winners have gone on to build successful businesses based on the lessons they learned through the Houston scramble program," added Greenwade.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo benefits the youth of Texas through individual scholarships and endowments to Texas colleges and universities.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge.

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential customers and \$7 per line for business customers.

Southwestern Bell estimates that the 26 cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does not approve it.

The PUC assigned Docket Number 18513 to this proceeding. The deadline for intervention in this matter is March 31, 1998. 
