Accident south of Spearman injures twoby Angela Jones

Two individuals were injured in an accident on Thursday, March 25. According to DPS Trooper Jeff Robertson, the accident occurred 14 miles south of Spearman on Texas Highway 207 at approximately 1:30 p.m.

He explained, "One of the vans was stopped at the construction zone. The other van was south bound on Highway 207." He continued, that the south bound vehicle driven by Kristi Copeland of Perryton struck the van driven by Bobby Wilson of Hutchinson, Kans. in the rear.

Teresa Copeland, passenger, and Wilson received injuries. T. Copeland was transported to Hansford County Hospital in Spearman and Wilson was taken to the Golden Plains Community Hospital in Borger, according to DPS Trooper Robertson. Neither of the individuals were patients at the hospitals on Monday.

DPS Trooper Robertson stated that both Teresa and Kristi Copeland were issued citation. He explained that Kristi was cited for a driving violation. He added, "Teresa was cited for allowing an unlicensed driver to operate a motor vehicle."

**H.C. Commissioner's Court...****Schick inquires about county road**by Angela Jones

David Schick inquired on how he could get a private road dedicated to the county during the Hansford County Commissioner's Court held Monday, March 22.

Schick explained to the commissioners that the road leading to his residence consisted of a half a mile of county road and a half a mile of privately owned road. The commissioners informed him on the procedure he'd have to follow and that he should contact the land owners for the easement.

Hansford County Judge Jim Brown explained that John Hutchison, county attorney, will have to give an attorney opinion then the proposal must come back to the commissioner's court and they'll have to accept the easement. In other business, the Extension Homemakers asked for advice on what to do with the Home Extension Building. "They weren't sure about the ownership," Brown said. He added that it was determined that the Extension Homemakers own the building. "It was deeded to them on March 25, 1950," he stated. No action was taken on the issue. He explained, "We need more information before offering advice."

Dick Gosdin of Unibind demonstrated a document binding machine for the commissioners. No action was taken, according to Brown.

A road easement for Five Farms was approved. The easement is located in commissioner Worley Smith's precinct, Precinct #1. The commissioners made several line item transfers to the budget. A line item transfer is when

money is taken from one line item and placed in another. Line item increases are as follows: election expenses - \$1,500; District Judge Court Appointed Council - \$2,500; Prisoner's meals and sheriff's expenses - \$3,000.

Other budget amendments were made for the general fund to provide for the fire truck. This was an emergency increase in the amount of \$20,000.

Precinct #1 also amended its budget. These changes were line item transfers. These transfers increased part-time by \$4,000 and equipment and repairs by \$10,000.

In regular business, the commissioner's court read and approved the minutes from the last meeting. The Treasurer's report and investments were also read and approved.

Twelve Spearman Junior High students visited Washington D.C. during their Spring Break. They left Saturday, Feb. 27, and were gone for four days and three nights.

While there the students visited numerous places.

Blake Beedy, Dillon Miller and Britt Savage spoke of their favorite place during the trip.

Dillon said that he liked the Arlington National Cemetery the best. He explained, "We got to see Kennedy's grave, Robert Kennedy's grave and the graves of other famous people." He continued telling of other attractions at the cemetery such as the Changing of the Guards, the Tomb of the Unknowns, the Challenger Memorial and the Reflecting Pool. Then he described a fountain in the cemetery and said

that by the fountain there was Kennedy's famous quotes such as "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country."

Blake found the F.B.I. headquarters intriguing. "They gave a shooting demonstration," Blake stated. He then added that there was a display of 5,000 guns in the headquarters and that one of the guns was the one that had been used to shoot Kennedy. While at the headquarters personnel explained that anything that was bought with drug money was confiscated and sold. Some of the items the students saw were an hourglass necklace with diamonds instead of sand, a stuffed Kodiak bear and a motorcycle.

It was also explained how finger printing is used, Blake said. "They told of how two people had looked alike and had the same name. They were able to tell them apart by their finger prints," Blake stated.

