## Home destroyed in fire; community offers help

Fire destroyed the home of the Tim Flores family of Saturday, March 19, but the kindness of the community is helping them get back on their feet.

According to Spearman Volunteer Fireman Bret Burgin, the Spearman Fire Department received a call of a structure fire on airport road at 1:51 p.m. and the home was completely engulfed when they arrived. We rolled four engines and three other volunteer fire department vehicles to the scene, Burgin stated, but it was a complete loss. Two of the firemen, who were there for the initial attack, were treated at the scene for

smoke inhalation, Burgin said. He continued that the firemen fought the blaze for approximately 6 hours. "We returned to the station around 8 p.m.," he said.

It was reported that no one was home at the time of the fire, but the home was a complete loss.

After the fire, the community was called upon to help the family by donating clothing, blankets, and other basic household items. Rev. Ray Cook stated that they had a terrific response. "The community response was super and the family is very appreciative," Cook stated.

## Palo Duro River Authority Adopts resolution authorizing park planning assistance

The Palo Duro River Authority adopted a resolution for park assistance during the regular meeting held Tuesday, March 15.

This resolution "authorizes the PDRA to request assistance in basic site planning for a recreational park". Derrington explained that this was one of the steps necessary for the PDRA to apply for park planning assistance from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Service. "We are looking at a long range plan and deciding what we want to do now," Derrington stated. "There are grants available and we need to decide which grants to apply for and how to use them." According to General Manager James Derrington, the resolution had to be adopted as a part of that process.

In other business, the board received two copies of a book by Simon

W. Freese and Debra Lightfoot Sizemore. The book covers the history of Freese and Nichols Engineers and the water industry, Derrington said. Jim Nichols, chairman of Freese and Nichols Engineers board presented the books and several copies of the summary in honor of the companies 100th year anniversary.

A discussion was held on the leasing of lake lots, but no action was taken.

In the general discussion of the project, board members discussed how and where to display a plaque the PDRA received in recognition for building the dam.

The minutes and Treasurer's report were approved as presented. Paying bills in the amount of \$21,858.45 was also approved.

Derrington reported that the lake was at 204" on Saturday, March 19.

## Spearman accepts grant from Emergency Management Division

Spearman City Council members voted to accept a grant from the Emergency Management Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety to aid in the purchase of a computer for the weather radar system.

City Manager Kelvin Knauf stated during the regular meeting Tuesday, March 15 that the city could provide weather tracking service on the cable television public access channel. It could be valuable for monitoring the speed, intensity and direction of severe weather as it approaches the panhandle. According to Knauf the FEMA has agreed to pay \$562.50

towards the purchase of the computer and software and the City of Gruver agreed to split the remaining cost. Knauf added that in addition to the City of Spearman's half, they would have to pay for the tie-in equipment and the cost incurred to access the weather pictures.

In other business, the city awarded several bid contracts.

A purchase contract for a new swimming pool filter was awarded to Recreaonics in the amount of \$6,118.81. Two other bids were received, but Recreaonics submitted the low bid.

Fuqua Enterprises, Inc. was the only bid for 50 metal refuse containers. Knauf stated that this was the company the city bought their dumpsters from last year. He continued that the current budget for the purchase of dumpsters was \$12,250 and recommended that the city purchase only 46 dumpsters for a total of \$12,098 in order to stay within the budget. The council approved the recommendation to purchase 46 dumpsters from Fuqua Enterprises, Inc. at \$263.50 each.

Council members reviewed the bids for a contract mowing city properties. After reviewing the bids, it was decided that the city would continue to mow all of the property except the airport. The contract for mowing the airport was awarded to J&M Service Center in the amount of \$6,000.

Sealed proposals on the depository and custody of city funds were reviewed. Mr. George Williford of First Southwest Company analyzed the bids for the city and recommended for the city to remain with First National Bank of Spearman for two years for the depository and

custody of city funds. The council approved the recommendation.

