### Hansford Manor Aviary

The staff of Hansford Manor would like to invite you to participate with them in an exciting endeavor which they feel will bring joy and beauty to the residents' lives.

They are currently raising funds to purchase an Oak Creek Aviary. This aviary is handcrafted, made of beautiful oak and break-resistant glass. It will be populated with finches, canaries and doves. Residents will be able to observe the birds building nests, playing, raising families and going about their "daily chores."

The residents have thoroughly enjoyed birdwatching in the current aviary. However, there have been several problems with it due to the netting/PVC pipe construction. The netting on the sides makes it hard for residents with any visual challenges to see the birds very well. Keeping the aviary and the area around it clean has been a continuous problem due to the open construction. Also, several times small finches have actually lost their lives when trapped between the netting and the side panels.

The dimensions of the new Oak Creek aviary will be approxi-mately 8'x34"x6'6" and will cost approximately \$6,000 to purchase. (This includes setup/delivery, birds, bedding, ground cover,

# State Champion!

Spearman track coach Jerry Bass took a long look at his giddy longjumper Colton Miller as he accepted hugs, handshakes and backslaps from a stream of Lynx fans after Miller's shocking upset Friday afternoon at the UIL state track meet.

"It's going to take a while to peel him off the ceiling," said Bass. 'We thought it would be great to get in the top three. But to do what he did surprised both of us."

Miller, a 6-foot-2, 180-pound junior, pulled off the performance of his young life, winning the 2A long jump with an outrageous attempt on his final jump of the preliminaries.

Miller entered the competition with a best of 22 feet, 2 inches. He qualified only sixth out of eight among the field with a 21-7 jump at regional.

But in an event where improvement is measured by inches, Miller exploded on his third attempt. He improved by more than a foot -- 15 inches to be exact -- to win the long jump with an unexpected 23-5, seven inches more than Danbury's Brian Allison (22-8).

"This is unbelievable," said Miller. "I can't tell you how great it feels. This is what I've always wanted to do since I was a little kid, to win state."

Miller was clearly the surprise of the first day of the meet at Mike A. Myers Track Stadium. On his by-far career jump, the red flag initially went up, indicating a foul. But then it was changed to white, meaning a clean attempt. The red color scared both Bass and Miller.

"That worried me," said Bass. "I thought he was perfect on the board. Then they changed the red to white. I mean, I didn't think it could be any more perfect than it was."

Said Miller: "I thought I scratched. Thank God the other guy raised the white flag. It felt like a good jump.

Bass said Miller was "scared to death" when arriving at the stadium. But jumping 22-8 on his second try, he said, which broke an 18year-old school record by three inches, seemed to relax him.

'After that, I calmed down and wasn't as nervous," Miller said. "I don't know. It's so different here. I'm used to the cold and having to warm up a long time and being tight. I just felt great today.

"And getting the good jump early helped. They had to catch me. Usually I'm having to catch somebody, but I was the one they had to catch today."

It was the second consecutive year a Spearman athlete scored a huge upset at the state meet. Last year Richard Varnon unseated defending state champion and Class 2A record-holder Matt McKinney of Refugio to win the discus.

"They love to compete," said Bass of Spearman athletes. "It's a great supportive community. The kids work hard and do whatever you ask them."

The competitiveness of Miller was evident after he finished second

"I wanted to get up on the first-place stand," Miller said. "At regionals, I had to stand on the second-place one and didn't like that very much."

## **President Bush Signs Farm Bill**

WASHINGTON, D.C. - President Bush signed the Farm Bill into law Monday morning in Washington. Immediately after signing the bill, Bush stood and shook hands with Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, who served as the chairman of the House/Senate Farm Bill conference committee.

Combest said the signing of the finalizes the House of Representatives' exhaustive efforts to bring farmers the help they have desperately needed to survive today's challenging economy. The House Agriculture Committee, of which Combest is chairman, began holding hearings with producers throughout the country about twoand-a-half years ago to learn what

those in the fields needed in the bill. Combest, who helped draft the House farm bill, and later the House/Senate compromise bill that the president signed, commented "I am very satisfied with the final outcome, and I believe that West Texas farmers can share that satisfaction."

Before signing the bill, President Bush commented that the bill puts in place programs farmers need

"They need a farm bill that provides support and help when times are tough and that is why I'm signing this bill today," Bush said. Their livelihood depends on things they cannot control; the weather, crop disease, uncertain prices. They need a farm bill that provides support and help when times are tough and that is why I'm signing this bill

today.
"This bill is generous and wil provide a safety net for farmers and it will do so without encouraging overproduction and depressing prices. It will allow farmers and ranchers to plan and operate based on market realities, not government dictates," President Bush said.

