Charlie Tiller Injures Arm At His Farm

Needmore community farmer, Charlie Tiller, was taken to Lubbock Methodist Hospital Thursday afternoon after being seriously injured at his farm.

Mrs. Tiller said she became concerned about her husband and went to look for him after he did not return to their home when a storm was coming up. She said that usually, Tiller returned to their home several times during the afternoon, but Thursday, he failed to return home.

She found him with his right arm caught in a power takeoff. Fred Beene, another Needmore farmer, freed his arm. Tiller was brought to West Plains Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment and taken immediately to Lubbock.

Hospital officials at West Plains Memorial Hospital said Tiller had a badly mangled arm, and it appeared to be broken in a number of places.


