Coach Schroeder indicated he was very pleased with the action of his team.

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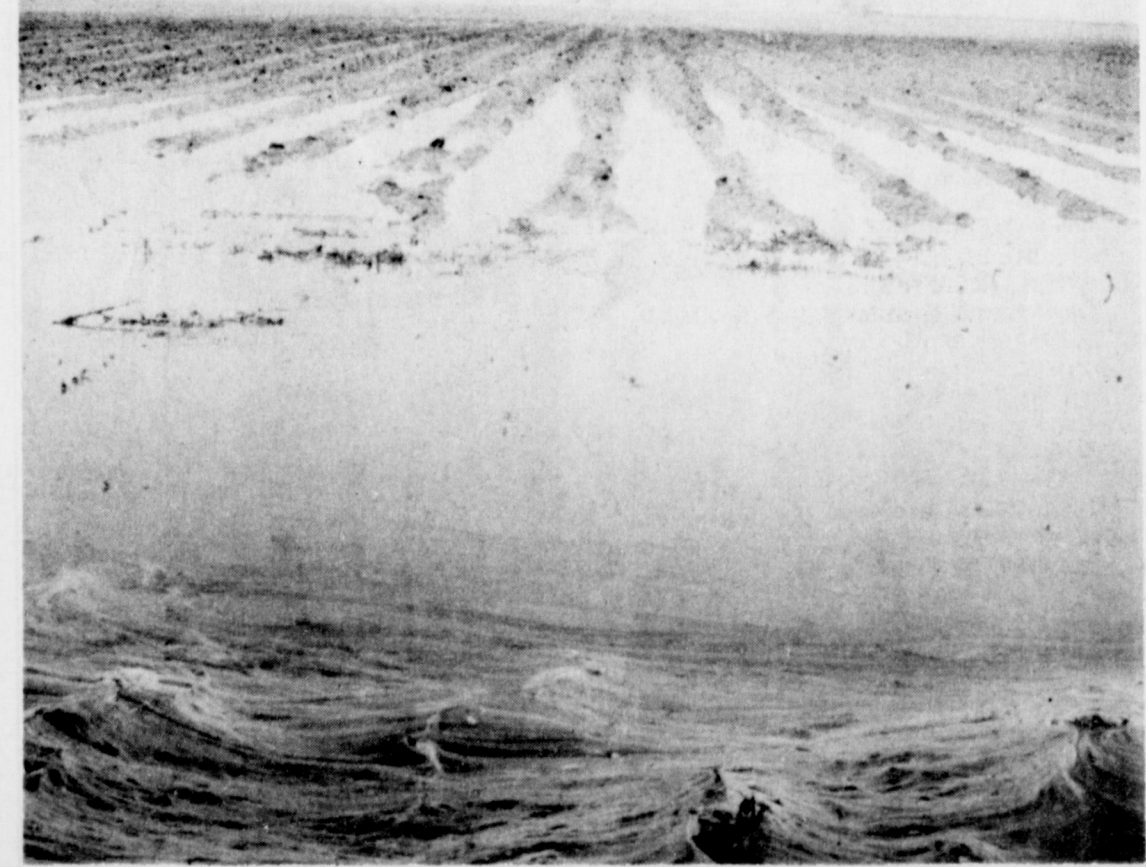

Muleshoe Duo Hurt Thursday In Accident

Mrs. J. T. Shofner, Route Two, Box 316, Muleshoe and her mother-in-law, Mrs. H. M. Shofner, 117 West 17th, were hospitalized at West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe Thursday morning following an accident at mid-morning two miles south of Friona on Highway 214.

Mrs. J. T. Shofner, who was the driver of the vehicle involved in the accident, said she and the elder Mrs. Shofner had started to Amarillo and were driving north toward Friona when the right front door of the automobile swung open. Mrs. Shofner said she lunged over to catch the elder woman who started falling from the car and when she released the steering wheel, the automobile veered out of control into the ditch. Both women were thrown from the car. Mrs. J. T. Shofner was found lying on the shoulder of the highway and her mother-in-law was in the ditch.

