# Accident south of Spearman injures two

Two individuals were injured in an accident on Thursday, March 25. According to DPS Trooper Jeff Robertson, the accident occurred 14 miles south of Spearman on Texas Highway 207 at approximately 1:30 p.m.

Neither of the individuals were patients at the hospitals on Monday.

DPS Trooper Robertson stated that both Teresa and Kristi Copeland were issued citation. He explained that Kristi was cited for a driving violation. He added, "Teresa was cited for allowing an unlicensed driver to operate a motor vehicle.
