
# Producers Required to Sign Contracts Annually

Producers wanting to receive advance direct payments in December under the Direct and Program Counter-cyclical (DCP) must sign their 2004 re the end of DCP contracts h the year, according to the head of the Hansford County Farm Service Agency. "The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 introduced the Direct and Countercyclical Program, which requires producers to sign a new contract every year," said Rick Hargrove, executive director of the Hansford County FSA. This is a change from the old Production Flexibility Contracts, which were good for seven years. The Direct and Counter-cyclical Program offers eligible farmers and ranchers direct cash payments based on acres and ields established for each farm. Producers can elect to receive their direct payments as a lump sum in October or as two partial payments-an advance payment of up to 50 percent of the total and a final payment for the remainder. When electing to receive two partial payments, Hargorve said, "the producer also selects the month in which to receive the advance payment - that's

where timing is critical," he counter-cyclical payments are calculated using base acres and

"Producers who, for tax or other purposes, want to receive an advance payment this month, have to sign their 2004 DCP calculated using base acres and payment yields established for each individual farm. Direct payment rates are constant. Counter-cyclical payment rates

Regardless of which month a producer selects for the advance direct payment, final payments are made in October, following the end of the fiscal year.

The Direct and Counter-cyclical Program is designed to help stabilize U.S. agriculture by providing payments to eligible producers who enroll their farms each fiscal year during the life of the current farm bill. Both direct payments and vary with the average price of program commodities each marketing year. When crop values are high, counter-cyclical payments are zero.

Producers wanting more income in 2003 are encouraged to call the Hansford County Farm Service Agency office to book an appointment.

# Scars

Some years ago on a hot summer day in south Florida a little boy decided to go for a swim in the old swimming hole behind his house. In a hurry >0 dive into the cool water, he ran out the back door, leaving behind shoes, socks, and shirt as he went.

He flew into the water, not realizing that as he swam toward the middle of the lake, an alligator was swimming toward the shore. His mother in the house was looking out the window saw the two as they got closer together. In utter fear, she ran toward the water, yelling to her son as loudly as she could.

Hearing her voice, the little boy became alarmed and made a U-turn to swim to his mother. It was too late. Just as he reached her, the alligator reached him. From the dock, the mother grabbed her little boy by the arms just as the alligator snatched his legs. That began an incredible tug-of-war between the two. The alligator was much stronger than the mother, but the mother was much too passionate to let go.

A farmer happened to drive by, heard her screams, raced from his truck, took aim and shot the alligator.

Remarkably, after weeks and weeks in the hospital, the little boy survived. His legs were extremely scarred by the vicious attack of the animal. And, on his arms, were deep scratches where his mother's fingernails dug into his flesh in her effort to hang on to the son she loved.

The newspaper reporter who interviewed the boy after the trauma, asked if he would show him his scars. The boy lifted his pant legs. And then, with obvious pride, he said to the reporter, "But look at my arms. I have great scars on my arms, too. I have them because my Mom wouldn't let go."

You and I can identify with that little boy. We have scars, too. Not from an alligator, but the scars of a painful past. Some of those scars are unsightly and have caused us deep regret. But, some wounds, are because God has refused to let go. In the midst of your struggle, He's been there holding on to you.

Never judge another persons scars, because you don't know how they got them.

# Texas Ag Groups Applaud Postponement Of COOL Regulations

Congressional action today the law. As the law reads now, it would have devastating finanmandatory country-of-origin labeling law (COOL) until September 2006. The law, orig-inally scheduled to go into effect September 2004, calls for contain commodities such as certain commodities such as beef, pork and fresh and frozen vegetables to be labeled as to their country of origin.

Texas ag groups have serious concerns about mandatory COOL. Estimates show the law will place tremendous costs on the beef industry without providing any benefits to producers or consumers.

Leaders with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Texas Association, Cattle Feeders Association, Texas Pork Producers Association and Texas Produce Association welcomed the action and expressed appreciation to Congress for giving the industry time to seek alternatives to the governmentmandated program.







## **Heart Attack** Warning Signs

Some heart attacks are sudden and intense -- the "movie heart attack," where no one doubts what's happening. But most heart attacks start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Often people affected aren't sure what's wrong and wait too long before getting help. Here are signs that can mean a heart

attack is happening: Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure. squeezing, fullness or pain.

Discomfort in other areas of the upper body. Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back neck, jaw or stomach Shortness of breath. This feeling often comes along with chest discomfort. But it can occur before the chest discomfort begins.

Other signs: These may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness If you or someone you're with has chest discomfort, especially with cae or more of the other signs, don't wait longer than a few minutes (no more than 5) before calling for help. Call 9-1-1 ... Get to a hospital right away.

# **Don't Invite Heart Attacks Home for the Holidays**

Every day, more than 150 Texans will die from heart disease. And unfortunately, cardiovascular disease - our number one killer - doesn't take time off for the holidays.

Some risk factors - such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol, weight gain and smok-ing - can be controlled through behavior modifications and healthy lifestyle choices. But certain acute events such as heart attacks are not so easily

prevented - or predicted. This holiday season, ask yourself an important question: if a family member or friend collapsed from cardiac arrest, would you know what to do? Each year, more than 250,000 adults suffer cardiac arrest, usually away from a hospital and often in their own homes. But there are steps that you can take to increase their chances of recovery and survival.

Because every single minute counts.

The most common cause of cardiac arrest is an abnormal heart rhythm known as ventricular fibrillation, which prevents the heart from pumping blood. Cardiopulmonary resuscitation, or CPR, can keep oxygenated blood flowing to the brain and heart until defibrillation or other advanced care can restore a normal heart rhythm.

Performing CPR is critical during the first few minutes following sudden cardiac arrest. With each passing minute, the cent, particularly if CPR is not provided. Through CPR training and the Chain of Survival, you can transform yourself from a bystander to a lifesaver.

The Chain of Survival is a four-step process that outlines how to provide treatment to victims of cardiac arrest. The steps include

Early access to care: Early access means recognizing the symptoms of cardiac arrest and immediately engaging the emer-gency system. Call 9-1-1 to dispatch emergency medical services.

Early CPR: This involves prompt and correct mouth-to-mouth breathing and chest compressions to enable oxygen-rich blood to be circulated to the victim's heart and brain. CPR can extend the time available for successful defibrillation.

Early defibrillation: A trained rescuer can deliver a shock with an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to help restore the heart's normal contraction rhythm. The availability of an AED is critical to correcting ventricular fibrillation.

Early advanced care: Medical personnel can administer timely treatment through medications and advanced therapies, which are vital to survival

More than 95 percent of cardiac arrest victims will die usually because defibrillation occurs too late to reverse the effects. Every minute that passes before returning the heart to a normal rhythm after a cardiac arrest causes the chance of survival to fall by 10 percent. Keep in mind that the average response time for paramedics or emergency medical technicians to arrive on the scene is 6 to 10 minutes. Most victims can't afford to wait that long.

Because there's no time to vaste

In 2000, almost 60,000 Texans died from cardiovascular disease - and roughly half of these deaths resulted from sudden cardiac arrest. There are an estimated 17,249 sudden cardiac arrests each year in the state of Texas, and only five percent of victims will survive. CPR can help make every minute count. In 2002, more than 420,000 Texans were trained in CPR and AED use

More than five million people each year receive CPR training from instructors taught by the American Heart Association. The timely application of CPR has helped save thousands of lives each year in the United States






