tative of the Spearman Police Department, the Superintendents of both Spearman Independent
School District and Gruver I. S.D. the principals of Spearman High School and Gruver High School and the presidents of the Studen Councils from both SHS and GHS The aim of Teen Court is to in
terrupt developing patterns of criminal behavior by promotin feelings of self-esteem, motivation for self improvement and development of a healthy attitude toward authority. There is also the hope of encouraging community responsi bility, according to an explanatory pamphlet about Teen Court.

When a youth goes before Teen Court, the youth has already pleaded guilty.
Youth have the opportunity t
keep their records "clean" if thei keep their records "clean" if thei
sentences are successfully com pleted. Uponeompletion of com tence, the charge is dismissed and no fine is paid. In the case of acc dents, the accident may remai show any ticket received as being handled in Teen Court as bein The fact that the charge is dis missed and the record is clean can surance premiums in the traffic tickets receive the case drivers. Since the ticket teenag successfully in Teen Court will appear on the driver's record, in surance premiums may not be as likely to increase.
Teens who can be involved in the Teen Court process must be enrolled in and 18 years of age and enrolled in school. Some alcoho violations may be handled up to the age of 20 if the youth is still
enrolled in public school and under enrolled in public school and under Ahe control of a parent or guardian such as municipal, justice of the peace or county court, charged with a misdemeanor offense, can enter a plea of guilty and be referred to Teen Court.
