Precautions urged in Shigellosis outbreak in Panhandle, South Plains

Health Services (DSHS) is urging residents of the Texas Panhandle and South Plains to take precautions to control the spread of shigellosis, an infectious bacterial disease causing diarrhea, fever and stomach cramps. A total of 33 cases of shigellosis have been reported in DSHS Health Service Region 1 since mid January.

"Most Shigella infections are the result of the bacterium passing from stools or soiled fingers of one person to the mouth of another person," said Connie Lindley, regional epidemiologist in Canyon. "Thorough hand washing is one of the best ways to prevent the spread of shigellosis, especially after using the restroom, before prepar-

The Texas Department of State ing or serving food or drinks and after changing a diaper," she said. "The infection occurs often

among toddlers who are not fully toilet-trained," Lindley said.

The infection ranges in severity from a relatively mild illness with watery stools for a few days to severe symptoms including cramps, headache, high fever, profuse or bloody diarrhea and dehydration. Those infected usually recover in five to sever days. In severe cases the patient needs to be hospitalized. People with symptoms of shigellosis should contact their doctor. Some people who are infected may have no symptoms but may still pass the Shigella bacteria to others.

Editorial

The Spearman ISD Board of Trustees called for a bond election last month to raise funds for the construction of a new junior high school to replace the existing junior high building, to renovate and enlarge the existing elementary school, to build a new elementary/junior high cafeorium, and to provide better parking and safer traffic flow around the elementary/junior high campuses.

I have to admit that I am amazed that there is even a question of

whether or not we need a new junior high building.

How can we expect our school system to provide the best possible education for our children if we keep them from updating the facilities? We expect them to keep up with technology with up-to-date equipment plugged into a system that was built in 1930.

Would America expect the executives and employees of its great corporations to work in overcrowded buildings where the roof leaks, the ceiling is crumbling, the indoor air quality makes people sick and the heating and air conditioning do not work properly?

If not, then why do we accept these conditions in the classrooms that are training the CEOs, officers and employees of tomorrow's great corporations? How can educators be expected to teach effectively and students to learn successfully in this type of environment?

Not only should these conditions be unacceptable, but there is a growing body of research that strongly suggests a correlation between the condition of the school facility and student academic performance.

Studies in urban, suburban and rural communities have demonstrated that the condition of the facility students attend affects their academic achievement.* Students whose schools are comfortable and well-maintained are likely to focus more fully on academic challenges than those who are distracted or depressed by the facility in which they spend a large part of their day. Students dodging leaks from ceilings, using unsanitary and inadequate bathrooms, attending classes in converted storerooms, and breathing unhealthy air cannot accomplish as much as their peers who attend well-lighted, clean, attractive and well-furnished

The real question is where do we place our priorities? Is there any doubt the bond would pass if it were needed to replace 1930s textbooks or sporting equipment?

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

The Season of Easter is more than one Sunday in March. The Celebration of Christ's resurrection continues past the Easter finery, chocolate bunnies, and for some of us the "Cadbury Eggs."

The Season extends on this second Sunday of Easter to lessons in 1 Peter 1: 3-9, Psalm 16, Acts 2: 14a, 22-32, and John 20: 19-31. Peter reminds us of the great living hope God has given us in raising Jesus Christ from the dead which overpowers the various trials and afflictions that we suffer.

The Psalmist praises God who shows him the path of life, the fullness of joy in God's presence. In Acts we see the powerful "Easter Sermon" of

May the Holy Spirit work in your life to enable you to believe without seeing and to live in His name, forever.

Texas crop and weather report

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Soil moisture is adequate to surplus. Temperatures were slightly below average. Several days of light rain were reported. High winds aided drying of fields but hampered herbicide applications. Wheat was rated fair to excellent. Disease appeared in many fields. No diagnosis was available. Greenbug reports increased. Rangelands varied in poor to excellent condition. Grass continued to make good growth. Cattle were rated fair to good. Supplemental feeding continued.



Dear Citizens:

The Board of Trustees of the Spearman Independent School District voted unanimously to call for a bond election to be held on April 23, 2005. This action follows a two-year study of the district's facility needs by the Board of Trustees.

In the course of this study, the board utilized the services of an educational facility consultant, architectural firm, school finance experts, and input from the staff to determine how to best meet the needs of the district's students. Following this study the board appointed a Citizen's Facility Committee of twentythree community members to review the plan and to give additional input to the Board of Trustees

In a series of meetings from November 2004 to February 2005, this committee identified the following Facility needs:

1. New Junior High School

2. Additional rooms/space at the elementary school 3. Better parking and traffic flow at the elemen-

tary/junior high campus

As a result of the board's study and with the input from the Citizens' Facility Committee, the Board of Trustees unanimously called for a bond election in the amount not to exceed \$12,000,000. The proceeds from the bonds will be used to construct a new junior high school, to renovate and enlarge the existing elementary school, and to build a new elementary/junior high school cafetorium, and to provide better parking and safer traffic flow.

 The building is of an inflexible design that cannot be effectively modified and modernized to meet current requirements.

• The deficiencies of the main junior high building also apply to the cafeteria and the music building.

· Classrooms are too few in number and too small to meet the needs of current curriculum and programs.

· Restrooms are inadequate and do not meet the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards. Compliance with these standards by the District will require construction of new restroom facilities adjacent to the existing junior high building.

· The science facilities are dated and inadequate, and the computer labs are too few and too small.

· There are problems with the boiler, plumbing, wiring, asbestos and termites.