The Air & Space Museum was what Britt found the most fascinating. At the museum, which is a part of the Smithsonian Complex, the students saw the Spirit of Saint Louis, Apollo 11 and a bike plane. Other items that caught Britt's attention was the plane that had flown around the world and the Wright Brothers plane. They also saw rockets, according to Britt. He added, "We got to walk through one of them and it showed their (the astronauts) exercise bikes. There wasn't very much room in there."

The three agreed that they had seen a lot of things in a short period of time. They also said that travel-

ling with other groups made us appreciate being from a small town. It was a learning experience.

and added Hallmark and Precious Moments," she added.

"We kept it open for about a year and then moved the merchandise over to Celebrate," she said. Later she added new items such as Mikasa dinnerware and flatware, Frankoma Pottery and Feista Dinnerware.

They began selling Precious Moments when Spearman Rexall Drugs closed, she explained.

Bread, Cereal, Rice and Pasta—Laying the Foundation for a Healthy Diet

One of the best ways to celebrate March which is National Nutrition Month® is by learning to eat healthfully by using the new USDA pyramid.

According to Webster, a pyramid is "an immaterial structure built on a broad supporting base and narrowing gradually to an apex." In the case of the food, pyramid, it represents a general guide to selecting a healthful diet from a variety of food to obtain all the nutrients allotted and calories needed to stay healthy. Specifically you can see that the most graphic space is allowed to the Bread/Cereal/Rice/Pasta group to emphasize that 6 to 11 servings are needed daily depending on your age, size and activity level. You can obtain the recommended servings through wise selections such as:

- Whole grain choices for increased fiber.
- Servings made with less sugar and fat (bagel, English muffin, etc.)
- Less from baked goods made with flour (cakes, pies, etc.) and ordinarily higher in fat and sugar.
- Reduce fat and sugar added as spreads.

• Pastas with sauces with only half the butter or margarine and using skim milk to replace whole milk.

One serving would be as follows: Bread—1 slice; Hamburger—1/2 bun; English muffin—1/2; Small roll, biscuit or muffin—1; Cooked cereal—1/2 cup; Dry cereal—1 ounce.

Many people believe that eating bread and cereals make you fat. For most of us, that is not true. It's usually all the butter, cream cheese and sugars added to breads/cereals that adds extra calories. one serving from this group provides only about 80 calories.

Why are whole grain and enriched bread and cereal products an important part of a balanced diet? To provide the following nutrients:

- complex carbohydrates (starches) to provide energy espe-

cially in lower fat diets recommended by various health organizations.

- Fiber to provide bulk and to help body eliminate wastes.
- B vitamins—thiamin, riboflavin, folic acid.
- Minerals—iron, magnesium, zinc.

Remember that laying a strong foundation by eating 6 to 11 serv-

Spearman Police Report

During the reporting period running from Monday, March 22, to Sunday, March 28, the Spearman Police Department filed 29 activity reports.

Reports filed consisted of five lockouts, responding to four false alarms and four miscellaneous calls. Other reports filed during the week were as follows:

Other reports filed on Thursday were a disorderly conduct in the 900 block of Haney and a domestic disturbance in the 1000 block of Dressen. No charges were filed in either of the incidents, according to Raper.

On Friday, March 26, officers investigated an assault which occurred at 10:45 p.m. This case involves a juvenile alleging that he was struck by an adult, Raper said. The case is still under investigation.

Also filed at the Spearman Police Department on Friday was a Criminal mischief report. This occurred in the 900 block of S. Dressen. Raper explained that a rear window of a vehicle was broke out be-

tween noon and 6 p.m. on the 26th. He added that it is still under investigation.

Then a disturbance involving juveniles was reported at a business parking lot. A family disturbance was also reported from the 300 block of S. Hoskins. No action was taken in either incident.

