All sophomores are encouraged to participate in this program.







A very dear friend of mine sent me the following story, and I thought I would share it with you.

# You Are A "People"

A little girl was asked to bring her birth certificate to school one day. Her mother wisely cautioned her about the important document and told her to be especially careful with it. But in spite of her good intentions, the child lost it. When she became aware of its loss, she began to cry.

"What's the problem, Honey?" her teacher asked sympathetically.

"The little girl wailed, "I lost my excuse for being born!" -Isn't it wonderful that we don't need an excuse for being born? We need make no apologies for being who we are. Nobody on planet earth is more or less valuable than you Sometimes we need to be reminded of that, especially when our sense of self worth is less than it ought to be.

Several years ago, an older friend of mine developed Alzheimer's disease. Bill had lived an active and productive professional life. But in his latter years, his wife cared for him at home. He was aware of his increasing dependency on her, and of the debilitating effect of the disease on his mind. Bill gave up everything he had ever done for himself until eventually nothing was left. As his mind suffered, his sense of worthiness also took a beating. He felt as if he were nobody.

There was one group to which he belonged that decided to stay with him during his decline. He sat on a college board of trustees that encouraged him to continue attending meetings as long as he was able. One of the board members drove Bill to the meetings and brought him back home afterward. This continued even after he had lost his ability to remember names, track a conversation or participate in any meaningful way.

His wife knew that he remained a board member in name only, and that their decision to include him was made solely out of compassion. But Bill seemed to enjoy himself at the meetings and she reasoned that they were probably good for him. After he returned from one such meeting of the trustees, his wife asked him, "Did you have a good meeting, Bill?"

He thought for a moment before replying. Then he answered quite honestly, "I don't know." After a pause, he added this heartfelt comment: "But they still think I'm a people."

The front door to your business is swinging open with increasing frequency. Sales are up more than 17 percent compared to last year. The problem: you still don't have any money. There is more to cash flow than increasing sales and customer counts. Cash flow is having money when you need it.

Here are some tips for dealing with slow paying customers. **Three Power Points** \*First, don't confuse sales with cash. Just because you advertised it,

sold it and delivered it, doesn't mean you'll get paid for it. Receivables won't cover your payroll, pay your rent or protect your credit record. You need sales and cash.

\*Second, understand the two types of slow paying accounts. They are: Slow pay that's good pay and slow pay that's bad pay. Slow pay/good pay are quality companies or individuals with good credit histories, who have always paid you, but historically have taken 45-60 days. Slow pay/bad pay are troubled companies or individuals with mar-

rates

\*Establish a policy. If you have

itor those accounts closely. An accounts receivable aging statement will allow you to categorize accounts by time periods such as: current, 30 to 60 days, 60-90 days and over 90 days.

\*Watch for danger signals. Here are a few: Folks don't abide by agreed to payment terms. An abrupt change in their pattern of payments. Frequently changes address. Checks coming from different banks. Larger than usual orders. (This may indicate that your customer is stock-piling merchandise because of credit or cash flow problems of their own.)


\*Collect quickly. Make an effort to collect all accounts which are

more than 30 days old. Even if it is only a "second notice" or a personal letter or call, do something. Don't let slow pay, become no pay.

\*Bill frequently. Don't wait until the end of the month to send out bills. Invoice the day you make the sale, provide the service or deliver the product. As a minimum, bill at least twice monthly.

\*Don't let the problem get bigger. Don't continue to sell to accounts from which you aren't collecting unless they make payment commitments and keep them.

\*Offer discounts for early payment. Be certain your profit margin will stand the decrease.

Phelps White, after 4 years near Tascosa, moved when his uncle sold out in the Panhandle, over to the Pecos and spent the rest of his life with a home base in Roswell, New Mexico. His home there became the Chaves County Historical Society Museum.

J. Evetts Haley interviewed Phelps White in 1927 and again in 1933. Developing our history is an ongoing project that has been helped by many people. One of Gruver's own, Nanette Cluck Gruver's own, Haines, now lives in Roswell and is helping develop Phelps White's story of his years in the Panhandle. She has mailed us the first interview in 1927 and a family history, Nanette has also visited with Phelps White III, who has given her pointers on where more material might be found.

Nanette, the daughter of Barbara and Delano Cluck, is married to Tom Haines, a lawyer. They are parents of Bennett and Maison, students of a Roswell grade school. Nanette, a volunteer at the Museum, is also a substitute teacher in the Roswell schools









The drilling companies have repeatedly agreed to have just one road, carefully maintained, and to clean the site. But thousands of acres are closed with no vehicles allowed, not even the forest service. The forest service is not even allowed to clear out the underbrush which is a tinder box for lightningcaused forest fires.



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### State Groundwater Policy Is Topic Of Discussion

State groundwater policy is a topic on everyone's minds as the next session of he Texas Legislature approaches.

The future of our state, and especially the future of agricultural producers, depends on sound water policy," said Danny Womble, president of the Hansford County Farm Bureau. "The approach we take can make or break us.

At the request of the House Natural Resource Committee, Texas Farm Bureau outlined the policy recommendations being considered by County Farm Bureaus n advance of its statewide annual meeting in November. The Texas Farm Bureau's Natural Resources Committee, charged earlier this year with studying other concepts or plans that could modify or replace the rule of capture to proect agricultural and individual groundwater rights," offered the following rec ommendations:

•The Groundwater Conservation Districts (GCDs) should continue as the appropriate and preferred entity in Texas to manage groundwater and that man-agement should be based upon the principle of correlative rights. Texas Farm Bureau should strengthen its support for creating GCDs as the alternative to the rule of capture

•The Texas Water Development Board, or other appropriate state agency should be required to designate areas of single-source aquifers where coordinat ed management between GCDs is needed. The GCDs in those management areas should be required by law to develop and follow/ a cooperative management plan for the area


•TFB should support streamlining the petition process for creating a GCD to make it a more desirable option than creating a district through the Texas Legislature.


•Support adoption of rules by GCDs which are "science-based", follow the correlative rights principle where practical and feasible, and respect the private property rights of landowners to capture and market groundwater.

•Requiring domestic groundwater wells on small acreage to be permitted. •Domestic wells on 10 acres or more, and all livestock wells, should still be xempt from the permitting requirements.

•Any property-tax-exempt governmental entity that purchases property for a vell field be required to pay a production fee in lieu of a property tax.

Voting delegates to the Texas Farm Bureau annual meeting in Arlington in November will have the final say on all policy heading into the 77th Legislature



# SHS September Students Of The Month




RYLA. Sally's future plans are to attend the University of Texas in Austin and major in either business or political science.




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
