The purpose of this course is to train lifeguards for the area pools with the skills and knowledge needed to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies. Prerequisites are: Minimum age of 15 years on or before class ends. Tread water for 2 minutes using legs only. Participants cross their arms across their chest. Swim 500 yards continuously using each of the following strokes for at least 100 yards; crawl, breaststroke, and sidestroke. The stroke (s) used for the remaining 200 yards are the participants' choice. Submerge to a minimum depth of 7 feet, retrieve a 10-pound object and return to the surface. 



Continued from Page 2 employees of Texas Farms who are paid to deliver the company policy.

The value of real estate in Spearman will be determined by demand, new construction costs, and other economic factors. It is my opinion the real estate values in Spearman will be reduced because of the Texas Farms facility. Why would anyone with a choice of where to live want to live in a town with over 20,000 hog facility located 3.5 miles from the city? How would you show your house to a prospective buyer with the hog stench blowing into town. Maybe you could only sell a house on days when the wind was not blowing from the southeast. I asked the Texas Farms people why they were located so close to the city and the answer was basically that was where the land was located. I cannot understand with the rural nature of Hansford and Ochiltree county's why they

would alienate 3000 people in Spearman if there were other locations available. This would indicate to me that they just don't care what the people in Spearman want or think.

I applaud the County Judge and the Commissions court in their action in opposing the hog facility and would like to ask the City Commission and the School Board to consider the same action. If you do not want over 20,000 hogs 3.5 miles from town, call or write Texas Farms and let them know your feelings. Their address is #9 Southwest Second Ave., Perryton 79070 and the phone is 435-5935. Let the elected officials also know how you feel.

In conclusion, I think that Texas Farms has under estimated the resolve of the people of Spearman in protecting their property and quality of life that they now enjoy. I am one of many who do not want a 20,000 hog facility 3.5 miles from the city limits. Larry Butts

decisively the instant either boy returned to his bickering. If I had separate bedrooms, I would confine one child to each room for at least 30 minutes of complete boredom--without radio or television. Or I would assign one to clean the garage and the other to mow the lawn. Or I would make them take a nap. My avowed purpose would be to make them believe me the next time I submitted a request for peace and tranquility.

What is most surprising is that children are happiest when their parents enforce these reasonable limits with love and dignity. Instead of wringing their hands and crying and begging and screaming (which actually reinforces the disruptive behavior and makes it worse), a mother or father should approach the conflict with dignity and self-control.


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

I do not want to live in "HOGsford" County with the stench of over 20,000 hogs over the City of Spearman. Do you want to be in the stands at a football game when the wind is blowing out of the southeast and the stench hangs over the football stadium? How will you feel when the opposing fans start shouting 'Sooooeeee Hogs"?

The proposed hog facility is to be located 3.5 miles from the city limits of Spearman. The Texas Farms people will want us to believe that they intend to be good neighbors and the smell will not be a problem. Talk is cheap, and if it is such a good deal, why don't they put it 3.5 miles from Perryton where they live. All Spearman will get from the proposed Hog Facility is the smell and the problems. We will never see any economic benefit from the hogs. The taxes paid by Texas Farms will not pay the tax burden the rest of us will assume because of the extra benefits we

will assume for their employees. An article in a recent Wall Street Journal stated that the reason the hog producers are moving from the Midwest and East is that the environmental laws in these areas are becoming too hard to comply with. The Texas environmental laws on hog facilities are very lax because the law makers in Austin don't care what happens in the Panhandle with the hogs. They feel they do not have to worry about the hogs because they will not be in their area because of the lack of feed.

In response to Mr. Carter (a Texas Farms Contractor) who stated that Texas Farms will compact the soil to 95% and use bentonite to mix with the soil to make the waste water lagoon "basically" impermeable, I feel they should make the lagoons 100% impermeable. Compacted soil and bentonite is not 100% impermeable. It is a matter of time before it will leak and will require continuous up keep. I would rather hear from the neighbors of the Texas Farms facilities and see how they like Texas Farms rather than the Continued on Page 3

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

Hospital Insurance Trust Fund Running Out

The Medicare federal hospital insurance trust fund, which finances hospital, home health, skilled nursing facility and hospice care, is projected to become insolvent by 2001, according to the 1996 annual report of its trustees.

Reporting to Congress, the trustees indicated that expenditures were \$2.6 billion over income in 1995. Over the next 10 years, the disparity between the income and spending is expected to grow. While the income met 98 percent of expenditures last year, it is anticipated to fall to 72 percent coverage in 2001.

The reserve balances will cover the income shortfall for a short period, but they will be depleted by 2001.

The trust fund, primarily financed through payroll taxes, will be further strained by the coming eligibility of the baby boomers and the corresponding shrinking size of the working population. The trustees recommended that a national advisory group be established to make recommendations to fix the program, which the report said is out of financial balance.

The Clinical Record....What Is It?

by Linda Lujan, Manor Medical Records

The purpose of the clinical record is to document the course of the resident's healthcare and to provide communication among healthcare workers involved in the resident's care. The clinical record will contain sufficient information to identify the resident clearly, justify the diagnosis and treatment, and document results accurately. Beyond complete and accurate documentation, the resident's clinical record will be readily accessible and systematically organized to simplify retrieving and compiling information.

The resident will have a right to privacy in relation to his or her clinical record. While the resident does not have the property right to his or her record, he or she does have the protected right of information. Information contained in the resident's clinical record is confidential and will be disclosed only to authorized persons with the resident's consent. The record will be made available to him/her for inspection, within 24 hours of request. The resident will be encouraged to review the record in the presence of staff of the facility. If the resident is incompetent, the resident's legal representative exercises the right on the resident's behalf. The resident's family has no right of access to the record without a valid authorization by the resident. An exception exists only if the family member is legally authorized to act in the resident's behalf (a legal guardian).

A legal guardian is a person appointed by a court of law for a person who has been adjudicated incompetent. The guardian may be appointed over the person, over property, or over both. A guardian over the person handles personal decisions for the resident's care, etc., but does not handle the resident's -- operty.