Now that the bill has been signed into law, and is in effect for the crop year for which farmers have already planted or are preparing to plant, the process of implementing the new law begins. The U.S. Department of Agriculture will be in charge of implementing the bill.

## Hansford Teens Excel In State Meets

Hansford County high school youths made their presence known at recent state UIL meets.

In the State UIL Academic Meet, May 3 and 4, all three Hansford County competitors scored points for their schools and medals for their

Russell Sheets, a sophomore from Spearman competing in his first state meet, placed third in the Lincoln Douglas Debate contest.

The topic for the debate was "When in conflict, the spirit of the law is

more important that the letter of the law." Kade Carthel, a senior at Gruver High School competing in his second state meet, was awarded fifth place in the Headline Writing Contest, in

which he placed second last year at the state level. He also won first place in the Ready Writing event at the 2001 meet.
In the Headline Writing Contest, six newspaper stories are provided for contestants to read and then compose a accurate, effective headline

in the same tone and context as the original story. A serious story would require a headline of the same nature while a feature story would require creativity and flair. The headline must fit a specified count, and the event is timed.

Erin Boxwell, a senior at Spearman High School, brought home a fourth-place medal in the Ready Writing Contest.

In her first state academic meet, Boxwell's event is a timed event in which students use their knowledge, and skills to create an informative and creative paper on a topic that is distributed at the beginning of the

Boxwell stated that her topic was a lengthy, scholarly quote which

stressed the concept of turning the other cheek.

Clara Shieldknight, a senior at Spearman High School, won fifth place honors in the girls 100 meter hurdles at the State Track and Field Meet

held May 10 and 11 in Austin.

It was the third time for Shieldknight to attend the state event which included the 2000 state meet that the Spearman girls track team cap-

tured. first place honors

Both the state academic and track and field meets were held on the University of Texas campus. The academic events pitted the top 12 competitors from the state in each event while the track and field meet pitted the top eight competitors in the state.

## Blowin' In The Wind

When this column last appeared two weeks ago, Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association members were needing a virtually windless day to put up the 10.5foot Star mill. We got the perfect day on Monday, April 29, and the mill went up without a hitch. The mill is spectacular with its green engine, red and white wheel, and its blue stars. The mill is from Mr. Buchanan's collection. Yet to go to get his collection in its entirety into the park are a 12-foot Eclipse and the 18-foot Railroad Eclipse.

J. D. Wilbanks now has the engine (head) for 'the 12-foot Eclipse in his shop preparing to pour new bearings. Orville Latham and Don Reed have been cutting out the wheel which includes 80 blades in eight sections. The SPWA members are now in a race with time to get the 12-foot Eclipse restored, tower built, and ready for an old-fashioned windraising during Windmillers' Trade Fair.

The SPWA put up two other mills since the last column. One is a New Elgin mill at Hi Plains Auto. The Elgin mill is a very attractive dark blue decorated mill. Walter Woolley got the mill, restored it, and gave it to SPWA to

be adopted. This mill is somewhat unique in that it's the first mill to have a logo painted on it. Terry Schneider painted the NAPA logo on the mill.

The other mill is a six-foot Star also obtained by Walter Woolley, restored by him, and given to SPWA to be adopted. It is located south of the Hansford County Veterinarian Clinic

Still waiting to be put up is an eight-foot Butler double gear mill that Walter restored and put on a tower. That mill came from the Slapout, Oklahoma, area and is from Dorothy Woolley's father's farm. That mill will go in the park.

The SPWA is presently building a tower for the Duplex umbrella mill which will go up at Golden Spread Sales Co. That mill has a very striking yellow and green wheel with a red engine.

Building of the wall on the west side of the J. B. Buchanan Park is well underway. Bobby Lesly has been laying brick and preparing to place on the wall the memorial bricks and tiles that families and individuals have purchased. Also, as you go past the park, you will see that the Texas Highway Department has done additional work on its right-of-way to facilitate parking close to the wall and







## **Pringle-Morse CISD Oceanic Studies**

by Lori Limbocker, Pringle-Morse CISD First Grade Teacher The first grade at Pringle-Morse CISD is having a "whale" of a time. All of elementary has been meeting in the afternoons to study

about the ocean. Some of the subjects taught were about whales, dolphins, octopi, sea anemones, polyps, sharks, underwater volcanoes, coral reefs, and jellyfish (just to name a few). Did you know coral reefs could be as big as mountains? Or did you know that an octopus can squeeze through an opening the size of its eve?