A local farmer, Ken Duncan, who was the second person at the accident site said the car was in the edge of a field approximately 400 feet from where the women were lying. Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 6

SIX-MONTH DROUTH BROKEN--

Rain Deposits .77; More Is Predicted

After breakin a major drouth story in the Thursday issue of the Muleshoe Journal, the rains come!! Following a cool, cloudy day, thunderstorms which covered a large area of Texas and Eastern New Mexico, deposited as much as an inch and a quarter of rain on parched land.

The storm hit Muleshoe at approximately 6:30 p.m. with brilliant lightning and booming thunder. During the height of the storm, small hailstones peppered Muleshoe, ranging from tiny to pea size. A total of .77 was officially recorded for Muleshoe. Deep water formed small rivers around intersections for several hours, but little runoff was noted at mid-morning Friday.

In areas around Muleshoe, up to one and one quarter inches were received and wide smiles were noted among the farmers in this predominantly agricultural area.

Muleshoe was without telephone service Thursday night, and during the day Friday, despite continued efforts by the telephone company, late Friday

afternoon, a number of telephones were still out of order.

The Bailey County Law Enforcement Center was unable to transmit messages Friday morning for a time, but their

radio station remained on the air during the Thursday night severe weather although the dispatcher was unable to hear outlying stations clearly.

The storm spawned at least one tornado and two unconfirmed tornadoes were reported. These were all in the Farwell-Texico area. First report was at 6:25 p.m. when a tornado was reported Northeast of Farwell. At 6:35 p.m. a tornado unroofed the home of Chuck Bradley southwest of Farwell-Texico, twisted a chain link fence, destroyed trees and small outbuildings. No injuries were reported.

Another tornado was reported to have touched the ground near Stratford in the Texas Panhandle, put no damage was

She found him with his right arm caught in a power take-off. Fred Beene, another Needmore farmer, freed his arm. Tiller was brought to West Plains Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment and taken immediately to Lubbock.

Hospital officials at West Plains Memorial Hospital said Tiller had a badly mangled arm, and it appeared to be broken in a number of places.

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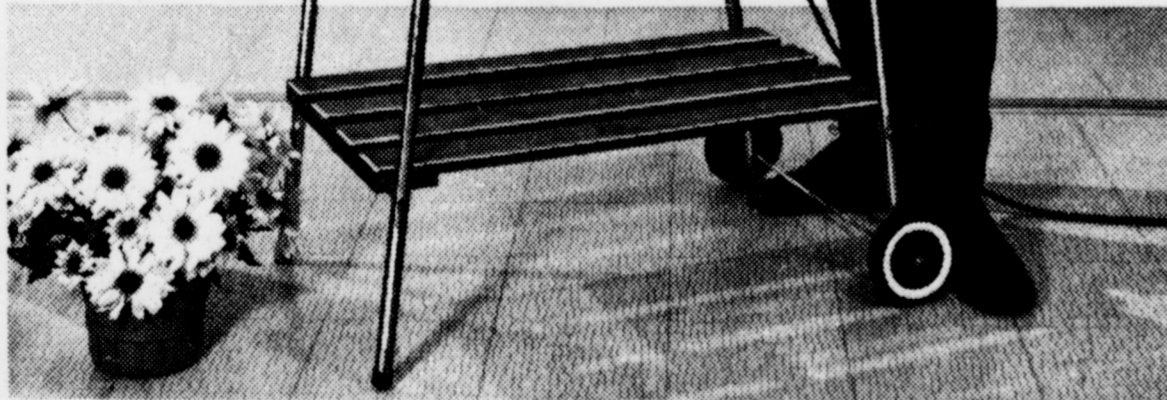
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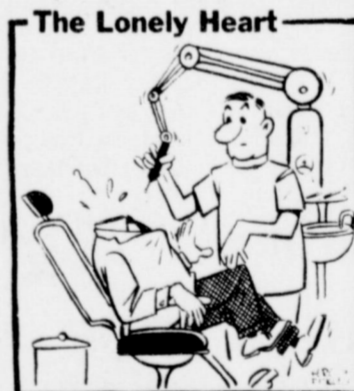