The council adopted a resolution rejecting all prior bids for construction and repair of the wastewater treatment plant. The resolution specifies for the solicitation of new bids for emergency repairs and the revision of contract specifications making findings of fact. The resolution was made effective March 15.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District presented the city with a refund check in the amount of \$415.78. She discussed that the appraisal district discontinued the maintenance contracts on the computer equipment and set up a reserve account of \$11,000 for that purpose. She then discussed the city's options as a taxing entity.

Tindle Ramon, vice-president of the chamber, requested that the city reimburse the chamber \$500 from the Economic Development Fund for a year's subscription to "High Ground of Texas". The request was approved.

Council members approved entering into a contract with Catholic Protection Services Company for another year to inspect each elevated and ground water storage tank and replace the anodes as needed.

Kathy Beck was appointed as Presiding Judge and Pearl Pierce as Alternate Judge for the Municipal Election on May 7, 1994.

In regular business, the minutes from the previous meetings were approved. The monthly entity reports were approved. And the council approved payment of bills in the amount of \$232,009.83.

# Panhandle Crisis Center Report

You readers familiar with us may skip this paragraph and start with the next one. The PCC offers services free of charge to men or women who are victims of domestic violence, whether physical or "merely" verbal. We give counseling, support, and information to these victims, plus a shelter to those who feel themselves to be in danger at home. We are available for help 24 hours a day, at 435-5008. If you want information only, call us from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. For those who must call us long distance, use the toll-free number: 1-800-753-5308.

At our last board meeting, we experienced the very best example of good parenting that I have ever seen. Two state officers came from Houston to visit us (among other government-funded centers for abused women) to check our progress and current skills. They had examined our procedures in detail during the hours they spent here, then stayed over for the board meeting that same night. The women, each in her particular field - one was accounting, the other was operational procedures - told us what a splendid job we were doing, that our bookkeeping was flawless, etc. And to think of our humble beginnings! You've grown to be one

## H.C. sales and use tax down in third quarter

The State Comptroller's office reported that the state sales and use tax in Hansford County were down in the Third Quarter 1993 Analysis Report.

According to a report from State Comptroller John Sharp, the retail trade division of Hansford County received \$8,176,627 in sales tax rebate checks for the third quarter of 1993 with 76 outlets reporting. This is a 23.4 percent decrease over the \$10,668,261 reported for the third quarter of 1992.

For all industries in Hansford County sales tax rebate checks in the amount of \$17,946,769 were received for the third quarter of 1993 with 144 reporting outlets. \$19,209,872 was reported for the same period in 1992 with 137 outlets reporting for a 6.6 percent decrease.

**McLain breaks school record**  
**Coaches thrilled with continuing effort**

Sophomore Molly McLain, the girl with ice water in her veins from the free throw line, has pursued new worlds to conquer at Gruber High School. McLain, competing at the Comanche Relays at West Texas High School in Stinnett this past weekend, Friday-Saturday, March 18-19, has broken a long standing (11-year) GHS record in the high jump. The old record, 5'2" was held by four girls - Sally Holt, Holly Venneman, sister Mika McLain, and Molly herself. Holt had first set the record in 1983 at Stinnett. Also at Stinnett, Molly jumped 5'3" to break the record, taking first place gold at the meet, good for 10 of the Lady Hounds 58 points. The Gruber girls took 5th place at the meet.

Coach Jim Davis couldn't have been more pleased with the continuing effort by the Gruber girls. In the long jump competition, Wynn Maupin took first place for a 16'2 3/4", bettering her effort of last week by nearly a foot - and an effort that will place her high on the Amarillo GloBe News Girls Track Honor Roll this week. Wendy Rodriguez also competed in the long jump, and took third place, jumping 15' 1/2".

