## **Dortch Competes In Great Race**

While most 70-year-olds would celebrate their birthday with cake and candles, Tom Dortch plans to make a lap around the Pepsi 400 Nascar Race in Daytona Beach.

That birthday wish will begin Saturday when Dortch and his navigator Jack Renfro of Fort Worth begin their third Great Race in Detroit, Michigan on June 21st.

The race will take the duo and the drivers of nearly 100 other antique autos 3600 miles over a 14 day period. Dortch will be driving a 1935 Ford four-door sedan that he restored to its original condition. The vintage car has an 85 horse power, flat head V-8 engine.

To compete in the race and qualify for the daily prize money and the championship purse, all autos must be 50 years old or older.


The race will feature several

## Storms Rip Through Panhandle With Good Rain, Bad Hail

AMARILLO -- Big smiles have replaced some frowns on the faces of many Texas High Plains farmers. Finally, the rains came. But the news isn't all good. Mother Nature's gift package had some surprises tucked inside -- damaging hail and severe winds.

"While some producers had a tremendous amount of rainfall, others did not get the help they needed," said Dr. Brent Bean, agronomist with Texas Cooperative Extension at the Texas A&M University System Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Amarillo.

"Much of the profit that would have come from dryland wheat won't be realized this year anyway due to our spring drought," Bean said. There has been no significant moisture to measure since the crop was planted last fall. While recent rains offset dry conditions, the relief came too late for some producers.

For farmers with better horizons, harvest had only started when the rains came. With some sunny days this week, the combines began

rolling back into a few more fields. The high, sometimes straight-line winds and hail that accompanied the recent downpours damaged or destroyed some fields of young crops, such as cotton and corn. Bean said that grain sorghum, just now being planted, will benefit the most from the moisture-laden fields. Corn will get a good boost from the added moisture. All Panhandle corn is irrigated.

"An inch of rainfall saves producers an estimated \$6 to \$10 an acre in irrigation costs," Bean explained. "It's too early for rains to have a great impact, but at least this is a good start in replenishing stored soil moisture for next year's

In Deaf Smith County alone, Extension agricultural agent Dennis Newton of Hereford, estimates 5,000 acres of cotton have been lost to hail with the most severe storms occurring over the last two weeks.

last two weeks.

"On Monday, some farms were hit again, so we lost another 3,000 acres or more, and that's just cotton. Some corn and sorghum were completely wiped out," Newton

Cotton is planted on an estimated 45,000 acres annually here, Newton said. At least 10,000 acres has been shaved off that total with recent storms. Replanting cotton is out of the question now. June 1 was the ending date to qualify cotton under federal crop insurance

program.

Newton said the damage in corn is still being assessed. Some

12,000 acres are planted each year.
Grain sorghum or 'seed sorghum' is the top crop grown in the Hereford area. Farmers are still out planting dryland sorghum.
Between 60,000 and 70,000 total dryland and irrigated acres grow there each year.

"We're going to see a lot of grain sorghum where cotton had been planted," the Extension agent said. Rain, although spotty, fell in

pro-10 an Hereford received a little more than 2 inches. West of the city, rain gauges registered from 3 to 5 inchleast es.

In Oldham County, near Wildorado, 6 inches or more of rain has fallen. The downside for two farmers here and for many of their neighbors across High Plains locations is that crops have been damaged.

Wildorado farmer David Cleavinger had 700 acres of cotton hailed out. The bright side: his milo crop will be good to excellent this year. Cleavinger will plant it in the rows where once a fledgling cotton crop grew.

"We've also had some wheat damaged, both dryland and irrigated," said Cleavinger. Before the storms hit, the ongoing drought had made his dryland crop marginal at best. Grateful for the recent rains, Cleavinger has started harvesting some wheat this week. He also shut down his irrigation

equipment.

"With natural gas prices running at \$7 per thousand cubic feet, we're cutting our production costs substantially by simply turning off the wells," Cleavinger said.

For Dale Artho, who also farms near Wildorado, the story is similar to Cleavinger's.

"Hail damaged almost all of our acreage," said Artho, who reported one 865-acre field of grain sorghum was destroyed. Another 640 acres of sorghum was split by storm damage — half the field was wiped out, Artho said, and the other half sustained 50 percent

damage. The least of his wheat damage falls in the 30 percent

Wheat was a big investment this year for Dale and Kathy Artho, who saw seed delivered in four semi-truckloads before planting started last year. He had just started harvesting dryland wheat. Yields were in the 15-bushel range. Then the storms hit.