COLLEGE STATION--In the spring a homemaker's fancy turns to thoughts of fashions--of clothes, spring bonnets and even food. Spring markets are jammed with fashionable foods that offer the most for the money and still supply ample meal satisfaction, reports Mrs. Gwendolyn Ciyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. Turkeys offer a pleasing combination--high quality plus low price. On a cost per serving basis, turkey is one of the low cost meats this season. With roast turkey, Mrs. Ciyatt suggests you serve herb rice, buttered green beans, cabbage and orange slaw, whole wheat rolls and ice cream. Hams are marked with moderate price tags. Picnics, too, supply good eating for little money, and the flavorful smoked meats rate tops when used as planned left-overs. Read the label carefully to make sure you are getting the flavor and texture you want. Serve baked ham with sweet potatoes, buttered fresh asparagus, orange ambrosia salad, butterhorn rolls and rice pudding. Leg of lamb or shoulder of lamb are both savory menu choices. Serve lamb hot or cold, properly cooked at low

temperatures. With lamb, serve parsley potatoes, buttered cabbage wedges, grapefruit and orange salad, rolls, mint jelly and apple pie with cheese wedges. The most popular beef cut is rib roast. Choose a standing rib, rolled rib or an old-fashioned pot roast. Chuck roast, either blade or arm, is a good value. Add carrots, potatoes and onions, and serve molded fruit salad and custard pie as side treats. Chickens, either stewers or fryers, are low in cost and are nutritious. A general cookbook will suggest many ways to fix chicken. One menu idea is baked chicken casserole with rice, buttered broccoli, fresh spinach and tomato salad, plus your favorite cookies and sherbet for dessert. Pork loins also are a festive fresh cut for the holidays. Compare prices on the blade end, center cut and sirloin end. Serve pork loin roast with buttered carrots, tossed green salad topped with hard cooked eggs, corn sticks and lemon chiffon pie.

In the fruit section, luscious Texas grapefruit and oranges have attractive price tags; high quality apples from cold storage are still available. Bananas, pineapples, cantaloupes, lemons, tangerines, avocados and strawberries should also be considered.

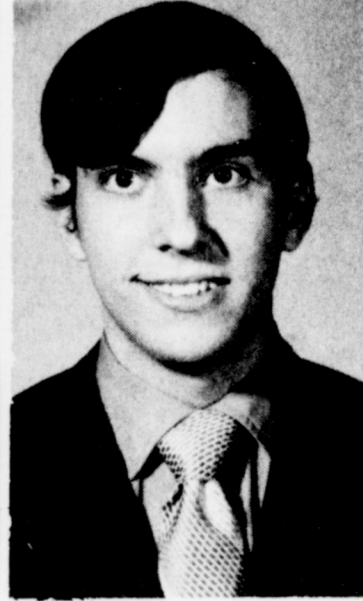

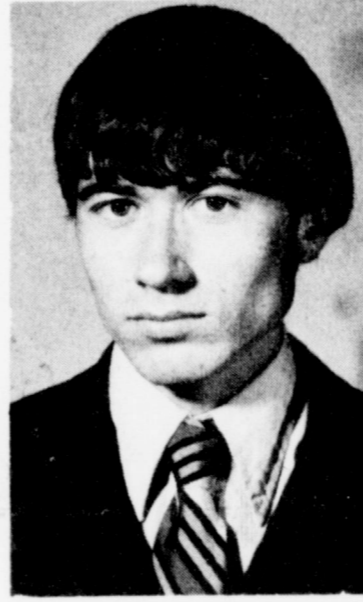