In the triple jump, it was Maupin again for first place points with a jump of 33'8 1/2", not quite matching her 34'2" at Sunray, which has her already high (4th) on the Globe News Girls Track Honor Roll from last week. Maupin, a senior, could conceivably break a couple of school records also before her career is through. The two records are 17'10" in the long jump, set by Melanie Yanke at Gruber in 1972; and 35'6 1/2" in the triple jump, set by Kristy McKee at the district meet in 1974. She already holds one GHS record - in the 300 meter intermediate his best of the year by two seconds. Arreola and Maupin also competed. Arreola placing. McNett competed in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles. And in the 200 meter dash, it was Atwood again placing. Atwood ran a 23.49, Frick 24.61 and Wright 24.61 in the prelims.

Looking at the JV Hounds competition, Gruber finished third with 87 points. The results here are not complete, but this is the best we could do.

In the shot put, Juan Arreola threw it 42'3 1/2" for second place and eight points. It was his best toss of the year. Brady Tidwell and Heath Tolleson also competed. In the discus, Jeb Lee, Arreola and Max Frick competed. In the long jump, Jarrod Hoel, Travis Ferguson and Frick competed. Hoel took first place, and Ferguson took third place. And in the pole vault, Daniel Bort took first place with a leap of 11'0", his best jump of the year.

In the triple jump, J.D. Christian, Sammy Renteria and Arreola competed.

In the 400 meter relay, it was Bort, Renteria, Frick and Hoel for third place with a time of 47.3. It was their fastest of the year. In the 800 meter run, Lee and John Duncan competed. In the 110 meter high hurdles, it was Ferguson for second place with a time of 17.5 seconds. It was his fastest time of the year thus far.

In the 100 meter dash, tragedy. Bort ran a 12.04 in the prelims, and J.D. Christian a 12.17, but in the finals Bort mistook a line for the finish line and leaned in to finish the race early, and was passed at the end by two fellow competitors. Bort finished fifth.

In the 400 meter dash, Hoel, Arreola and Duncan were the competitors. Hoel ran a 56.0, Arreola a 57.7, and Duncan a 61.62. In the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, Renteria ran a 44.95 and Ferguson a 47.07. In the 200 meter dash, the competitors were Christian, Frick and Matt Overbey. The pole vault Hoel turned in his best result of the year, 11'6", and just missing 12 feet. That gained him fourth place. Aaron Frick competed, in the shot put and the discus. In the shot, he gained third place with a heave of 44'11". In the discus, he threw it his best toss of the year, 135'10", also good for third place.

In the triple jump, like his sister Wynn, Wylee Maupin is also a staunch competitor. He placed with his jump of 41'4", his best jump of the year. Rosalio Arreola and Kevin McNett also competed in the triple jump. And in the running high jump, Eric Wright leapt 5'10", his best of the year, and Maupin jumped 5'8", both of those athletes placing. McNett also competed in the high jump.

In the long jump competition, Ryon Atwood competed and placed, and Wright and Arreola also competed.

In the 400 meter "Sprint" Relay, Atwood, McNett, Bravo and Arreola were the competitors, and they placed fourth with a time of 45.9. In the 800 meter run, Arreola placed fourth and Barkley fifth, no times recorded.

In the 110 meter high hurdles, it was McNett for fifth place with a time of 16.76 seconds, his best of the year for the third week in a row.

In the 100 meter dash, Wright ran an 11.87 in the prelims, qualifying him for the finals, but had to return early on Saturday, and didn't compete. 11.87 would have been good enough for second place in the finals competition. Frick ran a 12.02 in the prelims, along with Wright his best of the year, and 12.05 in the finals, resulting in a third place bronze.

In the 400 meter dash, Atwood placed second for eight points with a time of 52.78 seconds, bettering hurdles.

Also in the triple jump, senior Shanna Jarvis competed and finished fifth with a jump of 30'3", her best effort of the year.

Other results for the Lady Hounds at Stinnett: In the discus throw, Kiki Carthel finished sixth. In the 3200 meter run, Myriam Alvarez finished sixth. In the 3200 meter run, Myriam Alvarez finished fourth at 14:08.4 The 400 meter relay team of Tara Shapley, Molly McLain, Jarvis and Maupin finished fourth.

