C.L. DUNIVEN SUPER TEAM AWARD

Spearman Lynxettes cross country, third consecutive state championship

WHY HONORED: The Spearman Lynxettes, coached by Starla Whiteley, won a third consecutive University Interscholastic League state cross country championship.

Tylo Farrar, Gately Garnett, Itzel Meza, Sarah Snider and Malory Martin teamed to score 92 points and claim the 2A state title ahead of Cameron Yoe with 103.

The Lynxettes, whose first of three state championships was guided by retired coach Nan Cook with Whiteley as an assistant,

return all of the runners from this season's team to try for a fourth consecutive state championship in the fall.

A brutal winter storm charged into the region Tuesday, bringing fierce winds, plunging temperatures and blowing snow that triggered early school dismissals, basketball game postponements and early business closings. Wind gusts and blowing snow created to whiteouts, reduced visibility, and treacherous road travel across the Panhandle.

Gusts in Spearman reached 45 mph by afternoon as temperatures slid from a high of 29 just before 9 a.m. to 2 by early evening. Temperatures slipped below zero with wind chills falling to minus 25 on Tuesday night, and four inches of snow.

Temperatures on Wednesday reached a high of 16, followed by a low of -2 on Wednesday night with a wind chill factor of -15.

Weather Was Factor in Fatal Auto Accident North of Gruver

By Joe Gamm, Amarillo Globe-News Weather was a factor in an accident that killed a 79-year-old Gruver woman late Tuesday morning, according to the Department of Public Safety.

Charlene Boyd Spivey about 11:10 a.m. was a passenger in a southbound Buick Enclave that crossed the center line of state Highway 136 in Hansford County because of poor visibility, the DPS said. The Buick collided head on with a northbound tractor-trailer. A southbound Ford F-250 pickup then struck the Buick from behind, the DPS said.

An ambulance transported Spivey and Shirley Lowe, the driver of the Buick from Gruver, to Hansford County Hospital in Spearman, where Spivey died, according to the DPS. No information was available on the Lowe's condition.

Spivey was wearing a seat belt, the DPS

The City of Spearman has not charged City or County residents for the use of the landfill. The City has repeatedly requested funds from the County to help with operations of the landfill for the past several years. The City has absorbed the costs and allowed all County residents and most businesses to dispose of trash for free, with the exception of tires. There was a limit, but it was more than most residents

or businesses would use within a year.

Due to the increase in requirements and regulations for landfills, the operation costs have risen over the past few years. Because of the cost increase, the City of Spearman has adopted Ordinance 825, which amends Chapter 13, Utilities, Solid Waste Disposal; Division 1, Penalties; Division 2, Collection and Disposal; Division 4, Fees; of the Spearman City Code. The effective date of this code was January 1, 2011.

The City Administration determined that the previous charges for the services were insufficient to meet the financial needs of the City to provide the services. Therefore, The City Council of the City

of Spearman amended the ordinance. The receptacles located in and around the City of Spearman are for the use of residents and paying customers INSIDE the city limits only. Persons found using these receptacles without having trash service shall be subject to be cited and fined.

Unacceptable Refuse for trash receptacles includes: Bricks, rocks, dirt, concrete, furniture, appliances, metal (other than usual household waste), chemicals, asbestos, wood (other than usual household waste), oil, oil filters, tires, vehicle batteries, offal, dead animals and any other material deemed inappropriate by city administration.

Residents within the city limits of the City of Spearman may dump up to two (2) cubic yards/tons of household waste per month at the landfill for no charge. The waste must be generated at the address listed as having trash service. Once the maximum amount has been reached (by yearly average) then the regular fee schedule shall apply.

Businesses within the city limits of the

City of Spearman may dump up to four (4) cubic yards/tons of waste per month at no charge. The waste must be generated at the address listed as having trash service. Once the maximum amount has been reached (by yearly average) then the regular fee schedule shall apply. The waste must comply with all previous conditions as to type and condition.

Businesses and persons outside the city limits of the City of Spearman but near the city limits that pay for trash service may dump up to one (1) cubic yard/ton of waste per month at no charge. The waste must be generated at the address listed as having trash service. Once the maximum amount has been reached (by yearly average) then the regular fee schedule shall apply. The waste must comply with all previous conditions as to type and condi-

All other persons or businesses wishing to use the City of Spearman Municipal Landfill will be subject to the fee sched-

Illegal dumping of waste and materials shall be monitored by city staff and electronic devices including cameras. These devices shall be used to provide proof of the City's claim against a violator.

Weighed, compacted household waste generated inside Hansford County will be charged at a rate of \$30.00 per cubic yard/ton. Outside Hansford County \$42.00 per cubic yard/ton. (This is usually trash brought to the landfill from other communities.)

Uncompacted household waste generated inside Hansford County will be charged at a rate of \$15.00 per cubic yard/ton. Outside Hansford County \$30.00 per cubic yard/ton.

Roofing materials generated inside Hansford County will be charged at a rate of \$15.00 per cubic yard/ton. Outside Hansford County \$30.00 per cubic yard/ton.

Elevator belts will be charged at a rate of \$100.00 each.

The City of Spearman requests residents haul large items for disposal to the landfill. All loads must be strapped or tied down. Use of the landfill is free to City residents, with the exception of tires, which has a minimal fee. This allows

room in the dumpster for more household garbage and grass clippings.

If items must be placed in the alley, place them on your part of the alley, not beside the dumpster or on your neighbor's property! The City does not pick up items placed in the alley very often. Ensure that household garbage gets placed in the dumpster and the lid closed.

Since County residents must now pay for use of the landfill, the City of Spearman asks to be notified if any nonresident is seen using a dumpster. You may call City Hall to make a report, or for more in-

The City of Spearman recycles corrugated cardboard, which helps cut expenses for local citizens. Please flatten all cardboard boxes and take them to the City Recycling Center located next to the water tower on Kenneth Street. Used oil and filters may be placed in the used oil collection igloo located at the City Recycling Center or at the landfill. There are also recycling receptacles for other items such as paper, magazines, newspapers, plastic, etc.

City of Spearman Requires **Address Numbers**

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: The region had extremely cold temperatures, with a few days of wind chills as cold as minus 35 degrees. Some snow fell early in the reporting period but was blown around by 30 mph winds. Producers were busy tending to livestock, putting out feed ahead of the storm, placing livestock behind windbreaks, thawing water and breaking ice. The cold, windy weather was very hard on the cattle that did not have shelter. Effects of this weather on crops cannot be fully determined at the time of this report, but record lows dating back to early 1900's were broken. The ground was frozen so hard that no land preparation for field crops could be done. Supplemental feeding of cattle on rangeland continued.

Friday's show will begin at 7 a.m. with the weighing in of all steers and lambs. The grand opening of the show will be held at 9 a.m.


The lamb show will begin at 9:00AM, with the steer show following at 1 p.m. The weighing of pigs will be held after the steer
