Phariesse's. Jesus is invited to dinner by Simon the Pharisee. When invited to a home for dinner and discussion a host in the first century, would greet his guest with a
kiss of peace, would have a servant pour water over the guest's feet, to refresh him, and would burn sweet in-
cense, or place a drop of attar of roses on the head of the cense, or place a drop of attar of roses on the head of the
guest to further refresh him. Simon the Pharisee did none
