Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: The region continued to be hot and dry with high winds, which adversely impacted all crops. High wildfire danger continues to be the major concern across the region, with all counties needing moisture. Producers were busy irrigating summer crops, planting of corn and cotton, and having wheat and alfalfa. Some producers were unable to switch irrigation from corn to other crops because soils were drying faster than water could be applied. In some areas, blowing sand added to the stress on corn and cotton. Livestock producers continued to feed cattle. Some producers were culling their herds. Though in some areas cotton had barely emerged, producers already were forced to spray for thrips. The winter wheat crop continued to lose ground. and growers were concerned about the drying and early maturing of kernels.

Regarding the Ogden, UT event, 11 of the 26 horses in Texas that attended the event remain under movement restriction. The number of cohorts (stablemates) under movement restriction has dropped from 323 to 171. There are now a total of seven premises that have been exposed in the following counties: Randall, Parker, Jack, and Mills counties. No Texas origin horse from the Ogden event has been confirmed to have the neurologic form of EHV-1, so far.

In other situations where horses have either shown signs consistent with EHV-1 or tested positive for EHV-1, movement restrictions have been put in place while additional diagnostic work is conducted by the attending veterinarian.



Words from Faith & Grace

We leaved the Season of Easter as we approach As cension Sunday by studying Acts 1: 1-11, Psalm 93 Ephesians 1: 15-23, and Luke 2: 44-53.

The disciples are gathered in the upper room in Jerusalem, Jesus appears to them and explains the scriptures which relate to his ministry. He orders them to remain in Jerusalem until they have received the Holy Spirit. The disciples then ask, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the Kingdom to Israel?" Jesus answers that this is not for them to know. He calls them to become his witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and then the world, after they receive the Holy Spirit. He then leads them out as far as Bethany and while he blesses them he is lifted up and a cloud takes Him out of their sight. Two men in white robes ask the disciples, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." The disciples then return to Jerusalem, rejoicing. They have closure. Jesus' earthly mission is complete, and the mission of the disciples, the Church, has begun.

The Psalmist sings a song of God, The Lord, Is King! The Hebrew opening of this Psalm is difficult in the sense that some translate it as "The Lord is King" while others translate it as "The Lord has become King". The Hebrew phrase "Yahweh Malak" is the source of the question. However, this Psalm was liturgically used each year in the temple, and if sung "Yahweh Malak" in that sense, God is declared as Lord each year to the assembled worshipers. Whichever translation you prefer, "The Lord is King" is absolutely proper at the time of Creation and at the End of History.

Paul addresses the Ephesians to understand that in Christ we have obtained an inheritance, citizenship in God's Kingdom as the children of God. He uses a Greek legal term "arrabon" to explain the role of the Holy Spirit in baptism. "Arrabon" in Greek contract law was a portion of the purchase price given to "seal" the deal (today we might think of "escrow"). We are marked as belonging to Christ in our baptism and we receive the Holy Spirit, the assurance of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people. So we are a part of Christ's body on earth, the Church, and we await his return, and

we acknowledge Christ as Lord.

Luke gives us a view of the Ascension to end his 'hisory' of the ministry of Jesus The Christ; just as he uses the Ascension to open his 'history' of the Church. We see in the Ascension that Jesus is Lord and that the reality of the resurrection has established God's plan of salvation for His creation. The disciples return joyously to Jerusalem and spend much time in the temple blessing God. The disciples were called to be witnesses (note in Greek 'witness' and 'martyr' are the same word). Church tradition tells us that all the disciples, save John, were killed in the service of our Lord. Yet, these disciples were joyous in that service despite hardship, despite the fate of 'martyr'. Dear Christian, each of us is called as a disciple to be a witness. Let us serve joyously despite hardship, despite the possible fate of 'martyr'.



2. Store gasoline in an approved safety can away from occupied buildings. 3. All combustibles such as firewood, wooden picnic

5. Remove branches from trees to a height of 15 feet 6. In rural areas, clear a fuel break of at least three

times the fuel length around all structures. 7. Have fire tools handy such as: ladder long enough to reach your roof, shovel, rake and a bucket or two for

8. Place connected garden hoses at all sides of your home for emergency use.

9. Assure that you and your family know all emergency exits from your home.

10. Assure that you and your family know all emergency exits from your neighborhood.

READY. Prepare for the possibility of a wildland fire before the threat occurs. Take preventive actions to make your home safer from the threat of wildfire by using Firewise and similar principles (firewise.org).

- Remove combustible materials from around your

home. Keep grass mowed short.

SET. Elevate your family's awareness when fire weather occurs or when wildland fire activity increases. Form a family disaster plan.

- Agree on an evacuation plan that includes what to do if you get separated and where you'll go in case of evac-

- Pack critical medicines, important documents, family heirlooms to be ready to leave at a moment's notice. GO. This is the simplest step: Execute your disaster plan by leaving early, well before the fire arrives.

- If instructed to evacuate, do so! Your "stuff" isn't more important than your LIFE.






