## Burglar breaks into 5 downtown businesses

Officers of the Spearman Police Department and the Hansford County Sheriff's Department are investigating the burglary of Barb's Beauty Salon, Celebrate, Berry Cleaners, Spearman Chamber of Commerce, and the Reporter-Statesman. All the businesses were located in the 100 and 200 blocks of Main Streetof Spearman.

The five businesses were robbed Thursday night, November 3rd. The perpetrators obtained entry through doors and windows that faced the alley.

The burglars entered Barb's through the back door after breaking the locks. "Approximately \$178 in cash was taken, the drawers were pulled out and dumped, and the stations were messed up," said Missie Sumner of Barb's

Celebrate was entered through the back door after the padlock was broken, according to Kay Vernon of Celebrate. The person or persons only found \$23 in change in the cash register, but they went through the drawers and things in the office looking for money.

There were also many other items taken. "They hit the men's department pretty hard and took some limited edition items," said Kay Vernon. "They also helped themselves to some chocolate candy we had, so we are calling them the chocolate bandits. We feel really fortunate. It could have been a lot worse had they vandalized the store and broke all the glass items," Vernon stated.

Berry Cleaners was entered through the back window after the burglars som how worked the window out of its frame. They then looked around and took an undetermined amount of cash, but did not vandalize any of the clothes or do any damage.

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce Office was entered after the burglars pried the back door open. Cindy Blackman said, "They just made a mess, but I don't think they took anything that I can find. All the desk drawers were gone through in the office. They even went through the drawers in the Wheatheart Travel Agency, but nothing was taken. It seems they were just looking for cash."

The burglars entered the Reporter-Statesman after breaking a window in the garage door located in the back. They then pried their way into the cash register and took the money from it. They also searched through the office, leaving drewers open. It is estimated that between \$200 and \$300 was taken, according to Deziree Torres, office manager.

Attempts were also made to enter businesses that are no longer in operation. Officers are currently involved in the processing of physical evidence recovered from the burglary scene and continue to pro-

ceed with the investigation. If anyone has any information, please contact the Spearman Police Department at 659-3707.

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

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### Out at the Lake

> If you are interested in trees, you will find a bois d'arc tree, also known as Osage-orange on the north side of the dam in the little picnic area that is closest to the boundary fence. A wooden table has been wedged between its trunk and that of a nearby cottonwood tree. It bore fruit this year, but some animals in the park have enjoyed the green fruit, this friit looks somewhat like oranges but are called horse or hedge apples. They are often sought for odd and interesting floral arrangements.

We have no idea how this ancient bois d'arc tree came to be in this spot. It is not native to the Panhandle, and we are curious if it

is the only one in the county. It was always planted in the shelter belts sponsored by the government from 1835 to 1948, but there were not many of those locally. We think we have the largest cotton wood tree in the county, so it would be nice to have the only, or the biggest, bois d'arc tree as well.

This tree, a member of the Mulberry family, as extremely hard wood. It was given its name by the French when they noticed the Indians favored it for their bows and arrow shafts. We pronounce the name as Bow Dark. As the early settlers also prized it for its stoutness and durability, wagon frames, coupling poles, single trees, wheels, tongues, and neck yokes could all be built from this wood. After the advent of barbed wire, one of the chief uses of this tree was for fence posts. Even a hundred years later, it is still possible to find some of these fence posts still in use.