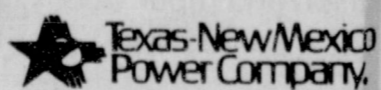

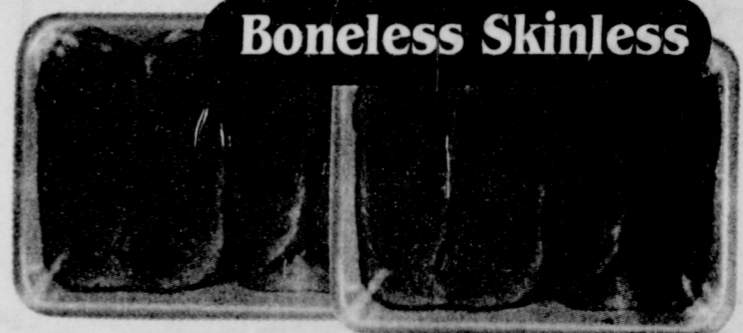

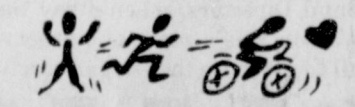

Another service offered at Celebrate is imprinting. Kay explained that they do imprinting for wedding invitations and napkins. They also sell graduation invitations, stationary and business cards.

"In many ways this has been a family project," Kay said. She told of a time when her son, Jimmie, had broken his hand. "He came home over the Christmas holiday and wrapped presents with one hand." She added that her other son, Lynn, also helped out when he was home. "Even now when they come home for the holidays all three of them and their families pitch in and help at the store," she said.

Her daughter, Shari, worked at

the store all through high school. She majored in marketing in college. "I think working at the store had an impact on her choosing the major," Kay said. She added that Shari would like to open her own gift store sometime.

The book keeper for the business is Jim, Kay's husband. She states, "If it wasn't for him and his moral support we probably wouldn't still be going."

Currently there are three part-time employees at Celebrate. They are Robbie Reid, Mona Beth Window and Lynette Williams.

"We are here to fill a need of the customer - a decorative item for their home or a gift to make someone smile," Kay stated. She concluded, "The customer is the heart of our business."

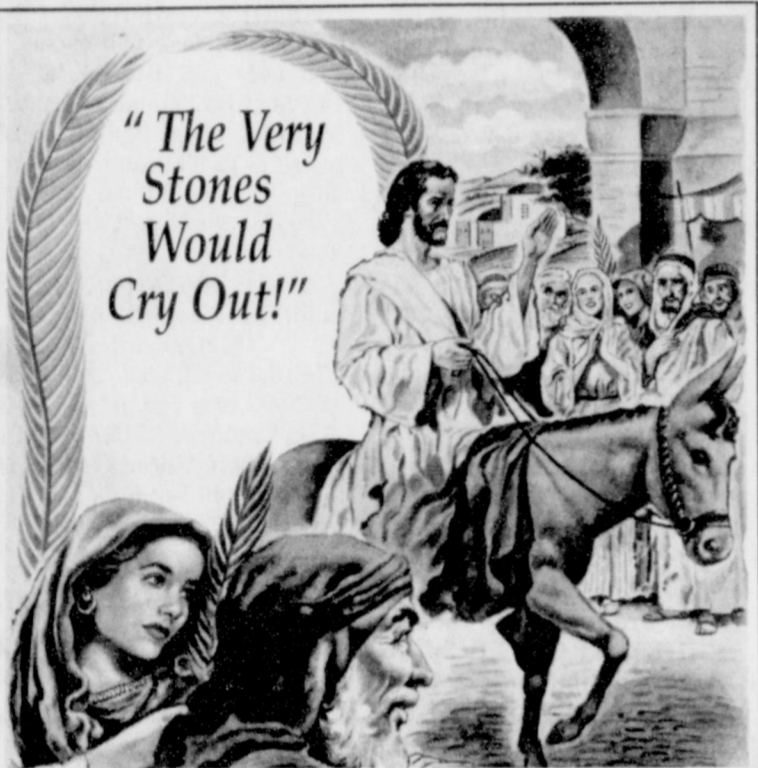
Adding to the afternoon's enjoyment were some numbers sung by the high school ensemble who had received a One ranking at the UIL meet.
