sin, yet even the cross did not cancel the consequence of our sin. We

become weary in doing good. Let us through love be a "little Chris" to

This could reflect that Jesus shares the joy of his messengers by tellin

During a patient's hospital stay, the hospitalist will be in regular contact with the primary care physician to share information on their hospital stay. Hospitalists can be more available to the patients since they don't have office prac-
tices. However patients also may feel free to speak with their primary care physician at any time during their hospital stay, and once they are discharged from Pampa Regional Medical Center, they return to the care of their physician.