In the 800 meter run, Joni Hart ran extremely well, finishing second with a time of 24.1.

And in the 100 meter dash, Rayne Lindsey finished fifth with a time of 14.06 seconds.

Now to look at the Hounds re-

sults, and another pleased coach. "I was extremely pleased with the effort," said Coach Doug Frick on Sunday. "They are really knocking time off their results each week, and I am thrilled." Gruber finished with 59 1/2 points, good for fifth place - that after officially winning the Sunray Bobcat meet the week before, with those results finally released.

The results could have been better for the Hounds, as they had several boys who qualified for the finals, but had to return early on Saturday due to the Prom that night, and who didn't compete in the finals at the meet.

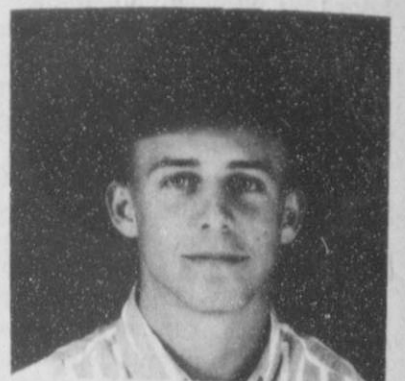





the outstanding players around."

"Carrie is one of the most dedicated and determined players I've ever coached. She led our team by example. She is an outstanding post defender and led our team in steals. The intangibles she provided our team made her value to our team immeasurable."

"Ashly was a natural leader. She just kept getting better as the importance of the games increased. She made some big buckets for us this year."

"Telie is a team player. She did everything asked of her and showed much fortitude by playing through a painful tendonitis injury."

Coach Steve Myatt naturally was pleased with the recognition of his Lady Hounds team members to the all-district team, and he gives this report on each of the selectees.

"Mika was a legitimate all-stater, a pure shooter, a co-captain and showed a lot of leadership. The number one thing I'll remember about Mika is that she always had the ultimate confidence in the big games."

"Wynn was co-captain, and in my opinion, she also played at an all-state level. The thing I will most remember about her is the shot against Jim Ned in the last seconds - she really stepped up in the play-offs. She was very versatile, the best inside-outside player I've ever coached."

"Julie became the kind of player, the leader, that I always knew she could be. She played at an unbelievably high level in the Regional Tournament - played excellent at both ends of the floor. She is a hard worker, a leader."

The girls love her."

She is the unheralded player - put the team above herself and never worried about how much she scored. She was our barometer. Her unselfishness was contagious."

Coach Tim Garland of the Hounds also had good things to say about Hoel and Dawson.

"Toby was our team leader in assists. He did a great job as our point guard and did everything asked of him. He is at his best pushing the ball up the floor and leading our break.

"You think of Chuck as an offensive player, teams leading 3-point scorer, but he also at times received our main defensive assignment.

"We looked for rebounds from Clint. He was the teams second leading rebounder and was the most improved player from last year."

Both Spearman and Gruver are looking forward to the 1994-95 season.

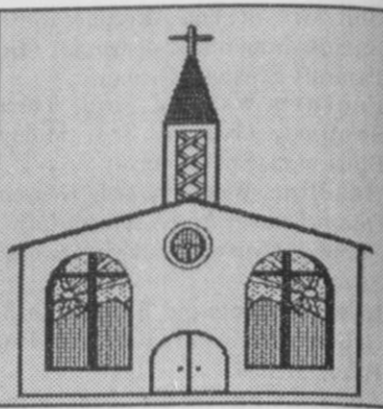

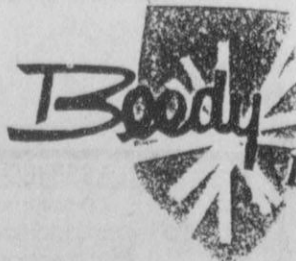

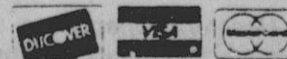