One of our favorite things we have learned is that there are 5 oceans. Mrs. Wilson taught us a song to learn them. We can name them all and find them on a map.

We are learning some great facts. To make our study even better,

the teachers covered the walls to represent the three zones of the ocean. They used different colors of blue for the Twilight Zone, the Midnight Zone, and the Sunlight Zone. We have made schools of fish and sea anemones. We had a shipwreck on a coral reef. We even made snorkels to go snorkeling

One of the best days we had was when we got to make our whales and dolphins. One group made an Orca Whale that is 22 feet long. Her calf was almost as long as she was! Another group made a Spotted Dolphin and calf. The last group made a White-Sided Dolphin and calf. We wrote about them and labeled all of their important parts, such as the blowhole, flipper, dorsal fin and fluke. Our teachers brought some great pictures for us to look at and we

studied about what they eat, how they are born, and where they live.

We have had a lot of fun studying about the ocean. If you get a chance, come and see some of the projects we have made. We don't even look like a school; we look like an ocean! We even have to "swim" to class every day!

Carolyn Cummings and Dwayne Smith recently presented a signed copy of the book "Black Sunday The Great Dust Storm of April 14, 1935" by Frank L. Stallings, Jr. to the Hansford County Library

Stallings was born in 1928 and graduated from Pampa High School in 1946. He served in the U.S. Army, stationed in Germany, in 1951-52.

Stallings received a B.A. and M.A. in English from West Texas State College, Canyon, and a Ph.D. in English from the University at Texas in Austin before launching a teaching career at UT-Austin, University of Texas Arlington, Thomas More College, Edgewood, Kentucky, Northern Kentucky University, where he is now emer-

itus professor. The author taught mostly American literature during tenure at these colleges, including courses dealing with literature and the land. Family stories about the Black Sunday storm inspired him

to interview survivors and research newspaper accounts and other sources for this history.

One giant, black dust storm in April of 1935 became the signature event of a devastating period in the history of the South Plains of the United States. Stallings gathered a collection of reminiscences, reports, and responses to the storm by individuals who had been in it, and by newspapers that had reported about it, then reflected about the storm during the following years.

The book is basically an oral his-

tory of interviews with well over 100 people and their personal experiences on that Black Sunday in the mid-thirties.

He and his wife, Virginia, live in Highland Heights, Kentucky.

## **EMS & Public Health**

Building a partnership for community healthcare

In 1996, the EMS professional community laid out a vision for the future of emergency medical services-the EMS Agenda for the Future. The vision was the result of extensive deliberation and consensus building within the profession, and it defined an expanded role for EMS in the community. A key element in this projection focused on the integration of EMS services with other community health care systems, especially public health

On April 28, 2000, representatives of national emergency medical services (EMS) and public health organizations came together to discuss strategies for joining forces to improve community health. Over the ensuing year and a half, a series of four EMS & Public Health roundtables was held. Leadership for the roundtable series was provided by the National Association of EMS Physicians (NAEMSP) and the American Public Health Association (APHA), with support from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA).

Roundtable participants identified specific benefits of EMS and public health integration, including how integration will help EMS and public health with their respective missions and how it will help the community at large. A brief summary of these benefits

For EMS-Increased professionalism, more analytic approach, use of public health data for EMS purposes, new funding opportunities, more satisfaction from issue resolution, strong leadership, broader community perspective, expertise, access to career ladder and greater

For Public Health - Prevention, visibility, response capability, rapid communications, data collection, referrals, cost effectiveness, and access to populations.

For the Community-Reduced health care costs, greater accountability, education, coverage, security and stability, access, adaptability, and improved

The group completed its fourth and final roundtable with a commitment to combining the experience of both EMS and Public Health professions by identifying six to ten demonstrations of public health and EMS collaboration in fiscal year 2002. The horrific terrorist attacks of

9/11/01, shortly after the final round-

table, provided proof that this new partnership is imperative. On October 22, 2001, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed by the National Association of State EMS Directors, the National Association of EMS Physicians and the American Public Health Association, pledging to ensure that local EMS and public health agencies stand ready to respond to future acts of terrorism. On December 8, 2001, these three groups jointly sponsored a meeting of representatives of 17 national health and medical organizations to reach consensus on priority needs for ensuring adequate community readiness. The group agreed on two critical short term needs: education of front line health and medical personnel, and priority protection for health care providers during a mass casualty event. Work in these specific areas is currently underway and the partner-