Last fall, the moisture just wasn't there to consider other crops, said Artho, who planted only 600 acres in cotton this year. With all of it lost, he will be replanting with sorghum.

"Right now, we're just getting started again on our wheat harvest," Artho said. Yields are in the 10 bushel range on the remaining dryland that will be cut. He also keeps some wheat acreage for grazing livestock. "I just don't know yet about irrigated yields."

On Artho's farm, the irrigation wells are turned off. He calculated a savings at current natural gas prices based on his water volumes at \$9.50/acre inch of water. The rains will replace about 3 to 4 acre inches. While that helps, only 50 percent of soil moisture is available at any given time for plants to use during the growing phase.

Amazingly there are spots where rainfall is still a dream. The tiny Ford community, northwest of Hereford, received just under an inch of rain.

"In that area, there's not enough moisture to get the sorghum up, most of it stems from dryland production," Newton said. Some farmers are planting right up to the deadline, banking on future rains. Crop insurance adjusters are

working rapidly in most counties, and producers are rushing to make adjustments in their production schedules for the year. "Other crops need to replace the

"Other crops need to replace the ones where extensive damage occurred," said Newton.

While storms can create havoc, Newton agrees the recent rains have helped offset the drought that has continued for more than two years across the region.

"It has helped our farmers, even though we've lost some acres in all crop categories."

DeDe Jones, Extension risk management specialist in Amarillo, stressed the importance of getting an adequate amount of rain on corn. With the high cost of natural gas this year, corn is considered by many to be a 'high risk' crop because of its large water requirements. Most producers are expecting to spend between \$150 to \$180 per acre.

"At these costs, it will be very hard for farmers to break even, let

alone make a profit," Jones said.
"Rainfall will prove to be the deciding factor for many corn producers in determining their economic stability."

Despite the losses, things are looking good for corn and cotton in Deaf Smith County, according to Newton.

"Right now we need some 90-degree days to boost the heat units, so cotton will grow," Newton added. With cotton, the sun's heat is needed to raise soil temperatures. This cool, wet weather has just idled the crop, Newton said, and farmers need a minimum of a week or more to move things

Panhandle people are watching some area lakes rise up from some dangerously low levels. Ranges and pastures are greener than most folks can remember, too, especially in upper Deaf Smith County near Wildorado.

"Palo Duro Creek is flowing with water for the first time in years," Newton said.

## **Wheat Harvest Begins In County**

Area elevators report the 2003 wheat harvest is gearing up.

While the rainfall of last week hindered harvest efforts and much of the irrigated wheat not ready for cutting, area elevator managers are reporting an increases in grain received this week.

The first full load of wheat reportedly harvested in the county was June 2, in the Morse community and delivered to Perryton Equity of Morse.

Sunray Coop of Gruver reports their first wheat received was from Kenneth Harris' dryland on Thursday, June 11. Cargill of Spearman lists their first load from Travis Patterson on June 9, while Agoo of Spearman, Elevator A reported their first full truck delivery was also on June 9.

Early test weights were averaging between 58 and 59 pounds according to Wayne Stinar, Sunray Coop of Gruver Manager. Cargill of Spearman also reported good test weights of 58-60. Bernstein and Perryton Equity of Morse both reported test weights between 54-60 with Perryton Equity of

Spearman reporting 59-61.

While Sunray Coop of Gruver was anticipating a smaller crop this year, Stinar predicted production will be less than expected due to heavy hail damage in the southern and western areas of the county.

"I am hearing producers in the southern and western parts of the county saying they have lost 40-50% or more of their crop due to hail damage," Stinar said.


While officials at Bernstein elevators said that hail damage to the northern part of the county was not a factor, Perryton Equity of Morse

said some producers in that area received heavy hail damage with some producers losing their entire wheat crop.

Pat Steele of Cargill of Spearman stated that the Spearman area had been hit by three hailladen storms recently.

"With the wheat nearing maturity, it is in a fragile state and can be very quickly damaged and shattered by any hail that falls."

Prices for wheat on Tuesday ranged from a low of \$2.85 to a high of \$2.92 at Perryton Equity of



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



The tanker, which held a potential threat of ammonia under pressure. was righted and removed Monday evening



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
